

Crash Kills Flier As He Nears Navy Carrier

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Lt. (jg) Peter J. Onkles, 26, of Bellingham, Wash., was killed Saturday night, the Navy said Monday, when his plane crashed while making an approach on the carrier Yorktown, 80 miles off San Diego.

Lieut. Onkles was a member of Fighter Squadron 92, based at Alameda Naval Air Station. He was engaged in radar exercises when the accident occurred. He was flying a Banshee jet.

He was the brother of a former Bellingham Blossom Time printer, Celia Onkles. His father, Peter J. Onkles Sr., is superintendent of the Pacific Coast Paper Mills at Bellingham.

Cincinnati Newspapers Merged In Purchase

CINCINNATI (AP) — The Cincinnati Times-Star, a daily newspaper with roots that go back nearly 120 years, has published for the last time.

The E. W. Scripps Co. bought the afternoon newspaper Saturday and merged it with its competitor, the Cincinnati Post.

The combined paper, to be called the Cincinnati Post-Times Star, will publish for the first time today.

Purchase price was not disclosed.

Work On Rocky Reach Dam Project Stopped

WENATCHEE (AP) — Work remained at a standstill on the Rocky Reach Dam project Saturday, with no indication when the job might be resumed.

Some 800 workmen have been idled by a wildcat strike since Friday. The job had been closed down intermittently for several days as iron workers and carpenters engaged in a jurisdictional dispute over which craft should install forms for some key concrete pouring.

When the Iron Workers walked out all other work — which relies on the job being performed — was forced to halt.

The strike was in defiance of a back-to-work order by the Iron Workers International Union.

Atomic Installations Under Guard In Strike

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Civil service guards flown in from New Mexico have replaced striking security personnel at three Nevada installations of the Atomic Energy Commission.

The 105 regular guards left their posts at noon yesterday in a wage dispute and set up picket lines at AEC installations in Las Vegas, Tonopah and Mercury.

Forty-two civil service guards from Los Alamos, N.M., replaced them.

The Independent Guard Assn. of Nevada has been asking a 17½-cent hourly wage increase, plus 2½ cents in fringe benefits. Federal Services, Inc., the company which hires the guards, has offered a 7½-cent boost.

The present hourly scale ranges from \$1.82 to \$2.42.

Congressional Campaign Strategy Revisions Likely Because Of Mid-East Issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — The ominous shadow of the Middle East crisis threatened today to blot out other issues and force some major revisions in congressional campaign strategy.

Campaign leaders were watching public reaction to President Eisenhower's decision to send troops into Lebanon. There was no certainty in either camp about the immediate or long-range political effect.

But, as things stood out in their reports from grass-roots canvasses: if American troops are still in Lebanon on election day, Middle East developments are likely to have more effect on voting results than any other single issue.

While GOP National Chairman Meade ALCORN has contended Eisenhower's troop decision has "won wide acclaim," a Republican campaign strategist who didn't want his name used said his survey showed very mixed reaction.

He said that while many voters approved the President's firm action in a dangerous situation, others believed American intervention in the internal affairs of any other nation would be likely to boomerang.

Soft-Pedal, Demo Advice
A leading Democrat, who thinks Eisenhower should first have appealed to the United Nations and then sent troops if necessary, said he is advising party colleagues to soft-pedal their criticisms and let events speak for themselves.

Fresh in the minds of the Democrats is the use the Republicans made of the Korean War issue in the 1952 presidential election. In speeches, ALCORN still stresses the theme that the Eisenhower ad-

ministration settled the Korean conflict and can be depended on to chart a course that would avoid war.

Democrats reason that even if U. S. troops avoid fighting — and they hope fervently there is none — the American voter will be mighty restive if the weeks stretch into months without a Middle East settlement.

The Republicans hope, of course that some way can be found to bring about an agreement that will permit the honorable withdrawal of U. S. forces long before election time. They feel that would be a political bonanza. But they have serious doubts it can be done soon.
