

Oregon's Law On Assault Armed With Weapon Hold's

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's law against assault while armed with a dangerous weapon was held constitutional Wednesday by the Oregon Supreme Court.

The decision revised Circuit Judge William W. Wells, Pendleton. He had dismissed an assault case in Morrow County against George Steagall, holding the law unconstitutional because it made the crime either a felony or a misdemeanor.

This means that Steagall, who is charged with threatening to shoot four men, now must stand trial.

The case is unusual in that there are few instances when the prosecution has the right to appeal in a criminal case.

Felony Or Misdemeanor

The law provides that the crime of assault while armed with a dangerous weapon is a felony punishable by up to 10 years in prison, or a misdemeanor punishable by a county jail sentence of one month to one year.

Judge Wells upheld Steagall's contention that the law is unconstitutional because it defines the

crime both as a felony and as a misdemeanor. He said it should be one or the other, but not both.

The Supreme Court decision, by Justice George Rossman, ruled the law valid.

The decision said that whether the crime is a misdemeanor or a felony isn't determined until after the defendant has been convicted. This disputed Steagall's contention that the district attorney can decide.

The court ruled again that an indictment in such a case doesn't have to allege that the gun was loaded.

Other decisions included: American Produce Co., appellant, vs. Marion Creamery & Poultry Co. Appeal from Marion County. Suit to rescind contract for purchase of frozen turkeys. Opinion by Justice George Rossman. Judge George Duncan, affirmed.

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Veden vs. Mr. and Mrs. R. E. McFall, appellants. Appeal from Douglas County. Suit to foreclose mortgage. Opinion by the whole court. Judge pro tem A. N. Orcutt, affirmed.

TROOPS JUSTIFIED

U. S. Marines Sent Into Many World Spots During History Of United States

NEW YORK (AP) — A bunch of Marines landing in Lebanon has created quite an international ruckus. Not too long ago, the same operation would hardly have raised an eyebrow.

The peacetime U.S. Corps of Marines has landed, fought — and suffered casualties — so many times and on so many shores that it's easy to lose count.

Thirty-four years ago Marines were so common in the Latin American states of Nicaragua and the Dominican Republic that knowledge of the Spanish language was almost a prerequisite to enlistment.

And, scarcely a century ago, China and the rest of the Far East seems to have been fairly crawling with fighting, sweating and cursing peacetime Leathernecks.

No Precise Time
The American habit of calling on the Marines doesn't appear to have started at any one precise time. Marines were landing "on the shores of Tripoli" (as their song goes) in the unofficial war against the Barbary pirates in 1804. They were back for a repeat performance in Algiers in 1815.

Leathernecks stormed into the Sumatran jungles in 1832, chasing pirates who killed several American sailors. They fought a pitched battle with the buccaners and even burned the sizable town of Quallah Battoo.

There was hardly any comment even in the local papers when they taught lessons to natives in the Philippines and Samoa in 1838 and 1839. The natives had a habit of killing American traders and seafarers.

In the middle of the last century, American clipper ships carried on a man-sized trade with the Far East. Trade brought the pro-

tection of the U.S. Navy. And the U.S. Navy brought its Marines.

Battled Chinese Troops

As early in 1854, and possibly earlier, the Corps was in Shanghai battling the troops of the Imperial Chinese Army itself to protect the small foreign colony. The home team was runner-up in the engagement.

Two years later, a small detachment of Marines cut its way through a 5,000-man Chinese army, taking forts from the coast to Canton, to demand an apology for an insult to the American flag.

The Leathernecks were fighting for unheralded but deadly police action in Korea 80 years before the most recent unpleasantness in that unhappy land.

It started when the Koreans burned a stranded American vessel and chopped up its crew.

The Marines stormed ashore, captured a supposedly impregnable fortress called the Citadel and extracted a promise to be good.

Boxer Rebellion

Highpoint of Marine peacetime action in the Orient came during the Boxer Rebellion in 1900 when antiforeign feeling ran high.

U.S. Marines and German soldiers stood back to back in the heroic defense of Peking's foreign compound. Marines and Russian soldiers spearheaded the international column that lifted the siege of the enclave.

The Marines' peacetime activities are probably best known in Latin America where, in an earlier era, nearly every revolt produced a Marine landing to protect American lives and property and, sometimes, to back a favored cause.

They landed in Haiti on July 9, 1915 to effect a "quick" settlement of the island republic's century-old political chaos. The last Marine didn't leave until Aug. 15, 1934.

Marine landings were standard procedure in Nicaragua between 1910 and 1933 and in the Dominican Republic from 1912 to 1924. They brought order to Cuba between 1906 and 1909. They were in Vera Cruz, Mexico, in 1914.

There's no counting the number of times they returned to the beaches of Panama in time of revolt to protect a vital railroad across the isthmus. There was no Panama Canal or Canal Zone in those days.

Idaho Power Authorized To Sell Shares Of Stock

SALEM (AP) — Idaho Power Co. this week received state authorization to issue and sell 350,000 shares of \$10 par value common stock.

