\$5,609,820 Will Be Needed To Run Douglas County's Schools During 1958-59

Douglas County's 26 school districts will require \$5.6 million dollars in tax money for the coming 1958-59 school year, County Assessor Morris C. Bowker announced today.

School levies for the next tax rolls, certified by the various school district boards, total \$5,609,820, the assessor said.

"However, this amount has been reduced by \$235,686 from the state property tax relief provision in basic school fund apportionment," Bowker explained.

Levies required to meet this bill will be up \$45,953 from last year.

Adams Alleged Intervention To Be Probed

WASHINGTON (AP) — A second investigation will begin Monday into alleged intervention by presidential assistant Sherman Adams in government agency affairs.

Chairman F. Edward Hebert (D-La.) announced Friday the House Armed Services Investigation's subcommittee will begin hearings behind closed doors Monday on the settlement of a penalty against Rayline Worstel, Inc., Manchester, N.H., for late performance on an Army cloth contract.

Adams has not been subpoenaed or invited to testify. But Hebert said the committee will be happy to hear Adams if he wishes to testify.

Penalty Reduced

A penalty, dating back to World War II years, of approximately \$80,000 against Rayline was reduced by about half some 12 years later. The former president of the now-defunct company has said some letters were written to him about the case, but that the settlement involved no pressure or political influence on the part of anyone.

The White House has said Adams did no more than routinely refer questions and replies about the status of the case.

Rep. Owen Harris (D-Ark.) called the Rayline case to the attention of Hebert's committee. Harris described it as a case of political influence.

Harris heads the special House subcommittee conducting investigations of relations between Adams and Boston industrialist Bernard Goldfine.

The Harris subcommittee intends to do some further digging into Goldfine's relations with federal agencies, but the members indicated they see no reason to recall Adams as a witness.

Disorderly Conduct Fine Levied Following Trial

Municipal Judge Randolph Sloan fined John Dennis Helsner, 19, of 1302 Mill St. \$35 Thursday after finding him guilty of disorderly conduct. Trial was without a jury.

Helsner was arrested by city police on June 9 in downtown Roseburg. A second charge, illegal possession of liquor by a minor, was dismissed by the judge.

Gary Richard Garner, who gave a local hotel as his address, was arraigned and pleaded guilty to driving a vehicle while his operator's license was suspended. He was fined \$25 by Judge Sloan and given a five-day jail sentence.

Henry George Broughton of Riddle forfeited \$10 bail when he failed to appear for arraignment on a charge of driving the wrong way on a one-way street. He was cited here Tuesday.

Douglas Co. Democrats To Be At State Session

Ted Mouche, chairman of the Douglas County Democratic Central Committee, and Mrs. Robert Dorsey, vice-chairman, will take part in the election of state party officers Sunday in Portland.

Dave Epps, state chairman, is the only announced candidate for that post. State Rep. Beulah Hand of Clackamas County is seeking to succeed Mrs. Edna Seales, Sandy, as vice-chairman. Mrs. Seales is not seeking re-election.

The treasurer post is contested, with Martin A. Fitzgerald of Portland and Mrs. Irma Lindquist of Salem vying for the office. Incumbent Lloyd Rea, Baker, is the only announced candidate for secretary.

Accompanying the Douglas delegates to the session will be Mrs. Mouche and Mr. and Mrs. Al Roll of Roseburg.

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UAR Says U.S. Poses Threat In Near East

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)

The United Arab Republic said Friday the United States had threatened it with direct action if U.S. Marines in Lebanon are attacked by troops under U.A.R. control.

Ambassador Omar Loutfi, the U.A.R. delegate, said the threat was made earlier this week by U.S. Ambassador Raymond Hare in Cairo. He said Hare had declared the Marines would reply if they are attacked.

"What is important," Loutfi said, "is that the United States wishes to be the arbiter of what forces are under our control. This inherent threat is fraught with great consequences."

Loutfi spoke as the U. N. Security Council neared a vote on a series of proposals for action in the Middle East crisis. Just as a vote appeared imminent, the council adjourned until afternoon.

Direct Threat

Soviet Delegate Arkady A. Sobolev said he considered the U.S. diplomatic warning to President Nasser's government as a direct threat of action.

The council cannot sit in silence in the face of such a threat, Sobolev said. He declared the threat must be met by an immediate vote on a Soviet demand for the withdrawal of U.S. forces from Lebanon and British forces from Jordan.

