

Baghdad Treaty Meet May Draw Secy. Dulles

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles may go to London next weekend to attend a meeting of the Council of the Baghdad Pact — the Middle Eastern alliance embracing Britain and four Middle Eastern countries.

Dulles also is planning to go to New York for a session of the U.N. General Assembly should one be called to deal with the Middle East crisis. His plans for the London conference apparently have been tentative and somewhat dependent on the New York situation.

Should the Security Council adopt a Japanese proposal to expand the size and powers of the U.N. observer group in Lebanon, thus releasing U.S. forces, a session of the General Assembly would be unnecessary, officials said. Should Russia veto the Japanese proposal, a General Assembly meeting beginning later this week would be necessary, they added.

Dulles attended a meeting of the Middle East defense group at Ankara, Turkey, last January.

The United States is not formally a member of the Baghdad group but does belong to key committees.

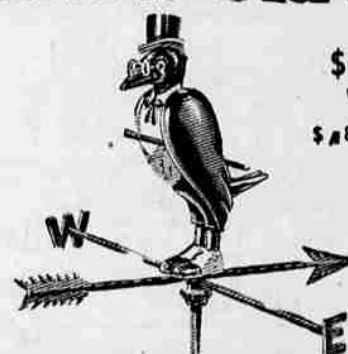
