

Symington Calls For Increase In Debt Limit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo) called today for another increase in the national debt limit to cover bigger defense spending.

Symington, in a speech prepared for floor delivery, said that if this is not done there will be "a repetition of last year's cash crisis in the Pentagon."

Meanwhile, it was learned that Secretary of the Treasury Anderson already has sounded out key members of the House Ways and Means and Senate Finance committees on a further boost in the debt ceiling.

It was understood also that Sen. Harry F. Byrd (D-Va), Finance Committee chairman, has agreed some increase probably will be needed, but has urged Anderson to hold the limit to 285 billion dollars.

The secretary has indicated, however, that his request may be for 290 billion, 10 billion above the temporary ceiling of 280 billion approved by Congress in February.

Oregon Forests Free From Fire

Oregon forest and range lands, now dry as a bone, were free of major fires Thursday but faced another day of high temperatures and isolated thunderstorms in south-central and Eastern Oregon.

There was some hope that cooler temperatures would arrive Friday.

The Bureau of Land Management reported a 6000-acre brush and grass fire under control near Vale. Some 100 fire fighters using bulldozers, pumps and aircraft worked on the blaze.

No buildings were destroyed, but the blaze swept around the BLM fire station, raising the temperature there to 106. The station was saved.

Logging has been suspended in parts of Oregon because of low humidity and high temperatures.

The Dalles recorded the Oregon high of 95 degrees Wednesday. It was 93 at Medford and 92 in Pendleton.

Oscar Winning Actress Marries TV Executive

VAN NUYS, Calif. (AP) — Oscar-winning actress Miyoshi Umeki and Frederick Winfield Opie, television executive, were married Wednesday night at the home of friends.

The 29-year-old Japanese actress was adjudged the best supporting actress this year for her role in "Sayonara." This was her first marriage, the second for Opie, 34.

Family Row Turns Out To Be Battle; Four In Hospitals

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — What started out as a private family argument rapidly flared into a motorized warfare yesterday, and when the smoke of battle cleared these were the results:

Four persons, three of them innocent bystanders, in hospitals.

Three automobiles badly battered.

One man in jail.

Patron Herbert E. Tolle gave this account:

Oscar L. Holt, 33, was driving along the bank of White River when he suddenly stopped his car and began beating and stabbing his wife Doris, 39. Mrs. Holt, already cut in the chest and one hand, leaped from the car and ran screaming down the road with her husband driving in hot pursuit.

Richard W. Hawk, 65, came wheeling along in his car, saw what was happening and opened his door to let Mrs. Holt inside. The enraged Holt promptly swung his car against Hawk's auto, injuring Hawk and his wife and daughter.

Holt's car then bounced against a third car driven by Walter O. Farrell, 40.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Holt took off on foot again. Holt chased his wife, and Farrell chased Holt. Farrell tackled Holt.

About this time the police got into the act, and Holt went to jail on preliminary charges of assault and battery with a motor vehicle, assault and battery with intent to kill, and failure to have an operator's license.

Four Women Named To House Of Lords

LONDON (AP) — For the first time in British history, four women were named Thursday to the House of Lords.

They will hold special life peerages along with 10 men named by Queen Elizabeth II to put new life into the ancient, all-male chamber.

Like all Britons nominated to the aristocratic upper house of Parliament, the ladies have distinguished themselves in public life. Four of the new male peers were members of the present House of Commons.

The new peeresses, who will take their seats in November are: Barbara Frances Wootton, 61-year-old economist, author and former professor. One of Britain's leading intellectuals, she is a Labor party supporter.

Dame Katharine Elliot, 55, three-time British delegate to the U. N. Assembly active Conservative party worker, and chairman for the Advisory Committee on Child Care for Scotland.

Baroness Ravensdale, 62, chairman of the National Assn. of Girls' Clubs and a leader in the campaign to put women in the House of Lords.

The Dowager Marchioness of Reading, chairman of the Women's Voluntary Services for Civil Defense, which she founded in 1938.

Greek Cypriots Strike Protests British Arrests

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Greek Cypriots staged an islandwide general strike today to protest mass arrests by the British aimed at heading off new violence. Most of Nicosia's stores and offices were shut down.