Sobolev insisted on top priority for the Soviet resolution at the afternoon session. U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge previously had urged the council to vote first on an American plan for a U.N. army to replace the U.S. Marines.

Meanwhile, delegates expected that the council might be powerless to act and that an emergency session of the General Assembly would be called.

Defendant Wins Traffic Violation Trial Verdict

A district court jury of six found Carl Douglas Wood, 41, of 1061 NW Keasey Rd., Roseburg, innocent of a traffic law violation Thursday afternoon.

He had been cited by state police for failing to stop at a stop sign at the intersection of Highway 99, access road and Garden Valley Rd. on June 6.

Arraigned before Judge Warren A. Woodruff, Wood entered a plea of innocent and asked for a jury trial. Bail was then set at \$15 and the trial date for July 17.

Wood, who runs a cleaning establishment in Roseburg, told the jury he made a stop "eight to ten feet" before reaching the intersection. Two state policemen said he didn't.

The case cost the county more than \$100. Twelve jurors summoned received \$90 plus mileage to court, and the trial took nearly a half day of time from the district attorney, Judge Woodruff and a clerk, and two state police officers.

Mrs. Hilko's husband Peter is a New York fireman. The mother and daughter, vacationing on this island 15 miles at sea, had planned to return to New York today.

Norman Sacks, also of Brooklyn, brother of Mrs. Hilko, said Tina fell from some rocks as the party was viewing the surf.

Youth Held Following Threat To Airliner

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — A 19-year-old youth was arrested here Friday shortly after an airliner bound for the West Coast with 81 persons aboard turned back upon receiving word a bomb had been placed aboard the craft.

No bomb was found and the American Airlines flight was resumed after a two-hour delay.

Robert Keith, who recently came here from Tulsa, Okla., was arrested. Police said he signed a statement admitting he falsely reported a bomb had been placed aboard the airliner.

U. S. Embassy's Windows Broken As 100,000 Reds Demonstrate In Moscow

MOSCOW (AP) — A rowdy and raucous mob of more than 100,000 Russians smashed at least 275 windows in the U.S. Embassy here Friday and stained the building with blue and green ink, hurled bottles.

The demonstration, the second in as many days protesting the landing of U.S. Marines in Lebanon, was televised live on the Moscow television network.

At 6:30 p.m., more than three hours after Friday's demonstration began, Soviet troops and militiamen were beamed up to a force of 1,000 and began a determined effort to break up the crowd.

An army general and a militia general directed the operations, with the help of prowl radio cars.

US Placards

Several demonstrators turned their placards into brooms and started heaping the debris of stones, bricks, sticks and posters.

Coon Creek Men Vote To Withdraw From LSWU Local

A small lumber mill located north of Roseburg has voted to drop an eight-year affiliation with Lumber & Sawmill Workers Union Local 2949, A.F. of L. & CIO.

C. A. Johnson, manager of Coon Creek Lumber Co., 1767 NE Portland Rd., announced Thursday that employees voted recently to drop the affiliation. The vote, as certified this week by the National Labor Relations Board, was 22-17.

Johnson said employees at the plant had been exclusively affiliated with the union since 1950. The NLRB vote at the plant occurred about two weeks ago but results were not tabulated and returned by the NLRB until this week.

Coon Creek Lumber is a division of Western Battery Separator Co. In order to retain affiliation with the union, employees would have had to cast a majority vote in favor of retention. The NLRB certification said the majority of ballots were not cast for any labor organization on the ballot, and that "no such organization (henceforth) is the exclusive representative of all the employees (at the plant)."

The certification was signed by Robert J. Wiener, officer in charge of the Portland NLRB office. Forty-three employees were eligible to vote and 39 cast ballots.

House Passes Bill Giving States More Rights

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House passed a bill Thursday designed to give states greater leeway to legislate in fields also covered by federal law.

The bill passed 240-155. The bill, which faces an uncertain fate in the Senate, was aimed at countering Supreme Court doctrine in recent rulings that federal law pre-empts operation of state laws in some matters.

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City Police Jail Wolf Creek Man, Youths In Chase

Roseburg police jailed a 22-year-old Wolf Creek man and three juvenile companions, ages 14, 15 and 16, early today after a wild chase through the downtown area.

They had booked Gerald D. Wolleat on two charges, larceny from a vehicle and contributing to the delinquency of minors. The quartet allegedly stole several car accessories from vehicles parked in a used car lot, police reported.