Howard Morgan, Oregon public utilities commissioner, authorized the transaction. At the same time Morgan challenged the economic justification of building a 73-mile transmission line between Oxbow Dam and Lewiston, Idaho.

Idaho Power wants to build the line and has filed an application with the Federal Power Commission to do so.

Morgan said he would seek a joint investigation of the matter by the FPC and state regulatory agencies of Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

French Sources Report Lebanon Asked Troops

PARIS (AP) — Official French sources this week said Lebanese President Camille Chamoun had asked the United States, Britain and France to send troops immediately to Lebanon to close the Lebanese-Syrian frontier.

The sources said Chamoun called in the U.S., British and French ambassadors in Beirut Monday afternoon.

Roche immediately transmitted the request to Paris. Premier De Gaulle, and his top advisers were studying it this morning.

Stevenson Tells Russ Americans Uphold Move

MOSCOW (AP) — Adlai Stevenson told the Soviet government he is confident the American people will emphatically support the sending of U.S. troops to Lebanon.

The two-time U.S. presidential candidate said he gave these views to Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko Wednesday — at about the time the foreign office was denouncing the U.S. intervention and warning that the Kremlin reserves the right to act "to halt a dangerous situation near our border."

Stevenson told reporters after a visit of more than an hour with Gromyko that he deplored the necessity for the Lebanon action, but added:

"I did express my confidence that the people of the United States would emphatically support the action of the President."

Two Ex-Presidents Back Action Of Eisenhower

NEW YORK (AP) — Former President Herbert Hoover, a U.S. President Eisenhower's dispatch of troops to Lebanon was "the only course possible if the freedom of nations is to be protected from militarist conspiracies."

Hoover's comment was issued from his apartment here.

INDEPENDENCE, MO. (AP) — President Eisenhower's dispatching of U.S. Marines to Lebanon has the support of his predecessor. "Under the circumstances, the President had no other choice," former President Harry S. Truman told newsmen. "The peace of the world is at stake."

ARROW MILL DESTROYED
BANDON (AP) — Fire Tuesday night destroyed the Jay W. Curtis arrow mill about seven miles east of here on Highway 101.

A lightning strike on the mill's metal roof was blamed for the blaze. Curtis said he had about \$30,000 insurance on the mill, which he valued at \$44,000.

The Coos Forest Patrol crew from Bandon and residents fought the blaze and managed to save a stockpile worth about \$14,000.

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Nagoya Jilts Portland, Now Woos Germany

NAGOYA, Japan (AP) — Nagoya jilted Portland and then got a crush on Los Angeles only to find L.A. reluctant to get engaged. So now Nagoya is making eyes at Germany.

That's the story being told of Nagoya's search for happiness in trans-Pacific friendship arrangements being made between pairs of Japanese and American cities.

Already, Osaka and San Francisco are going steady; Nagasaki is engaged to St. Paul; Kobe has Seattle; Okayama, San Jose, Calif.; Kyoto, Boston; Tatematsu, Bellingham, Wash.; Yokohama, San Diego; Sendai, Riverside, Calif.; Mishima, Pasadena; and Kofu, Des Moines.

All Nagoya has so far is frustration, according to the newspaper Yomiuri.

Portland, Ore., proposed affixing last fall, but Nagoya decided it would be a bad match because Nagoya has one million more people than Portland's 400,000.

Negotiations were under way with Los Angeles. But the Far East section of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce wrote recently that L.A. wants to stay equally friendly with all cities.

So Mayor Kessen Kobayashi's reported looking elsewhere.

Pearl Harbor Steps Up Action

HONOLULU (AP) — Pearl Harbor shipyards began around-the-clock, seven day a week operations Wednesday to ready ships for any eventuality stemming from the turmoil in the Middle East.

Adm. Felix Stump, U.S. commander in the Pacific, put a military, naval and air forces in the area on alert status. That curtailed drastically leaves and transfers of all naval personnel and placed ships on four hour alert — ready to sail on four hours notice.

Navy spokesmen said the shipyards were ready to meet any new demands for logistic support or work needed to fit the ships for combat.

Ammunition has been rushed to ships which are tied up two deep at local piers taking on oil.

Fleet Marine headquarters said "the marines are ready for any mission assigned."

Liberace Settles Suit Against Confidential

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Liberace has settled his 20-million-dollar lawsuit against Confidential magazine.

He agreed to accept \$40,000 — the highest settlement yet made by the much-sued onetime scandal magazine.

Liberace, now operating in Atlantic City, N.J., told his lawyers by phone that he'll give to charity whatever is left of the \$40,000 after legal and court costs have been paid.

Liberace sued the magazine in May 1957, alleging an article about him was "defamatory, vulgar, rude and completely untrue." The magazine and its publishers were later tried for criminal libel and Confidential agreed to change to a less sensational format.

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New Flames In Middle East Light Up Another Success For Egypt's Gamal Nasser

The new flames sweeping the Middle East light up another success for Gamal Abdel Nasser.

