Maybe the Milwaukee Braves aren't hurting so much after all. Hank Aaron is over .300 at last and they're no worse in the standings than they were a year ago, when they won the National League pennant and the world championship.

With Aaron going 4-for-4, upping his batting average to .305, the Braves beat the St. Louis Cardinals 2-1 last night. It was the only game played — rain washed out the rest — and put the champs within half a game of first-place San Francisco again.

In the American League, the New York Yankees belted Detroit 13-3, Kansas City beat Boston 4-3, the Chicago White Sox defeated Baltimore 4-2 and Cleveland won 5-3 in the nightcap of a two-night pair after Washington had won 4-2 in 12 innings.

Aaron and Ed Mathews, the big man in last year's attack, had six of the Braves' eight hits off Bob Mabe while rookie Carl Willis squared his record at 3-3 after losing three in a row. Mathews and Aaron singled and Mathews scored in the fourth, when the Cards chipped in three of their four errors. And they singled again in the eighth, when Del Crandall's sacrifice fly scored Mathews with the clincher.

Turley Wins Game
Dick Turley, who has lost but three for the Yanks, had a four-hitter and a 13-1 lead going into the ninth. Then the Tigers counted two on Gus Zernial's fifth homer and doubles by Frank Bolling and Tito Francona.

The White Sox jumped past the Tigers into fourth place as Billy Pierce, 10 games behind last year's 20-victory pace, won his 10th. He had a shutout for 2-3 innings, then need-4 Turk Lown's relief help when he walked two runs home.

Bob Cerv had an RBI single as the A's scored two in the first. But Tom Brewer (4-9) then blanked them on two hits until he gave up a two-out walk to Lopez' ninth homer.

Home runs by Norm Zaucha and Ken Aspromonte won the opener for the Senators.

Hal Woodeshick and Earl Averill combined for Cleveland to beat Washington in the nightcap. Woodeshick gave up nine hits but gained a 2-0 record when Averill broke a 2-2 tie with a two-run single in the third. Rocky Colvato homered in both.

Yakima's Bears lost a full game of its league lead and Wenatchee hopped over Eugene into fourth place as a result of Northwest League action Tuesday night. Tri-City won its sixth straight in dumping Yakima, 6-2. In fifth place only five games ago, the Braves are now solidly in third spot, just a game behind the Bees.

In other action, Wenatchee defeated Eugene, 7-2, and Lewiston shook Salem, 6-2.

Gerry Davis, sent down by Seattle of the Pacific Coast League, hurled a six-hitter in his first appearance for Wenatchee. The left-hander pitched perfect ball for the first four innings and was in trouble only in the fifth frame, when Eugene scored its runs.

The Chiefs erupted for four runs in the sixth to come from behind for the win.

A triple by Flip Valdes, three singles, a walk and two stolen bases provided the edge. Wenatchee added two more in the seventh stanza.

Yakima collected 10 hits, five of them doubles, to nine for the winners. But miscues and walks opened the way for Tri-City's victory.

Lewiston staged a four-run rally in the eighth frame to break open a tied contest with Salem's Senators.

With the score 2-2, Rodgers Herrscher doubled to send Ted Rhodes home with what proved to be the winning run.

Then the Salem defense crumbled. The Braves picked up three more runs in the inning on a single, two walks, a wild pitch and an error.

OSC To Stay In PCC Until Oregon Ready
PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon State College will not travel a lone road out of the Pacific Coast Conference.

That announcement came from John R. Richards, chancellor of the state system of Higher Education, after the president of OSC, A. L. Stroud, had said OSC might withdraw if any of the five remaining members quit.

Richards said any action by OSC and the University of Oregon "will be by the consensus of both."

He made his announcement after an informal meeting of the state Board of Higher Education here.

The president of the University, O. Meredith Wilson, said it was decided that the "interests of both schools are so common that it's best we continue to work together."

Portland had to settle for a split with Sacramento for the second consecutive night in the Pacific Coast League Tuesday.

Portland managed an 11-0 victory in the first game, but Sacramento bounced back for a 13-3 win in the second. That left the Beavers in fifth place, four games behind Salt Lake City, which lost to Spokane 7-6.

The teams will play a single game at Portland Wednesday night.

Elsewhere in the league Vancouver took a one-game lead behind the brilliant relief pitching of Russ Heman.

Heman came on to replace starter Art Ceccarelli in the third inning and pitched a four-hitter the rest of the way as Vancouver tacked a 2-1 defeat on Seattle and shoved the Rainiers into the PCL cellar.

The victory moved the Mounties into the league lead ahead of the San Diego Padres, who lost to the Phoenix Giants 10-6. The three-place Giants are also a game off the pace.

Ceccarelli worked for two innings and then was lifted for a pinchhitter. He gave up three hits and Seattle's lone run in the third during his time on the mound. Heman took over in the third and shackled the Rainiers the rest of the way, striking out six and walking two.

Loser Pitches Nine
The Mounties got their first run in the fourth and their winning run in the fifth on Owen Friend's double and Buddy Peterson's single. Marty Kutyna, who gave up seven hits in working the route, was the loser.

The Giants crushed San Diego with eight runs in the seventh inning and handed the loss to Steve Riddick, who was coasting along on a 4-2 lead going into that frame. Four hits, five walks, two hit batsmen and two errors added up to Phoenix's eight runs.

Willie McCovey slugged out a solo homer for the Giants in the sixth inning. Rod Graber belted out a bases-empty homer for San Diego in the third and Rudy Regalado got another solo homer for the Pads in the ninth.

The Indians grabbed a 5-0 lead after the first three innings off the Bees' Fred Green and then hung tough for the victory. The Bees almost pulled it out of the fire in the eighth when they struck for three runs on R.C. Stevens' three-run homer. Sam Miley got a solo homer for the Bees in the sixth.

Bees Change Hurlers
Green lasted for three and two-thirds innings before giving way to Don Kildoo. Don Urquhart took over from Kildoo in the eighth and finished out. Art Fowler, the winner, lasted for seven innings. He gave up eight of Salt Lake City's 12 hits.

Vic Lombardi administered the white washing to Sacramento in the opener of the Portland-Solons twin bill, giving up three hits and striking out two in the seven-inning game. Dave Melton got a two-run homer for Portland in the third inning.

In the nightcap, the Solons hopped on three Portland pitchers for 12 hits and five walks. Seven of Sacramento's runs came in the seventh inning. Portland got all three of its runs in the bottom of the seventh on a walk, George Freese's double and Frank Kofler's seventh homer of the season.

U.S. Plywood tied the game in the final chapter on two hits and two Riddle errors. Riddle put a man in scoring position in the top of the eighth and an insurance runner on first on two walks with two outs. But the rally ended as the last man filed to center.

In the winning run for the Plywood club was scored by pitcher Bill Borchert on a walk, a wild pitch and a sacrifice.
