All Is Not Quiet On Reservation

OLYMPIA (AP)—All is not quiet on the reservation.

Al Vandenberg, assistant attorney general, said Tuesday two petitions have been received here from members of the Taholah and Queets Indian tribes protesting recent action of the Quinalt Tribal Council.

In April the council asked the state to take over the civil and criminal jurisdiction of the quinalt Indian Reservation on the Olympic Peninsula. The state accepted and took over July 14.

Vandenberg said the petitions, signed by 95 tribal members, claimed the council's action was contrary to the tribe's by-laws which state the council must consult the tribe. Fred Saux, secretary of the Tribal Council, said.

Vandenberg said the state acted in good faith and the reservation will remain under state jurisdiction.

"Their (the protestors) only recourse," Vandenberg said, "would probably be a test case of the transaction through an appeal of some criminal conviction."