So far, British have announced the arrest of 1,450 Greek Cypriots and 44 Turk Cypriots, but the actual total is believed to be higher.

The 24-hour strike began today as soon as the British lifted a two-day round-the-clock curfew that had brought the island to a standstill.

Eisenhower Flings Back Accusation Of Khrushchev

President Eisenhower flung back at Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev the Russian leader's accusation that the United States and Britain have gravely endangered world peace.

In a bitterly worded note late Monday, he challenged Khrushchev to explain personally to the 11-nation United Nations Security Council.

"If such a meeting were genuinely desired, the United States would join in following that orderly procedure," Eisenhower said.

Eisenhower made no promise to meet face-to-face with Khrushchev. He noted tersely council members could be represented by chiefs of government and foreign Ministers. But responsible officials thought he couldn't do anything but show up if Khrushchev and other heads of government did.

Eisenhower coupled his bid to Khrushchev with some of the harshest language he has hurled at the Soviet Union in recent months.

It is Russia's actions, not those

of the United States and Britain, he said, that are keeping the world in turmoil. The President defended Anglo-American troop landings in Jordan and Lebanon as aimed at helping these Middle East countries survive a campaign of murder, violence and terrorism.

"The real danger of war would come," Eisenhower said, "if one small nation after another were to be engulfed by expansionist and aggressive forces supported by the Soviet Union."

Bill To Fence Off Wilderness Areas Finds Opposition

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill to fence off, in effect, the nation's wilderness areas has run into opposition from some Western senators.

The bill is designed to preserve such areas through establishment of a system that would take in wilderness areas in national forests, parks, wildlife refuges and ranges, Indian reservations and other public domain.

A wilderness is defined by the bill as "an area where the earth and its community of life are untrammelled by man, where man himself is a visitor who does not remain."

Opposition came at the start of a hearing before the Senate Interior Committee Wednesday.

Sen. Wallace F. Bennett (R-Utah) said he felt it would be unwise "to proceed with such haste to consider a bill having such widespread ramifications, adding:

"To us in the West, creation of wilderness areas is but one of the many desirable uses to which federal lands should be put.

Where pre-eminence is given to one use over another in a given area or areas, there is always a danger that many other worthwhile uses will suffer from neglect."

Sens. Arthur V. Watkins (R-Utah) and Frank A. Barrett (R-Utah) said they were always in urging that hearings be held in the field. Watkins said there also should be consultation with governors of the 11 Western states.

The bill is sponsored by Sens. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.), Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) and Paul Douglas (D-Ill.).

Sen. William Proxmire (D-Wis.) filed with the committee a statement urging approval of the bill.

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Lakes Formed By Dams Given Formal Names

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lakes created by McNary, John Day, Rocky Reach and The Dalles dams were christened by the Board of Geographic Names Wednesday.

The board is a coordinating agency charged with standardizing geographic names within the United States.

The lakes are: Wallula, for the town covered by the lake behind McNary Dam; Umatilla, for the Indian tribe and two near John Day Dam; Celilo, for the Indian name of the falls covered by waters from The Dalles Dam, and Entiat, for the town which will be partially inundated by the waters behind Rocky Reach Dam.

The names become official for all government use.

Two More Children Die After Trap In Closet

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Two more children died yesterday from being trapped in a stifling clothes closet, bringing the total deaths to four.

The children were trapped when the handle fell off the door of the closet in which they were playing.

When the mother, Mrs. Cardie McDada, a Negro, returned home Tuesday she found the four children trapped in the closet. Debra Joyce Moore, 3, and Tommy Allen Carr, 4, children by former marriages, were dead.

Carolyn Moore, 2, and Cloyce Moore, 6, were unconscious. They died yesterday in a Dallas hospital.

Douglas County Employees Third Picnic Scheduled

An estimated 300 persons are expected to attend the third annual Douglas County picnic, slated for Aug. 3 at Umpqua Park in Roseburg, county commissioner Frank Ashley said today.

Notices are being sent to all county employees inviting them and their families to the annual event which will feature a "watermelon bust" and games and races for adults and children this year.

