

Roseburg Clouts Medford 8-4, For 15th Straight Win

The Roseburg Legion juniors kept that win streak alive Friday night at Stewart Field.

A 8-4 win over the Medford Legion club raised the mark to 15 wins in a row, and the season record to 20-4.

Righthander Jerry Halladay picked up his third win of the year on a three-hitter. But he suffered a wildness spree in the seventh inning and was relieved by Bill Eswine. Until that time, Halladay had allowed just one run — that one on two singles in the fifth inning.

Bill Harper's club collected eight hits off Medford righthander Tom Lawrence, three of them of the extra-base variety. The last hit off Lawrence was in the sixth, when Don Wells blasted out his second homer of the year.

The Lockwood Motors nine opened the scoring with a pair of runs in the third.

Chuck Hiney led off the chapter with a walk. Then, with two away, Wes Young sent the first pitch by Lawrence to left field for a double and the first RBI. Mike Hatfield followed by also teeing off on the first offering for a single to left, scoring Young.

Hiney Gets RBI

In the fourth, the Lockwood club added another run, as Gene Wagner opened with a walk and was sacrificed along by Eswine. With two outs, Hiney hit the 1-2 pitch to right for a single scoring Wagner.

The Medford club scored in the fifth, on singles by left fielder George Ice and third baseman Bob Quinney and a walk to Lawrence. Ice scored the run on the base hit by Quinney.

In the bottom of the fifth, the Lockwood nine brought eight batters to the plate as four additional runs scored. Wells began the frame with a walk and with one away Hatfield collected his second single of the night. On the hit and run, Hatfield hit to right field with Wells going to third.

Livingston Bangs Double

It was at this point that John Livingston, who ended the night with 2-3, sent a well-hit double to left scoring Wells and advancing Hatfield to third. Hatfield scored the second tally of the inning as Wagner was safe on a fielder's choice. The play was made at the plate with Hatfield sliding in as catcher Bob Pond dropped the ball.

Eswine then kept the rally going as he dropped a single into short right with Livingston crossing the plate and Wagner advancing to third. Wagner scored as Mike Brundage was safe on a fielder's choice, with Eswine wiped out at second.

The Lockwood club added the eighth run in the sixth on short bases-empty homer, a solid smash to deep left field, the first Stewart Field round-tripper.

In the seventh inning, the Medford Legion nine began a defensive rally as Halladay gave free passes to the first four men. Eswine then came on and unfortunately hit the next batter, Quinney, on the 1-2 pitch. He then whiffed the next two batters and last man was retired Wells to Wagner.

North Bend Tonight

Tonight at Stewart Field, the Roseburg Legion team takes on the North Bend club in a single nine-inning non-counter. In a season opener for the two clubs, the teams split a doubleheader at North Bend, with Lockwood winning.

MC Club Hosts Springfield In Key Double Bill

The Myrtle Creek Junior Legion baseball team could give the Roseburg Legion team a big assist in the latter's drive for a District One title by downing Springfield Sunday.

Myrtle Creek and Springfield meet in a twin bill at Glendale, with the latter club needing two wins to keep pace with the Lockwood nine.

Bill George's team had another reason in mind for coming up with a win. The Winnetrou Ford team downed each of the clubs in the loop at least once and one of the wins over Springfield would cap off a somewhat dismal season on a better note.

For Lockwood, a win for Winnetrou means a clear title, and the fifth year in a row in the playoffs. If Springfield should take two against the Myrtle Creek club, the issue would be decided Wednesday night at Stewart Field.

George will use his two remaining chukkers in the double header Sunday. This will find Gene Morrison and Wes Davidson on the hill in the games. Morrison now has a 1-5 mark and Davidson is 3-5. Fourteen-year-old Larry Slay, southpaw, will be used in relief if needed.

Top Hurlers Set

At the same time, Bo Clingman will have his two top chukkers on the mound for the crucial tilts for Springfield. Rich Downs, with a record of 5-1, will work one of the contests and Don Johnson, with a 5-3 mark, the other.

