Sports Scanton, Kerwin Square Off In Telecast Fight

NEW YORK (AP)— Irish fist fighters are few and far between these days. No John L. Sullivan, Mickey Walker or Jimmy McLarnin in the lot. Perhaps the best to come along in recent years is Bob Scanton, a handsome young lightweight who fights his first main event in Madison Square Garden tonight.

Scanton, only 22, never has lost a bout. He has won 28 and fought one draw in 29 professional starts. The draw was back in his days as a four-round midget boy and he evened the score with his opponent, Frankie Madison, next time they met.

Gale Kerwin, the gabby Canadian who tells you "I'm quite a puncher" is Scanton's opponent in the 10-round Garden match. There will be the usual network (NBC) radio and television coverage.

Although Scanton has been made favorite at 7 to 5 on his fine record, there is a chance they will go into the bout at even money. Kerwin might turn out to be the choice at ring time.

Kerwin has been seen locally against better than fair competition.

Kerwin has a 27-6 record for 34 starts. He has six knockouts and was stopped once.

Favorites Beaten In Portland Golf

PORTLAND (AP)—Quarterfinal rounds of the Portland Amateur Golf Tournament Thursday brought defeats to a pair of favorites.

Tab Boyer, who claims four city titles, was defeated by Chuck Hunter of Tacoma, 2 and 1.

Tom Liljeholm rubbed out Lou Stafford, 1933 champ, by a 4 and 3 margin.

Other quarter-final winners were Ad Hucyke, who beat George Gierich, 3 and 2, and Dick Stearns, who took a tight one from Tom Shaw, 1 up.

Hucyke will play Liljeholm in Friday's semi-finals and Stearns will meet Hunter.

There were no upsets in the women's competition.

Defending champion, Mrs. Dale Hills, edged Mrs. Les Kangas, 1 up. Mrs. Eric Barringer, the women's medalist, gained a 2 and 1 win over Mrs. Ben Dolp.

Another favorite, Elaine Porritt of Eugene, the 1937 runnerup, downed Joan Coffeen on the 19th hole.

Mrs. Ray Scott had no difficulty turning back Mrs. Naomi Borgsgaard 4 and 3.

Friday's rounds paired Mrs. Barringer vs. Mrs. Scott and Mrs. Porritt vs. Mrs. Hills in semifinals.

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Bill Rose Wins In NW Tennis

TACOMA (AP)— The Pacific Northwest Tennis tournament moved into the quarter-finals Friday minus a seeded men's singles player, the first to fall by the wayside since the championships began three days ago.

The victim in Thursday's third round was sixth-seeded Dick Moody of Los Angeles, who was beaten by unranked Harold Gray of Tacoma, 3-6, 6-2, 10-8.

First-ranked Bill Rose of Portland dropped a set but finally outlasted Seattle's Gary Linden, 8-6, 2-6, 7-5. Fifth-seeded Doyle Perkins of Seattle trounced Dan Lucy of San Francisco in the other three-set match, 1-6, 7-5, 6-2.

Second-seeded Jim Watson, San Francisco, beat Tim Carr, Los Angeles, 6-1, 6-0, third-ranked Glen Bassett, the 1936 titlist from Santa Monica, defeated Bentley Bill, La Jolla, 6-0, 6-1, and seventh-seeded Jim Jackson, Klamath Falls, trounced Erwin Douglas, Santa Rosa, 6-1, 6-4. Eighth-ranked George Conway, Santa Monica, trimmed Bob Kerr, Australia, 6-1, 7-5.

Conway is first-ranked in the junior men's singles and advanced in that division by beating Hill, 6-1, 6-2. Second-seeded Harry Doyle of Portland lost, however, to Ron Sandys, La Jolla, 7-5, 8-6.

In the women's singles, first-seeded Farel Footman, San Francisco, reached the semi-finals by defeating Yeomans, Los Angeles, 6-1, 6-2. She downed Mary Sher, Yakima, 6-0, 6-0, in the junior women's singles.

Second-seeded Barbara Brown, Los Angeles, trimmed Amy Yee, Seattle, 7-5, 6-4, in the women's singles and scored a 6-0, 6-2 victory over Susan Proctor, Los Angeles, in the junior women's singles.

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Administration Spokesman Says Proposed Subsidies For Minerals Are Too High

WASHINGTON (AP)—An administration spokesman said Thursday price supports in a Senate-passed minerals subsidy bill are too high.

Asst. Secretary of the Interior Royce A. Hardy testified at a House Interior subcommittee hearing on proposed mineral legislation.

The administration is proposing a price stabilization program under which the government would support prices for domestic lead, zinc, fluorospar and tungsten. The Senate bill hiked the recommended stabilization price and authorized a copper stockpile program.

Hardy said the department believes the increased prices for lead, zinc and fluorospar and the new tungsten provision contained in the Senate bill are not required for the stabilization objective.

Give Windfall
He said department officials believe the higher prices would give windfalls to big producers. The officials favor instead a bill sponsored by Rep. A. L. Miller (R-Neb) to provide incentive payments for certain minerals, he said.

However, Hardy said, the department is opposed to certain provisions of an omnibus mining bill offered by Rep. Clair Engle (D-Calif.), interior committee chairman.

One provision would set up a stabilization stockpile for mineral raw materials. This stockpile would, Hardy said, be disruptive of the mineral markets, and interpose the government between producers and consumers, thereby materially changing the pattern of mineral production, processing and use as we have known it in the United States.

Hartung Protests Klamath Indian Bill Amendment

PORTLAND (AP)—The president of the International Woodworkers of America joined Wednesday in protests against an amendment proposed for the Klamath Termination Act.

The union head, Al F. Hartung, said he sent a telegram to House Speaker Sam Rayburn urging defeat of the amendment proposed in the Interior Committee.

Gov. Holmes and others also have protested.

Hartung's wire said: "This amendment, if allowed to stand, will completely emasculate the tremendous stand of pine timber in southern Oregon and northern California and permit clear cutting and resultant destruction of watersheds upon which large areas in both states depend for water and flood control."

"It will adversely affect the economy of the entire Klamath Basin and make destitute many towns and cities whose economic life is tied to the lumber industry and whose demise is certain if clear cutting is permitted. Land on which this fine pine timber grows is not fit for any other growth, thus it is imperative that a sustained yield program, as provided in the Senate bill be maintained."

"If Congress allows amendments to Senate Bill 3051 to stand, they will be taking the responsibility for the complete economic destruction of the last great stand of timber in America and for the creation of an economic ghost area to rival the worst of the dust bowls. Please exert every effort to prevent passage of these unwise amendments."

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