The Egyptian dictator sailed home from Yugoslavia Wednesday on the yacht of the king he overthrew in 1952 to start a meteoric political career. The President of the United Arab Republic of Egypt and Syria returned to Cairo amid swiftly moving events that may bring his strongest challenge so far.

The developments began early Monday, when Nasser was visiting Communist President Tito of Yugoslavia. The monarchy in pro-Western Iraq was overthrown by pro-Nasser army officers — just as Nasser replaced King Farouk with a military-run republic.

The Iraqi revolt started the U.S. 6th Fleet moving eastward through the part of the Mediterranean which Nasser is now plying. The fleet was on its way to land Marines in Lebanon. And the United States, in statement to the U.N. Security Council, made clear that it considers Nasser the villain in the piece.

Crisis No Stranger
Crisis is no stranger to the tall, darkly handsome Arab leader. A plotter from the time he was a boy, Nasser gambled and won two years ago this month when he nationalized the Suez Canal.

France and Britain struck back with an invasion of the canal zone after Israel invaded the Egyptian Sinai Peninsula. But Nasser had correctly calculated the delicate Soviet and American balance.

The United States then threw the weight of its diplomatic forces into action in the United Nations against its usual allies.

The Soviet Union threatened to intervene with volunteers and nuclear weapons.

Britain and France were forced to halt their invasion and the Israelis finally agreed to withdraw, turning Nasser's military defeat into a resounding political triumph which sent his stock soaring among Arab nationalists.

Nasser moved stubbornly ahead with the operation of the canal on his own terms and rebuilt his military forces with Communist help.

Union Proclaimed
Last Feb. 1 the union of Egypt

and Syria was proclaimed with Nasser as its president. The kingdom of Yemen federated a month later and Nasser was hailed by masses in the Middle East as the great Arab unifier.

When the Lebanese revolt erupted this spring, the Beirut government accused Nasser's U.A.R. of sparking the rebellion by its virulent propaganda and aiding the rebels with arms and men from Syria. The U.A.R. denied the charge, but the United Arab Republic and France maintained there was outside interference. Observers sent to Lebanon were kept from the border by the rebels.

When the coup in Iraq unfolded Monday, reports from Cairo said it took the capital by surprise but jubilant celebrations followed in the streets of Cairo and Damascus.

Lt. Colonel In Army
Nasser was a 34-year-old lieutenant colonel in the Egyptian army when he masterminded the 1952 coup that toppled King Farouk. He had been plotting that upheaval 10 years, but when it came he still needed a front man. The choice was Maj. Gen. Mohammed Naguib, a hero of the 1948 Palestine War, who became president and premier of the new regime.

Within two more years Naguib was out and Nasser was the power in front as well as behind the scenes.

Born Jan. 15, 1918, in the upper Egyptian village of Beni Mor, Nasser was reared in a lower middle class family. He was sent to Cairo when he was 8 for his education. He finished high school at 16 and a year later was involved wholeheartedly in anti-British violence.

He came out of military college in 1938 as a second lieutenant. There was a building up of the career and the trusted followers that took him to the top in Cairo and cast his long shadow across the whole of the Middle East.

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Increased Social Security Forecast

SPOKANE (AP) — A prediction that Congress will increase social security payments by 10 per cent was made Tuesday before the Washington State Labor Council convention.

Nelson Cruikshank, Washington, D.C., director of the AFL-CIO social security department, said he thought Congress would also authorize studies on future increases and on meeting health costs for the aged.

Cruikshank was the principal speaker during the third day of the first annual convention of the council.

The House Ways and Means Committee is now considering a bill to increase payments to 11 million recipients of old age and survivors insurance by 10 per cent and by a total of 30 per cent over the next 8 years, he said.

Cruikshank told delegates that Washington has the lowest weekly unemployment compensation benefits in the Pacific Northwest. The state's average payment is \$50.50 a week, compared to \$55.50 for Idaho and \$54.86 for Oregon, he said.

Admiral Has No Plans For Offensive Operations

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Pentagon spokesman said Wednesday Adm. James H. Holloway has "no plan to conduct offensive operations" against rebellious forces in Lebanon. Holloway commands U.S. forces in the Middle East.

The spokesman said the mission of the U.S. landing force is "merely to protect government installations and so far there has been no opposition by rebel forces."

In a briefing for newsmen, he also said that everybody concerned in the operation from Holloway down to the lowest-ranking private has been thoroughly indoctrinated in the understanding that "we are not in an invasion; we are going into a friendly country to protect a friendly, pro-Western government."

This Miss Maryland Definitely Not Married

BALTIMORE (AP) — Carrying an affidavit swearing that she never has been married, Patricia Marie Vogts leaves today "to right the wrong done Maryland" in last year's Miss Universe contest.

Miss Vogts, an eye-appealing 22-year-old nurse, will appear as Miss Maryland in the annual Miss United States beauty pageant opening Saturday at Long Beach, Calif. "I want to win especially because of what happened in the contest last year," Miss Vogts said.

Mary Leona Gage, then Miss Maryland, was selected as Miss United States. But the title was taken away and she was disqualified from the ensuing Miss Universe competition because she was married.