The three teen-agers were placed in county jail, cited for violation of the city's curfew law. They were arrested between midnight and 1 a.m. today after splitting up and running from investigating officers.

Wolleat was chased through downtown streets and finally apprehended in a parking lot at SE Oak Avenue and Stephens Street. The 15-year-old boy was followed and arrested hiding in some bushes on the Junior High School grounds. The two others were located hiding in a service station wash room on SE Stephens Street.

Wolleat admitted to purchasing beer for the boys. The stolen property was found in his 1953 sedan parked in the lot west of SE Stephens St. His youthful companions gave their addresses as Wolf Creek and Sunny Valley.

OAKLAND MAN INJURED

Thomas Traylor, 40, of Oakland is reported in good condition today at Douglas Community Hospital after he was admitted Thursday afternoon after suffering a lacerated leg. Traylor, a self-employed logger, was cutting limbs off a tree when the accident happened.

Little Hope Seen For Freeing Iraq From New Rulers

WASHINGTON (AP) — British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd resumed his momentous U. S. talks Friday amid increasing indications the West may have to learn to live with the new revolutionary regime in Iraq.

Lloyd, conferred at the state department with Secretary Dulles. The British official had no comment afterward to a variety of questions put to him by reporters. He did say he would confer again with Dulles later in the day.

The White House announced "close identity of views" was achieved in yesterday's marathon consultation. But behind the scenes officials painted a bleak picture of the West's chances of ousting the revolutionaries who seized control of oil-rich Iraq Monday.

It was this, said Eisenhower, which galled him into sending 5,000 Marines to Lebanon, where the pro-West regime has been battling rebels since mid-May. Britain ascribed the same motivation to its dispatch of 2,000 paratroopers to Jordan yesterday.

Eisenhower, with full British support for his action, denounced the Iraq rebels as ruthless murderers attacking a lawful government.

There was no sign, however, of any U.S.-British decision on what to do about Iraq. This, and the burning peace-or-war question of how the Soviet Union would react to any new Western gambit, were reported to be the basic issues under study by Eisenhower, Dulles, Lloyd and their advisers.

Also elected were Gil E. Commons, treasurer, and Helen Salas, secretary.

Woodruff appointed the following service chairman: Mrs. Al May, volunteers chairman; Mrs. Arthur Clarke, home service; William Irwin, first aid; Howard Martin, home nursing; Mrs. Albert Morene, Junior Red Cross; Mrs. Walter Britt, blood program; Mrs. Roy Bradley, canteen, and Mrs. Robert O'Neill, veterans hospital delegate.

Gen. Curtis T. Beecher, Red Cross director for the county, said analysis and discussion of county financial problems followed the election.

Gene Slick, assistant administrator of the Portland regional blood center, reported briefly on the operation of the "Baby River" bloodmobile in Douglas County. He termed the county campaign a success.

Refreshments were served by Mrs. Bradley.

Norwegian Freighter Picks Up Downed Airmen

SANTA MARIA AIRFIELD, Azores (AP) — A Norwegian freighter reported Friday she has picked up two American airmen whose B-29 jet bomber crashed in the Atlantic off the Azores. The third crew member was sighted on a raft and a Portuguese patrol ship directed to the scene.

The Defense Department said the identities of the rescued men had not been determined. A spokesman said they were in good shape.

FIREMEN CALLED

Talks Go On As U. S. Pours More Troops Into Lebanon; Red Retaliation Forecast

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The Soviet Union announced Friday a Khrushchev - Nasser conference and served warning it will not remain indifferent in the Middle East crisis.

The Kremlin accused the United States and Britain of "acts of unprovoked aggression" against Lebanon and Jordan — ignoring the fact their chiefs of state asked the two powers to send in troops.

It said the Soviet Union will "have to take the necessary measures" dictated by its security and the preservation of general peace.

This statement came almost simultaneously with Moscow's first acknowledgement that Premier Khrushchev and President Nasser of the United Arab Republic (Egypt and Syria) had met in Moscow this week. Cairo and Damascus earlier reported the meeting.

London diplomats speculated that the two leaders talked of a possible move of Soviet troops into Syria.

Cairo reported that Nasser talked eight hours with Khrushchev Thursday in Moscow. The secret meeting followed Nasser's eight-day meeting with President Tito of Yugoslavia, who like Nasser is due home Saturday after talks in Syria which could give him the chance to pin down operations details.

