Buddy Bomar of Chicago, former national match game singles and team titleholder and twice winner of the national doubles crown will show Roseburg fans the type of bowling that has led him to numerous championships when he makes a personal appearance Saturday at the Roseburg Bowl.

Bomar has garnered many titles and has been consistently at the top of the bowling heap for the past ten years. Recently he notched his eighty-ninth 300 game.

In 1950-51, Bomar captured the national match game doubles crown for the second time. He holds the highest individual average for the doubles competition with a 216 average.

Fans in this area will witness the delivery which has carried him to the scoring heights. His record shows his eighty-nine 300 games, and he boasts numerous games of 299 and 298.

The sizzling battle for top spot in the Northwest League was cooled off Thursday night when rain and high winds forced cancellation of the game between the league-leading Yakima Bears and the Lewiston Braves.

Eugene took advantage of the situation and picked up half-a-game by shutting out Salem, 4-0, while the Tri-City Braves whacked their way into a tie with Wenatchee for fourth place by downing the Chiefs, 8-2.

Carl Hutzler was the big man with the bat for Eugene. He opened the second with a single, doubled for the Emeralds in the third, stole second and scored on a passed ball.

Salem got four hits off right-hander Bob Wales but couldn't place them where they counted. The victory was Wales' third in seven starts and gave the emeralds the series 2-1.

For the second night in a row the Tri-City Braves managed to stack up eight runs off Wenatchee. Three of them came in the first inning when Ray Looney whopped out a home run.

The batters were more inclined to call the pitchers rather than the umpires blind-six of the woodsmen were hit during the contest.

Two hit batters, however, gave the Chiefs their first run in the single and two nicked batters. The erratic pitching brought in Joe Dwyer who was credited with the eventual win, giving him an 8-3 record for the season.

The shift is on Friday night with Salem moving to Kennewick, Lewiston traveling to Wenatchee and Eugene taking on the league-leading Bears at Yakima.

Seattle batters collected 22 hits off a string of Portland pitchers as the Rainiers defeated the Beavers 19-4 in Thursday night's Pacific Coast League baseball game.

Seattle pitcher Max Surkont, who was replaced only in the final inning, gave up only six hits. One of them was a bases-empty homer into the left field stands.

In the eighth inning, Portland scored three more runs, but by that time, the Beavers were hopelessly behind 16-4.

Infielder Hal Bevan led Seattle's batting. He had a bases-loaded homer in the second and another with no one on—in the eighth. He also batted in Seattle's initial run in the first inning.

In other games, Vancouver edged Phoenix 4-3, aided by Charley White's grand slam homer. First place San Diego defeated Salt Lake City 5-3 and the Spokane Indians ended a five-game losing streak with a 5-4 decision over Sacramento.

Vans Spot Lead
The Mounties spotted Phoenix a 3-0 lead after two innings and the score stayed that way until White unloaded his game-winning homer in the sixth off Curt Barclay. Singles by Joe Frazier and Ray Barker and a walk loaded the bases before White stepped to the plate.

Art Ceccarelli started for the Mounties, but he lasted only for one and two-thirds innings. Mel Held came in to relieve Ceccarelli and gained credit for the victory.

The Padres and the Bees went into the 10th tied 3-3. In their half of the 10th, the Pads loaded up the bases on a single, a sacrifice, an error and a hit batsman. Larry Raines then stepped to the plate and poked out a two-run double.

The Bees got single runs in the fourth, fifth and sixth, only to have the Padres tie it up with one run in the eighth and two in the ninth. Salt Lake City's No. 2 and No. 3 runs came on solo homers by Ken Toothman and R.C. Stevens.

Suds Rump In 2nd
The Rainiers got one run in the first frame and then splashed for eight in the second, four of them coming on Hal Bevan's bases-Rainiers shoved across four more one and two-thirds innings. Mel in the third, three in the eighth and three in the ninth.

Norm Sherry scored the winning run for Spokane in the ninth inning. He doubled, moved up on a throwing error and coasted in on Jim Williams' sharp single to centerfield.

The Solons splurged for three of their four runs in the eighth inning on three singles and a walk. Jim Baxes gave the Indians their first run in 36 innings of play when he poked out a homer in the fifth frame.

Braves Cop 4th Straight; Hot McLish Wins Again

Spitball Tag Again Placed On Burdette

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The somewhat tarnished fortunes of the Milwaukee Braves, fighting each day to remain first in the National League, may be on the upswing — the opposition is again tossing spitball charges at Lew Burdette.

