Riversdale Grange has registered a complaint to the County Road Commissioners for not repairing damaged roads in Garden Valley. In the identical location in late afternoon the same day a young girl had a tractor accident which hospitalized her for several weeks. For several feet along this spot there is no shoulder along the road. For a further distance the shoulder averages from six to eight inches. With the increased traffic of private cars to the bean fields and school buses loaded with children bean pickers, the grange feels the shoulder width should be increased to prevent further accidents.

Building Increases In First 6 Months Of '58 In Roseburg

Increased building in Roseburg during the first six months of this year is reflected in comparative totals of building permits issued during the same periods of 1957 and 1958.

Statistics compiled by Equitable Savings and Loan Assn., Portland, show that the increase through June this year was 102 per cent over the same period last year. This year, \$475,589 in permits were issued by the city. In the first six months of 1957, the total was only \$235,145.

In the second quarter of 1958, \$363,845 in permits were issued. The Roseburg total was reflected throughout Oregon, which showed a 78 per cent increase in the first half of this year.

For the first six months, Roseburg stood seventh among cities in the state in permits issued. The Douglas County Building Department's record wasn't as outstanding, mostly because of major building permits, including U.S. Plywood Corp., allowed in the first half of last year. In the first six months of 1957, county permits totalled \$1,022,219, while the figure was \$384,117 this year. But Bruce Elmgren, county planning coordinator, said building in the county has been steady. In the second quarter this year, \$287,387 in permits were issued.

Elmgren pointed out that construction within the jurisdiction of several smaller cities in the county aren't reported by the Portland company.

Residential construction picked up 380 per cent in the first half of this year, totalling \$245,810, compared to \$51,200 last year. Douglas County's down, recording \$182,501 this year and \$299,261 last year.
