

WOMAN WRITER DIES

TORONTO (AP) — Dr. Marion Hilliard, 56, author of the best seller "A Woman Doctor Looks at Love and Life," died Tuesday night.

Dr. Hilliard for 10 years was chief of obstetrics and gynecology at Women's College Hospital. She retired a year ago and had been seriously ill with a lung ailment, suspected to be cancer.

BALDOCK NOT IN IRAQ

PORTLAND (AP) — A former Oregon state highway engineer apparently left Iraq shortly before a revolution flared this week in the Middle East nation.

Associates here of R. H. Baldock said they heard he and his wife left Iraq July 2 for a tour of Asia.

Baldock resigned his state post two years ago to become chief of a highway mission in Iraq.

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Neuberger Proposes Committee On Relations

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore) offered a resolution Thursday to create a joint Senate-House committee on Canadian-United States relations.

Neuberger said its purpose was to carry out the U. S. part of a suggestion of Canadian Prime Minister John Diefenbaker for establishment of U. S. and Canadian parliamentary committees to help improve relations between the two countries.

In a speech prepared for the Senate, Neuberger said problems affecting the two countries "go far beyond technical, diplomatic relations such as we have with other countries." He cited questions concerning joint development of boundary waters of the Columbia River Basin and his own recent proposal for a \$0.50 cost sharing with Canada of construction costs of paving the Alaska Highway.

Floodwaters Ravage Kansas, Missouri Areas

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Floodwaters from three rivers and nine smaller streams, swollen by heavy rains, covered large areas of eastern Kansas and northwestern Missouri today, causing millions of dollars in damage.

Most of the damage was to the promising young corn crop. The water has spread into only one large town, Fort Scott, Kan. But the overflow from Missouri's Grand River lapped at the edge of Chillicothe, two miles east of the river channel.

Rain has fallen in the two areas for the past two days, and the forecast for today and tomorrow is for still more rain. The Weather Bureau said the downpours were caused by a cold front which stalled over southern Kansas and Missouri.

Tax Commission Told Timber Valuations Low

SALEM (AP) — The state Tax Commission was told Wednesday that its timber valuations are "extremely conservative."

The testimony was given by Wallace Eubanks, tax commission timber appraiser, at the fifth of a series of hearings on timber tax evaluation disputes.

Eubanks said the commission's valuations are conservative in relation to private sale values. In making the valuations, he added, the valuation division uses figures of private timber sales, as well as those of federal timber sales.

Nobody Worries About Russian Threat In Turkey

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — "Nobody worries about the Russian threat."

That headline in the pro-government newspaper Havadis reflected the mood of Turkey Friday as the Soviet Union began its highly advertised maneuvers on Turkey's borders.

Government officials said things looked normal.

Men in the street swapped rumors with their usual zeal and said it's just like old times.

There undoubtedly was a little tension in the air — but more among the foreign colony than the Turks.

Havadis pointed out the Russians usually do not announce maneuvers in advance, but this time Tass, the official Soviet news agency, took the trouble to do so.

"Thus they obviously have some special purpose in such an announcement," said Havadis. "and one is to apply political pressures."

"Maneuvers are far from being the question for Ankara to worry about. Here we have strong nerves."

The influential Cumhuriyet said Russia would cause World War III by trying to send troops to the Middle East through Turkey or Iran.

"The chances of the Kremlin decided for war are very dim," the newspaper declared.

Building Permits Valuation Rises During June

Valuation of building permits in Roseburg last month showed an increase of 135 per cent over the figure for June of 1957 in keeping with an upward state-wide trend.

The total valuation jumped from \$44,530 in June of 1957 to \$104,574 last month, reported the Equitable Savings & Loan Assn., which released monthly figures.

Total valuation was down from May, however. The May figure was \$135,886.

Meanwhile, valuation of dwelling permits jumped nine per cent from June of last year — from \$37,200 to \$40,500. But dwelling permit valuation was down 38 per cent from May, when the figure was \$65,160.

Douglas County's total permits valuation was down from \$369,885 in 1957 to \$281,108 in 1958. The figure for May was \$102,723. Valuation of dwelling permits in the county was \$91,816 in June of 1957. Total valuation for permits in Oregon's 24 major cities rose 84 per cent from June, 1957 to last month and were up 20 per cent from May. The figures were \$7,554,905 for June, 1957, \$11,568,307 for May and \$13,908,264 for June.

Dwelling permits for the state were up 22 per cent from 1957 and were about the same as in May of this year. The June, 1958 figure was \$2,673,484. In June of 1957, the valuation was \$2,198,360.

JUSTICE'S DAUGHTER DIES

PORTLAND (AP) — Mrs. May McBride Newton, daughter of the late Thomas A. McBride, longtime Oregon Supreme Court justice, died here Wednesday.

She was born in Salt Lake City and grew up in Oregon City, where her father was circuit judge before being named to the Supreme Court. She later lived at Deer Island and in Portland.

Mrs. Newton's brother was the late George M. McBride, Portland attorney and painter.
