The Myrtle Creek American Legion junior baseball team did the job Sunday afternoon.

It came up with a win over the Springfield club in a District One twin bill at Glendale. That one win gave the Roseburg juniors the 1958 district title.

Winetrot Ford traded shutouts with Springfield. Gene Morrison won the opener 2-0 and Springfield's Rich Downs the nightcap 3-0.

Bill George's nine won the first game early, by bringing in their runs in the second inning.

Shortstop Rod Trask began the inning when he was hit by pitcher Doyle Batey. Catcher Ed Cearly then lined a shot to left where Simmie Walker attempted to make a shoestring catch. But the ball travelled through him and Trask continued to third and Cearly to second. Trask scored on Morrison's ground out and Cearly advanced to third. Wes Davidson came through with a single to center and that was the scoring in the inning and in the game.

Winetrot had two other hits off Batey, a double by Jack Ball in the fifth and a single by Trask in the sixth inning.

Springfield Threatens
Springfield threatened in the first and in the sixth, but each time Morrison worked himself out of trouble. In the first inning he struck out the first man up and the last two batters at the plate. In both frames the bases were loaded.

In the second game, Winetrot discovered another hurler, as Davidson, who was scheduled to work the game, came up with a sore arm. George called on third baseman Gregg Lindquist. He pitched good ball, giving up only six hits while going the distance.

Springfield touched him back to back singles in the first frame, and those coupled with a Winetrot error gave the two runs to the visiting team.

Fluke Homer Hit
In the sixth chapter, Springfield added another marker, as D. N. Johnson sent a line shot to center where a high hop carried the ball over the head of Dave Weakley. It went as a homer.

Rich Down threw a one-hitter at Winetrot, with George's team coming up with a last-inning rally. But with two men on, the uprising ended.

The split for Winetrot gave it wins over each team in district action this year and closes out the year with a 6-13 season mark.

Fast-improving Portland grabbed another series victory by sweeping a doubleheader Sunday and moved within five games of the first division in the Pacific Coast League.

Vancouver meanwhile moved back into the league lead, 9 1/2 games ahead of Portland, by downing Phoenix 4-0 while San Diego was falling into second place after losing a twin bill to Salt Lake City 8-5 and 19-5.

And the Sacramento Solons eased their way out of a month-long stay in the cellar by beating Spokane 6-4 while Portland pushed Seattle to the bottom with a dual victory, 9-4 and 4-3.

Five errors spelled San Diego's defeat in the first game that saw the Padres' Joser Dick Brodowski pitching better ball than his opposition. He struck out five, gave up nine hits and walked three in his four innings at the mound.

San Diego's Bud Podbielniak had a nightmare second inning in the nightcap when he was slaughtered for 14 runs.

Bamberger In 6-Hitter
Vancouver's George Bamberger picked up his fourth shutout of the year as he held Phoenix to six hits. Joe Frazier came through with a one-run double in the first frame and two-run homer in the third.

League strikeout leader Marshall Bridges added another 11 to his record as he won Sacramento's victory. He now has a total of 134.

Spokane got two runs in the sixth on Jim Baxes' home run after Jim Williams had singled. The Indians got the other two tallies in the ninth.

It was Portland's first doubleheader sweep of the season and also its fourth consecutive series victory.

Three singles gave Seattle its first run in the first inning of the opener and the Beavers tied it in the second with Jack Littrell's 12th homer of the season. Portland scored four tallies in the fifth, all after two were out. Frank Kellert's three-run homer and Alex Cosmidis' triple were the big blows of that inning.

The Beavers got three more runs in the eighth on five consecutive hits and the Rainiers added two in the ninth, including a solo home run by Phil Schartzler.

In the nightcap, the Sods opened scoring in the first on a walk and a single. They scored single runs in the third and fifth innings, the last one on Hal Bevens' homer.

Frank Kellert got a solo homer in the fourth for the Beavers, who won the contest with a three-run outburst in the sixth inning on three singles and a double.

Roseburg Registers Victories Over North Bend, Prineville

Another late-inning uprising gave the Roseburg Legion team another win Sunday at Stewart Field. The Lockwood Motors American Legion juniors downed the Prineville Legion club 8-1 on runs scored in the fifth and sixth innings.

The Lockwood Motors American Legion junior baseball team draws a bye in the first round of the Oregon State Legion playoffs. The Roseburg club will meet the winner of the North Bend-Klamath Falls sub-Area Four playoff series for the area title. The winner then will advance into the semi-finals.

Lockwood will meet either North Bend or Klamath Falls Wednesday, July 30 in the first game of the playoff series at Stewart Field. The game will start at 8 p.m.

The teams move to either North Bend or Klamath Falls for the next game or games which are set for Saturday and Sunday Aug. 2-3.

Southpaw John Livingston raised his season record to 7-2 as he threw a three-hitter at the Prineville club. The win continued the Lockwood winning streak, giving the club 17 consecutive victories. The season mark is now 22-4.

Livingston pitched steady ball, giving up hits in the second, third and fourth and a run in the latter inning. He also continued his hitting with a single and two RBI's. He worked his way out of tough spots in the second and third as the Prineville team left a total of five men on the bases.