More Troops Moved In

The British and American build-up continued, with additional Marines pouring into Lebanon Friday. More British forces were alerted to go into Jordan. The prospect was that the two allies would have more than 10,000 troops in the Mideast by the weekend, with many more thousands of men lying offshore in the U. S. 6th Fleet and British war vessels.

A force of about 1,200 Marines landed at Beirut Airport and another 1,700 came ashore as new units of the powerful U. S. 6th Fleet arrived. This brought the total of leathernecks in and around Beirut to 6,300.

The Soviet Union seemed to be building toward some sort of dramatic action. A crowd of 100,000 demonstrated at the U. S. Embassy in Moscow, broke windows and pelted the building with ink. It was the second straight day of Moscow demonstrations—the sort of thing that is well organized in Moscow and often is part of a campaign to make Russian minds acknowledge the need of new sacrifices.

Russian guns were roaring in large-scale maneuvers just across the border from Iran. A reporter at the scene said many types of planes were participating and the noise of guns left many frontier Iranians sleepless.

U.N. Fails At Solution

The United Nations, meanwhile was moving to find some sort of solution in the Mideast crisis—with little prospect of a compromise that would meet success. Some of the United States' usual supporters were lukewarm to American actions.

The Marines who came ashore in Lebanon Friday landed four miles north of Beirut.

This brought the total of U. S. Marines in Lebanon to about 5,100. About 2,000 U. S. paratroopers are nearby in Turkey and Britain completed the landing of 2,000 paratroopers in Jordan. New warship arrivals swelled the total of U. S. 6th Fleet units in Lebanese waters to 49.

An advance party of U. S. paratroopers arrived in Beirut to scout the territory patrolled by the Marines before taking over from the Leathernecks.

Crimp In U.S. Plans

While the British and Americans rushed their buildup in the Mideast, Saudi Arabia put a crimp in U. S. plans to fly tanker planes loaded with oil from Bahrain to Jordan.

U. S. Embassy sources in Amman said Saudi Arabia—which has been on the sidelines in this latest crisis—refused permission for the tankers to fly over Saudi Arabia from the Persian Gulf. This is the fastest and only direct route.

The oil, badly needed by Jordan, as well as by British forces there, presumably will have to go by ship. That means a slow and circuitous voyage around the Arabian peninsula and up the gulf of Aqaba to South Jordan's port.

The Leathernecks' reinforcement came ashore at 9 a. m. under the command of Lt. Col. John H. Brickley of Billings, Mont.

The landings were made from five amphibious ships, the Mount McKinley, the amphibious force flagship, the attack transports Trombley and Annapolis, a beaching ship Spiegel Grove and the cargo ship Mulphren.

Stay For Present

An American official said the Marines would stay for the present in the immediate area of the landing and awaiting a boat to head there. Cover planes came from the carrier Saratoga off the Lebanese coast.

U. S. combat planes streamed into the Adana staging base in Southern Turkey.

Other striking forces were being rushed to the Mediterranean by the British to move on a moment's notice if needed.

Crack British guardsmen—Irish, Welsh and Grenadiers—who have been policing Cyprus were alerted to be flown to any new trouble spot. Troops of the 1st Infantry Brigade in battle dress were flown Friday morning from Britain in a dozen chartered airlines bound for Cyprus.

A Defense Ministry spokesman in London said their immediate mission would be to take over internal security duties in the Crown Colony from the famed Red Devil paratroopers sent to Jordan.

The giant British aircraft carrier Eagle was due in waters between Cyprus and Lebanon.

The advance party of U. S. paratroopers from Turkey comprised 20 men headed by Col. Charles Pardale of Quincy, Mass. Pardale said he did not know when the 2,000-man task force of the 24th Division, flown to Turkey this week from Western Germany, would take over from the Marines.

Forest Service Sates Conference On Sales

PORTLAND (AP)—The U. S. Forest Service scheduled a press conference here late Friday to answer criticism of its timber sale policies.

Regional forester Herbert Stone said he would attempt to reply to critics who charged that sales are far behind the cut authorized for federal timber in the Northwest.

The Western Federation of Forest Industries recently told Congress that sales also are far below the sale forecast made by the Forest Service at the beginning of each year.

Main critics of the policy are those mills and logging companies which depend mainly on federal timber for their raw material.