In an earlier meeting between the teams, the Springfield club won two games at home, by scores of 6-3 and 2-1. In the first game of this double header, George lost the services of Troy Reynolds, a converted hurler. Reynolds injured his knee in the fourth frame of this game with Myrtle Creek leading, 3-0.

Springfield has dropped two games to Lockwood, one to Eugene and one game to Lowell for its four defeats in district play, with the eight wins coming on three with Eugene, three with Lowell and two with Myrtle Creek.

For Winnetrou, the four wins were over Lockwood, Eugene twice, and Lowell. The Myrtle Creek Legion nine has dropped games to Lockwood three times, Lowell three times, and Springfield and Eugene twice each.

Bat Order Listed

A tentative batting order for Springfield in the Winnetrou games will go as follows: Shortstop Jerry Hansen will lead-off, with left fielder Jim Walker batting second, or Jimmie Walker batting second, or Third baseman Doyle Satey will bat third, with catcher Ron Kelso in the cleanup spot.

Batting fifth and playing at first base will be Larry King, and in the number six spot will be right fielder Steve Clark. Next will be center fielder John Vance and in the eighth position second baseman Dave Hawkins. At the bottom of the order will be the pitchers, Downs and Johnson.

For the Myrtle Creek club, center fielder Dave Weakley will lead off and second baseman Bob Cavender will bat second. Third baseman Gregg Lindquist will bat third with shortstop Rod Trask in the cleanup spot. Morrison, playing in right field or pitching, will bat fifth, and catcher Ed Cearly will bat sixth.

First baseman Cliff Worley will be in the number seven slot with Davidson, either in left field or on the mound, batting eighth. In the ninth position will be either Dan Denney or Jack Ball playing in one of the outfield spots.

Ninth-Inning Hit Gives Bevos Victory; Vans Gain On Pads

Portland edged Seattle 7-6 in Friday night's Pacific Coast League baseball game. The winning run came in the ninth inning as Bob DiPietro singled in Dave Melton.

Seattle had scored three runs in the top of the ninth and tied the score 6-6. A home run by Phil Schartz and singles by Al Fedoroff and Hal Bevan featured the rally.

Portland made it 3-0 in the second inning after catcher Len Neal hit his first homer of the year. The Beavers made it 4-0 in the third when George Freese scored from third base when Eddie Basinski dropped a pop fly.

Melton had a two-run double in the sixth inning.

Mounts Win 5th In Row

In other games, the Vancouver Mounties made it five in a row as Erv Palica pitched four-hit ball and defeated the Phoenix Giants 1-0. Salt Lake City beat San Diego 8-3.

Plutka, who has lost six games, struck out nine and walked only one in beating Don Zanni, who gave up six hits while fanning five and walking three. Zanni is now 10-7.

Vancouver's lone run came in the second frame. Joe Frazier punched a single to centerfield and then made the circuit on Spider Jorgensen's double down the leftfield line.

R.C. Stevens, Salt Lake City's big first baseman, gave the Bees their victory over the Padres. Almost singlehandedly, he poked out a three-run homer off former major leaguer Bob Lemon in the fourth inning. He also got a two-run single in the third.

Lemon, tagged with his second loss, made starts in the PCL, was knocked off the mound in the fourth after giving up seven runs and eight hits. He walked five and struck out three.

Tribe Tallies

The Indians got all five of their runs in the fourth inning and all five tallies were unearned. With the bases loaded and two out, Glen Gorbous hit a bounce to first for what should have been an easy third out. But the ball went through to the outfield on an error and two runs scored.

Three more runs came in moments later when Jim Williams got heavy wood on one of Bud Watkins' offerings and drilled it over the leftfield barrier. Art Fowler went the distance for the Indians, giving up six hits. Watkins departed as the loser in the fifth frame.

Scanlon Wins In TV Ring Battle

NEW YORK (AP)—Undefeated and unranked Bobby Scanlon is after bigger game in the light-weight division. The classy San Franciscoan declared himself ready for ranking fighters after soundly drubbing taller and heavier Gale Kerwin in a television 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden last night.