Prineville Tallies
Prineville scored first in the game, with catcher Terry Hamman drawing a walk with two away. He went to second on an error and scored when left fielder Jerry Riley poked a single to right.

In the first big inning for Lockwood, Bill Eswine banged out a single as second man up in the fifth. Don Wells followed with a single to center and Wes Young beat out an infield single on a bunt to the pitcher. Hurler Wayne Kee denied the ball but third baseman Dennis Houtney was playing in center no play could be made. Thus Lockwood had the bases full.

Mike Hatfield hit what appeared to be a double-play ball to the second baseman Tom Nichols, but a bobble allowed Eswine to score the tying run and kept the bases full.

Lockwood had a lead in the sixth when three Prineville men allowed the ball to drop among them for a single and Wells scored.

Baker Gets Sacrifice
Byron Baker, after pulling the first pitch and parked in left field, sent a sacrifice fly to left to drive in Young. There, this rally ended.

The sixth chapter found 10 Lockwood batters at the plate with five runs scoring on four hits. Livingston lofted a fly to center for a single, but there the rally ended. The tilt remained at 4-0 until the fifth inning, when North Bend found the range for two singles and scored three runs on four Lockwood boots and a walk...one of two given up by Whipple.

Fifth Run Crosses
Bill Harper's crew came back with another tally in the bottom of the chapter. With one out, Wells beat out an infield single and went to second after tagging up on Young's foul out. Hatfield added another single and an RBI when he poked one to right-center.

Lockwood added its final runs in the sixth, as Dave Cellers circled the bases on three North Bend errors and a stolen base. Cellers entered the game in the fifth as Ted Kolberg, who started the game at third, was given a rest. Kolberg is still nursing an ankle injury picked up at Springfield two weeks ago. But he still beat out an infield single in the fourth inning.

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Some 700 fans watched Whipple in one of his best efforts for Lockwood this year. He whiffed 10 batters and set the side down in order in five of the nine innings. In the other four, the side should have been retired in order, but wasn't because of errors.

Don Wells took four straight balls for the free pass and Wes Young beat out an infield single on the first pitch. Mike Hatfield then sent a single to left, also on the first pitch, and the stage was set for Livingston's poke.

He also went for the first offering by Johns and parked in left field, the same spot as the homer by Wells the night before, and it was a 4-0 ball game. Byron Baker followed the pattern set by the three previous hitters and sent the first pitch by Johns to center for a single, but there the rally ended.

Bunning Flings No-Hitter; LA Finally Escapes Cellar

Drain, Seattle Club In Split

The Drain Black Sox split with the Seattle Cheney Studs in a pair of games played over the weekend.

The Black Sox downed the Seattle club 7-6 Saturday night, and blew a three-run lead in the last inning of the game Sunday afternoon to lose 8-7.

In the game Saturday, Don Lane went eight plus innings before receiving help from Leroy Hahn in the ninth. Norm Welch, a former Linfield College standout and current Clatskanie High School baseball and football mentor, was the top hitter for the Sox. Welch collected 3-4 including a triple and a double.

In his first 11 games Bunning allowed 11 homers. Then he went on his strikeout spree.

He fanned 12 Red Sox June 11, 14 New York Yankees June 20, 10 Yanks July 16 and 12 Red Sox in his no-hitter. His total of 108 strikeouts puts him ahead of New York's Bob Turley for the American League lead.

Despite Bunning's magic, Detroit lost ground in the chase of the Yankees as did every other club. The Tigers won behind Bunning 3-0 but lost the second game to Boston 5-2 as Ike Delock ran his amazing won-lost record to 10-0 and 13-0 over a two-year span.

Yogi Berra hit a two-run homer as the Yanks took two from Kansas City 3-1 and 8-0. As a result, New York leads the league by 11 games.

Fans Get In Act
Roy Siever's ninth-inning homer in the second game aroused Washington fans to run around the bases with him, celebrating a 5-4 victory over Chicago. Dick Donovan's five-hit pitching gave the White Sox a 4-2 opening game decision.

Joe Ginsberg came through with a single with the bases loaded in the 10th inning for Baltimore's 3-2 edge over Cleveland.

In the National, San Francisco ran its winning streak to six with a 7-3 romp over Pittsburgh, clinging to a half-game lead. Warren Spivey struck out 12 for Milwaukee, 4-2 over the Chicago Cubs.

Los Angeles finally escaped from the cellar with a 6-0 victory over Philadelphia on Johnny Podres' four-hitter. St. Louis dumped Cincinnati into last place as Sam Rice struck out 12 on the way to a 3-1 decision.

When Jim Bunning shelled the home run ball for the strikeout pitch, he was on the way back to his brilliant 1957 form.

Detroit's 20-game winner of a year ago pitched a no-hit, no-run game against Boston's sluggers at Fenway Park yesterday. Six weeks ago he couldn't get anybody out.

In his first 11 games Bunning allowed 11 homers. Then he went on his strikeout spree.

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