"He throws it all the time," charged Cardinal Manager Fred Hutchinson Thursday after the three-game series with St. Louis and their fourth straight triumph. The decision also kept the Braves a half game in front of San Francisco's Giants.

Burdette claimed the latest victory with a neat three-hit, five-inning relief performance, and Hutchinson continued the discussion of the right-hander's pitching saying: "There's nothing you can do about it. He's got a clean bill of health from the league President Warren Giles and the umpires."

"He threw a lot of them today." The first big protest about Burdette's pitching came from the Dodgers as the Braves took 2 out of 3 in Los Angeles last week.

There was no comment from Burdette, but Milwaukee Manager Fred Haney had a few things to say about his world series hero.

"It's just terrific when a guy comes up to you and says, 'If you want me to crank up in the bullpen, I'm ready.' Burdette did that Wednesday night and he came to me again before today's game. And then they say we don't have any spirit on this ball club."

The names are different and some of the fessies may be lacking, but San Francisco has revived those late-inning thrillers that were such a big hit for the Giants in '51 and '54, their last pennant years.

The Giants, hanging in there, half a game behind Milwaukee in the National League race, have won 16 games in the last inning. That's a third of their 47 victories.

On their current home stand, they've won 9 of 12, winning 6 by one run and 5 of those with ninth-inning rallies.

They beat Philadelphia 8-7 with three in the ninth yesterday. Two came in on Orlando Cepeda's double, but the clincher came home on a bases-loaded wild pitch.

Milwaukee stayed a wink ahead of the Giants by giving the skidding St. Louis Cardinals another shove, 8-7, Cincinnati side-tracked the third-place Chicago Cubs 3-2. Los Angeles hammered Pittsburgh 5-3.

Yanks Nip Detroit

In the American League, the New York Yankees stayed 12 games ahead with a 4-2 decision over Detroit. Second-place Boston beat Kansas City 6-2. Baltimore

defeated the Chicago White Sox 3-0 on Billy O'Dell's nine-hitter and Cleveland defeated Washington 8-3.

The Giants, who stand 15-17 in one-run decisions, got rolling after the Phils broke a 5-5 tie with two runs in the ninth off reliever Don Johnson, called back to the majors from Toronto the night before. The Phils' ace reliever Dick Farrell, now 6-3, lost his second to the Giants with a couple of walks that Cepeda converted into runs, two more that loaded the bases and then an errant 1-2 pitch to pinch-hitter Hank Sauer.

Mary Grissom (6-3) won it for the Giants, who got home runs from Willie Kirkland and Leon Wagner. Harry Anderson hit a three-run homer for the sixth-place Phils.

Braves Cop 4th Straight
The Braves won their fourth in a row despite Stan Musial's two home runs, which scored five and pushed him past Lou Gehrig into the No. 2 spot behind Babe Ruth in the all-time extra-base hit list.

Del Crandall and Wes Covington homered for the Braves, who beat reliever Jim Brosnan (7-7) on Mel Roach's single in the seventh. Lew Burdette (9-7), working in relief, blanked the Cards on three hits for five innings.

The Redlegs, who had lost seven in a row in a plunger to seventh place, scored two on Frank Robinson's 11th homer, then got the winner on Roy McMillan's single, an error and an infield out. Joe Nuxhall (6-5) lasted through a 10-hit pitching job. Dave Hillman (2-1) lost it.

The Dodgers made it on homers by Gino Cimoli, Don Zimmer and Gil Hodges that scored all but one of their runs. Rookie Stan Williams won his sixth, but needed relief help after Hank Foiles' homer ended his shutout string at 19 innings in the seventh and Bob Clemente belted a two-run homer in the eighth. Rookie George Wilt (2-2) lost it.

Score, McLish Factors
If it hadn't been for Herb Score's arm trouble, the Cleveland Indians might, as Manager Joe Gordon contends, be second in the American League race.

As is, if it weren't for a guy with the improbable name of Calvin Coolidge McLish, the Indians would be dead last.

They're seventh now, only two games ahead of Washington. They've won only 7 of their last 15, and McLish was the winning pitcher in 5. And they've won but 3 of their last 10, with McLish, a 32-year-old right-hander who traveled the National League for years, bagging all three.

He won his fifth in a row last night, beating Washington with the home run help of Rocky Colavito and Minnie Minofo for an 8-5 record.

The Senators clipped McLish for eight hits, one Roy Sievers' two-run 24th homer that tied it 3-all in the fifth. But Minofo then belted his 12th home run with a man on in the seventh off loser Camilo Pascual, now 5-5.

Colavito drove in four runs with a pair of homers.