Ashley said the Sunday picnic is scheduled to start at 1 p.m. at the park near the Fairgrounds. Small contributions of less than a dollar are being solicited to provide prizes and pay for coffee, soft drinks and other refreshments.

The annual picnics have gained in popularity. Previous ones held at the Rod and Gun Club recreation area have attracted more than 250 persons each year.

Warning Light Failure Causes Anxious Moments

JOPLIN, Mo. (AP) — Failure of a small warning light caused 20 airplane passengers and three crewmen an anxious 57 minutes yesterday.

When the signal that indicates the landing gear is down and locked didn't go on, Central Airlines pilot Glenn Cox of Fort Worth called for standby emergency crews and circled the field.

Nearly an hour later he tested the wheels of the DC3 by touching the Municipal Airport runway and then zooming back into the air.

The wheels held and minutes later Cox landed the plane.

The plane completed its flight from Kansas City to Little Rock.

Man Is Found Innocent Of Manslaughter Charge

LA GRANDE (AP) — Robert Allen Bird, 40, Union, was found innocent Wednesday of a manslaughter charge after a 1½-day trial in circuit court here.

The jury of six women and six men was out only 15 minutes before returning the verdict. The trial began Tuesday morning before Judge W. F. Brown.

Bird was accused of the slaying of his cabin mate, Frank Kennedy Wilson, 39, of New Year's Day.

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Russian Power Jobs Overshadow Those In U. S.

PORTLAND (AP)—Hydroelectric projects in the Soviet Union are overshadowing comparable work in the United States, according to the chief of the U. S. Corps of Engineers.

The Soviets have finished, or have partly completed, 10 projects that will have individual generating capacities of two to six million kilowatts, said Maj. Gen. E. C. Itchner.

Itchner pointed out that Grand Coulee Dam, this nation's biggest hydroelectric project, produces 1,994,000 kilowatts.

"The development of water resources," Itchner said, "is a very important program in Russia—second in priority only to atomic power and missiles."

He added: "We should certainly be developing all of our resources."

Itchner is in the midst of a Northwest inspection tour. He plans to inspect the Cougar and Hills Creek dams in the Willamette Valley Thursday after his visit to the John Day site, The Dalles and Bonneville dams on the Columbia Wednesday.

He swings north into Washington Friday on tours of Port Angeles, Everett, Bellingham, Anacortes, Port Townsend, Aberdeen and Chehalis.

Buddy Croff Wins Top Prize Money At Cheyenne

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — Buddy Croff, Bannock, Tex., received \$1,032 Wednesday, the largest individual prize of the first two go-rounds at the Cheyenne Frontier Days Rodeo.

Croff posted the best time of 13.7 seconds in calf roping. His was 2.4 seconds better than second-place George Epperson of Cherokee, Tex., could do. Epperson received \$854.

A total of \$48,450 was distributed to the top six men in each of three riding and three tying events of the 62nd annual rodeo.

Shoat Webster, Nowata, Okla., nailed down \$875 for the best steer roping time of 19.5 seconds. Highest earning in bulldogging was \$833 taken by Wilbur Plaugher, Moose Jaw, Sask., for his 10.5 second effort Tuesday.

House Passes Bill Extending Farm Plan Another Year

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House overrode administration objections Wednesday and passed a bill extending for another year the farm surplus disposal program. The measure now goes to conference with the Senate to compromise conflicts between the two branches.

Republican efforts to force a bill call were unsuccessful, and passage was by a 195-52 standing vote.

The bill, renewing the 1954 Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act, is a keystone of the administration farm program. It provides for sale abroad of farm surpluses for foreign currencies and authorizes 1½ billion dollars to carry out the program.

But the administration doesn't like a provision that the secretary of agriculture should "to the maximum extent practicable" barter government-owned farm commodities for strategic materials and goods needed in development of U. S. foreign aid program.

This provision further directs that foreign currencies acquired under the disposal program be used for such things as building embassies abroad, financing U. S. exhibits and trade fairs, educational exchanges and the like.

The Senate-passed bill calls for a two-year extension and an additional 3½ billion dollars to carry it out. It also contains a barter program.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson and the State Department objected to the barter and related provisions as interference with the conduct of foreign relations and normal dollar trade.

Oscar Levant Returns, Hopes Quarrels Ended
