Dispute To Delay WCA From Using F27 Turbo Props

SEATTLE (AP) — West Coast Airlines said Wednesday a contract dispute with its pilots will delay putting new F27 turbo-prop transports into service as scheduled Sept. 1.

West Coast said all of the nearly 100 pilots must be checked out in the F27s and familiarized themselves with operations of the new planes on WCA routes serving 44 Washington, Oregon and Idaho cities.

The airline has six F27s on order and recently took delivery of the first one at Hagerstown, Md. A West Coast spokesman said rumors the line may cancel its order or postpone acceptance of the planes are false. He said WCA is taking delivery but will not fly the new two-engine ships west until the pilots' dispute is settled.

The National Mediation Board proposed Tuesday that the deadlock between WCA and the Air Force Pilots' Assn. be submitted to arbitration. Neither side has answered the proposal.

20 More Commercial Jet Airlines

SEATTLE (AP) — Sale of 20 more commercial jet airlines was announced Wednesday by the Boeing Airplane Co., bringing the total number of long-range 707s and medium-range 720s on order to 187.

Boeing did not disclose who had bought the 20 additional planes or the types. The report they had been sold was contained in a debenture offering of \$70,587,000 in two debenture issues.

The 20 planes will cost from 70 million to more than 100 million dollars, depending on their type. The sale boosted Boeing's jet transport backlog to more than 900 million dollars.

Bend Firm Submits Low Bid For Access Road

PORTLAND (AP) — A Bend firm this week submitted the low bid for access road and right of way work on a section of the Cougar Dam-Eugene 115,000-volt transmission line.

The Bonneville Power Administration said Murray Brothers Construction Co. submitted a \$120,109 bid for the work on the 17-mile Finn Rock-Leaburg section.

The section will carry Lane County Electric Cooperative power to the McKenzie River area.

Moslem Leaders Thank President

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — Leaders of three Moslem nations wound up an emergency meeting here Wednesday after eabling President Eisenhower their thanks for American intervention in Lebanon.

The chiefs of state of Turkey, Iran and Pakistan had talked for two days on the Middle East crisis and the future of their Baghdad Pact, joined by the pro-Nasser coup in Iraq, only Arab pact member. Britain is the fifth member of the pact.

The Shah of Iran, President Istandar Mirza of Pakistan and President Celal Bayer of Turkey sent a cable to Eisenhower expressing their thanks and satisfaction for the Marine landing in Lebanon.

The Moslem chiefs arrived here Monday two hours after news of the overthrow of their old ally, Premier Nuri Said and the regime of King Faisal of Iraq. The Iraqi leaders were trapped by the revolt an hour before their scheduled takeoff to attend the pact meeting in Ankara.

FORCE DEPARTS

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department announced this week the departure of a striking force from the Tactical Air Command to an undisclosed overseas destination.

Atlantic Fleet Forming Fast Landing Force

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — The Norfolk Ledger-Star said Wednesday the Atlantic Fleet is forming a fast landing force to carry additional Marines to the Mediterranean.

A fleet spokesman said he could not confirm or deny the report. Troops and helicopters of the Fleet Marine force will be loaded Wednesday aboard the aircraft carrier Anietam, the newspaper said. The carrier will join ships of the Atlantic amphibious force.

Atlantic Fleet headquarters reportedly moved to organize an additional antisubmarine hunter-killer force as a defense against submarines, the newspaper said. This would be composed of the carrier Tarawa and a number of Norfolk-based destroyers. Tuesday the Atlantic Fleet was placed on a four-hour alert.
