## House Committee Approves Subsidies For Minerals

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House Interior subcommittee Tuesday approved subsidies for minerals producers.

It approved portions of a Senate-passed bill, made some changes, and added incentive payments for certain minerals. The measure is expected to be taken up by the full House Interior Committee in a few days.

The Senate bill provides price supports for lead, zinc, tungsten and acid grade fluorspar, as well as a purchase program for copper.

The House subcommittee approved the proposed stabilization prices and copper stockpile plan.

**Great Britain To Buy Pacific Northwest Apples**  
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The purchases will be made from Pacific Northwest and other northern hemisphere growers.

Henry Kearns, assistant secretary of commerce, said a special 75,000 long ton quota approved by the British removes discrimination between imports of apples from North America and Western Europe. This, Kearns added, enables U.S. apple growers an opportunity to compete for a larger share of the British apple market than previously available.

The senators said 750,000 boxes of the British order will be purchased between July and December 1958 and the remainder between January and June 1959.

However, it rejected a proposal by which the secretary of the Interior could borrow 350 million dollars from the treasury to finance the 5-year price support program. Annual appropriations would be required by the House bill.

The House subcommittee added to the Senate bill a section to provide incentive payments for chromite, beryl, and columbian-tantalum. This proposal was recommended by the Eisenhower administration and offered by Rep. A. L. Miller (R-Neb.).

Under the price support plan the government would pay domestic producers the difference between market prices and stabilization prices.

The bill calls for federal purchases of chrome at \$46 a ton, beryl at \$70 a short ton and columbian-tantalum at \$2.35 a pound.

The Senate Interior Committee later approved a bill to provide incentive payments for domestic production of eight strategic and critical minerals.

The legislation, sponsored by Chairman James E. Murray (D-Mont.), also would authorize the processing of limited quantities of chromite and manganese ores held in government stockpiles.

Under this bill, incentive payments would be made for newly mined commercial grade metallurgical chrome, \$1 per long dry ton unit for not more than 4,600,000 units annually.

OLYMPIA (AP) — Washington's 1958 highway death toll increased to 273 Tuesday, 25 more than a year ago at the same time.

**Dress Rehearsals Held At Ashland**  
Dress rehearsals are in progress this week as preparations speed up for the July 28 opening of the Oregon Shakespearean Festival in Ashland.

The first round of dress rehearsals, which is closed to spectators, end Wednesday night. The second round, Thursday through Sunday, will be open to members of the Festival Assn.

General Manager William Patton said the central box office in Ashland will be open from 9:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily and from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Sundays beginning Thursday. He said ticket sales for the 1958 season are the highest in history.

Performances of four Shakespeare plays will begin July 28 and run through Sept. 4. Plays to be performed in nightly rotation this year are, in order, "Much Ado About Nothing," "King Lear," "The Merchant of Venice," and "Troilus and Cressida."