So manager Art Benjamin promptly named Johnny Russo, Paolo Rosi, or Carlos Ortiz as possible opponents for Bobby's next shot. The three New Yorkers all are in the top ten of the 135-pound class.

Scanlon, a pro four years, has won 26 straight and is unbeaten in 31. Only a draw with Frankie Madison in his fifth scrap mars the record of the baby-faced blond. He beat Madison in a return bout.

The Buffalo-born Californian, just 22, is combining socking with schooling. He is a physical education major at City College of San Francisco.

Bobby gave away height (5-5 to 5-8), weight (134½ to 139½) and reach to Kerwin but carried the fight all the way to his range foe.

The quick-thinking collegian with the educated left dropped Kerwin in the second round for an eight-count with two rapid-fire left hooks to the jaw. And then he hurt Gale in the fourth and tenth with the same type of punches.

In addition, the fast-moving youngster scored with body blows in the rough battle, fought mainly at close quarters.

Both were warned several times for holding. Referee Art Mercante finally took the eighth round from Scanlon for "repeated holding." Kerwin also had been warned for butting and hitting on the break. In the tenth round he pushed Scanlon to the floor. It was no knockdown, of course.

PGA Field Bunched As 2nd Half Play Begins

HAVERHAW, Pa. (AP)—The Professional Golfers Assn. championship field moved past the halfway point today as closely bunched as a field of maiden two-year-olds dashing down the straightaway course at Belmont Park.

And the odds against any one player's winning the title were about as uncertain as in one of those celebrated racing scrambles.

Going into today's third round at the Llanerch Country Club, Jay Hebert and Dow Finsterwald, two golfers with special reasons for wanting to win this title, had their noses in front. That is, they were one stroke ahead of three of golf's toughest tournament competitors—Sam Snead, Julius Boros and Billy Casper—by the margin of 139 to 140.

Jay Hebert, who birdied the last four holes in a fiery attack on the shortened 35-35-70 par of the 6,727 yard Llanerch course, is the older brother of last year's winner, Lionel Hebert.

Jay Up on Brother

For the past year Jay, who never has won a major championship, has had to live to a certain extent in his brother's shadow. Finsterwald was the player Lionel beat in last year's final.

They had been one-two after the first round, Finsterwald leading with a 67. Jay Hebert birdied his way to a 71 yesterday and Dow caught up with birdies on the 16th and 18th holes for a 72. Only these two were able to break par for the first 36 holes over the narrow, unexpectedly rugged course.

In all, 13 players were clustered within four strokes of the lead at the start of the third round.

At 141, just two strokes off the lead, were the two outsiders. They were tiny Felice Torza of Aurora, Ill., who was runner-up in the 1953 PGA championship, and Bill Collins, an unemployed pro who has placed well occasionally during the winter tour.

SF Back In 1st; Cubs Win Again

The San Francisco Giants have moved back into the National League lead in what almost overnight has become a three-team race.

The Giants slipped into a half-game, 900 percentage point lead over Milwaukee by beating Pittsburgh 5-4 last night after the Chicago Cubs had knocked off the Braves 5-3.

The Cubs, winning six of their last seven and 10 of 13, are third, only three games behind. Everybody else is below .500, in a virtual tie for fourth place.

Cincinnati tied St. Louis for fifth, just a point behind Pittsburgh, by taking a two-night pair from the Cardinals 8-3 and 2-1. The Reds, Bucs and Cards all are seven games behind.

Then comes Philadelphia, 7½ games behind and just .004 percentage points ahead of last place Los Angeles after losing 8-6 to the Dodgers.

That leaves a spread of only .012 percentage points and one game over the last five clubs.

In the American League, Kansas City whittled New York's lead to 11 games, beating the Yankees 2-1 while second place Boston rapped Detroit 11-9. Cleveland beat Baltimore 5-1 and the Chicago White Sox defeated Washington 9-2.

Giants Hot

The Giants, who have won four in a row and seven of their last eight, moved back into the lead they held Sunday with four runs in the third and Stu Miller's clinching double in the fourth. Miller (3-4) had the Cubs buffaloed until the eighth, when three singles with two out scored their second run and brought on Marv Grissom.

Grissom saved it, but had his worries with two singles, a hit and a fly ball scoring two Pirate runs in the ninth.

Vern Law (8-8) lost it, giving up a two-run triple by Willie Mays in the big fourth, but only two of the Giants' five runs were earned.

The Cubs got their runs on homers. Walt Moryn's two-run shot in the eighth bagged it off Carl Willey, now 2-3 with his third consecutive defeat. Ernie Banks hit a three-run homer, his 25th, in the third, but the Braves, who had won four in a row, tied it on Hank Aaron's 10th homer in the sixth after Joe Adcock's 11th set off a two-run fifth. Unbeaten Johnny Briggs went all the way to win his fourth.

Newk Wins

Don Newcombe, whose only other victory this season also is over the Cards, gave up home runs by Pinch hitter Joe Taylor and Joe Cunningham, but hit a two-run homer, a double and a single himself while winning the opener. Walt Dropp's three-run double put it away in the sixth.

The Reds, just of a seven-game losing string, built a three-game winning streak on home runs by George Crowe and Frank Robinson in the nightcap.

The Dodgers won it in a six-run fifth inning with Steve Biko hitting a two - on homer. Don Zimmer also homered for the Dodgers, while Chico Fernandez and Ed Bouchee homered for the Phils, who have lost seven straight. Carl Erskine won it, Jack Sanford lost it, both in relief.

The Boston Red Sox and Detroit Tigers had it at last night, swatting 33 hits between them as Boston won on Frank Malzone's grand slam homer.

New York was beaten by Kansas City and Dick Tomanek, who went 1-2, and first baseman Joe Porter, who hit .321 last year for Tri-City.

Chicago beat Washington with Al Smith's slam and five RBIs backing up Early Wynn's four-hitter. Cleveland, 7-6 for the season against Baltimore, checked the Birds' bid for the first division.

The Red Sox, who have won five straight for a 3½ - game cushion over third place Detroit, collected 18 hits, five by Pete Runnels, who has three doubles and took the AL batting lead with a .334 average.

The A's, who had lost eight in a row to Don Larsen since 1954, beat the Yankee right-hander in the first two innings. Larsen (7-4) allowed only three hits the rest of the way. Tomanek (5-4) gave up 11 hits, but had a shut out until pinch hitter Yogi Berra's bad-hop single with two out in the ninth.

Wynn (9-8) fanned 11, passing the 100 mark for nine consecutive seasons, and had the Nats shut out until the eighth.

Southpaw Hal Woodeshick, whose other two major league starts and decisions resulted in defeats with Detroit in 1956, gained his first complete game with the seven - hitter for the Indians. Earl Averill, up from San Diego, with Woodeshick, hit a three-run homer off loser Chuck Beamon (0-3).

Lewiston's Broncs overwhelmed Wenatchee, 17-2, in Northwest League baseball action Friday night, but Yakima kept its half game league lead by shutting out Eugene, 9-0.

Tri-City, meantime, moved up to a tie for third place with a 6-3 pasting of Salem.

The Broncs' barrage served up 19 hits and bewildered three Wenatchee hurlers, including the Chiefs' ace, Claude Osteen.

Osteen was chased from the mound in the second inning after Lewiston had scored eight runs off him in the first two frames. It was the Wenatchee hurler's last game for the Chiefs. He left for the Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast League after posting a 14-4 NWL record.

Lewiston batted around in three big innings, scoring five in the first, six in the second and four in the eighth. Its other two runs came in the seventh frame.

Ted Rhodes and Roger Herrscher each got a homerun for the Broncs.

Yakima's Chuck Hickman scattered five hits to whitewash the Emeralds. The big 220 pounder whiffed nine Eugene batters and walked six to post his third victory against no defeats.

The Bears got all the runs they needed in the first stanza when they shoved four across on four singles, a hit batter, a walk and a ground out.

Rocky Colombo clouted a homer, his first of the season, in the fourth inning.

Salem got itself three new players Friday, including a pitcher, but it didn't help against Tri-City Friday night.

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
