The Braves have won another big one for Milwaukee, this time with a two-hitter that hoisted the Braves back into the National League lead. Young Joey Jay blanked St. Louis, 6-0 on a pair of singles last night as the champs moved a full game ahead of San Francisco. The Giants, after winning six in a row, slipped to second with 3-2 and 2-0 defeats at Philadelphia. The first was a completion of a June 22 suspended game and marked Eddie Sawyer's return as manager of the Phils, who moved from sixth to within .001 of fourth-place St. Louis. Cincinnati defeated the Chicago Cubs 6-5 in 10 innings and Pittsburgh plunked Los Angeles back into the cellar with an 11-3 and 6-3 two-night sweep.

Yanks Win Another
In the American League, first-place New York walloped Detroit 10-4. Kansas City beat second-place Baltimore 3-1. Baltimore defeated the Chicago White Sox 4-4 and Cleveland clipped Washington 5-3. Jay, 22, has won five in a row for a 6-3 record. Jay faced only 29 batters last night. He walked none, struck out seven. The only cards who hit were Gene Evers, who play batted, and Don Blasingame in the ninth. The Phils trailed 1-0 with two on and two out in the sixth when the June 22 curfew sounded. Last night, lefty Harry Anderson tagged a three-run homer off southpaw Johnny Antonelli when play resumed. That beat Ruben Gomez, the starter back in June, and gave Robin Roberts a 9-9 record although the Phils managed just three hits. The Giants' streak officially ended in the regulation game. Rookie Ray Semproch won his 12th with a five-hitter for his second shut-out, both over the Giants.

Robinson Hits
Frank Robinson drove in four runs for the Reds, two with a double that capped a four-run inning and the other pair with his winning, 13th homer off reliever Don Elston (7-6).

District One American Legion junior baseball play ended Wednesday night at Stewart Field and the Roseburg juniors closed out a highly successful league season with two more wins over the Springfield club.

Springfield outthit the Lockwood 7-0 in the first game, but the Roseburg club made the three hits standup for a 4-2 win. In the second game, a pair of Lockwood hurlers won out over two Springfield pitchers by a 5-0 count.

The double win kept the winning streak alive with a number 8, and number 19 going into the books, and raised the Lockwood season mark to 24-4. This is the record Bill Harper's team will take into the Area Four title game next Wednesday with either North Bend or Klamath Falls.

A total of 867 fans were on hand for the final district twin bill of the year. This crowd was kept informed throughout the evening as to the progress of the sub-area four series opener between North Bend and Klamath Falls. The host team in this game, Klamath Falls, won the tilt 6-4.

Eswine Wins Another

Bill Eswine kept his undefeated string intact in the first game with Springfield as he spaced out seven hits to gain his eighth win of the year. In the nightcap, John Livingston picked up his eighth win of the year as against two lefties as he shut out the Springfield nine for five innings while allowing one hit. He was pulled in the sixth inning to give Bob Whipple additional mound time.

Springfield scored its two runs in the first inning and from that point on was kept in check by the Lockwood hurlers. Jerry Haugen collected the first hit off Eswine as first man up. He sent a single to left base into left. After that, singles by Clem Herman and Don Johnson plus two Lockwood boots gave the Springfield club a 2-0 lead.

Lockwood came back in the second inning with a single run. Bob Scott was safe on a fielder's choice and moved to second on George Wagner's ground out. Scott scored when Ted Kolberg's hit to Haugen at short was booted.

Roseburg Takes Lead

The Roseburg club went ahead in the game as two more runs came across. Three Springfield errors helped the Roseburg cause. Wagner began the rally as shortstop Haugen committed another error as he overthrew first base and Wagner continued to second. Kolberg looped a single to right with Wagner scoring the tying run. Kolberg advanced to second on the throw to the plate.

Eswine reached base because of the first baseman's error and Kolberg moved to third. After this, Don Wells sent a fly to center which the club were the direct result of heads up play, as the Springfield nine committed 11 errors in the two contests.

Last Run Tallies

The Lockwood club scored the last run in the opener in the sixth inning as Kolberg started the inning with his second single. Eswine moved him along with a bunt and he scored when Wes Young's hit to the second baseman was bobbled.

In the nightcap, the Roseburg nine plated one run in the first and this marker kept the game at 1-0 until the fifth. Wells scored this run as he walked and stole second. Livingston drove him in with a single to left.

Six more runs in the fifth gave the Lockwood club a 7-0 lead as 10 men came to the plate. In this frame, it was singles by Wells, Hatfield and Eswine, along with three Springfield miscues, which gave the Lockwood club the big lead.

The final tally of the game was in the sixth, as Livingston was safe on a fielder's choice and stole second. He scored run number eight on Wagner's single to center.

No-Hitter Ruined

Livingston saw his no-hit ball game ruined in the fifth when Steve Clark sent a single through the hole into center. But the southpaw was sharp, whiffing eight batters before he pulled Whipple. Whipple was sent to the mound after Livingston's bid for a no-no game was ended. He gave up just one hit.

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while fanning four and giving a walk to one batter.

The hardest-tagged ball of the night was a foul clout to left by Floyd Phillips in the second game. With two outs in the second inning, Phillips levelled on the first pitch and sent it to the left field fence just foul.

Wells Takes 2nd

One example was Wells' additional base after drawing his first walk of the night. On this one, catcher Ron Kelso let the ball go "rough him on the ball-four pitch and made no effort to pick it up. Wells took off for first and continued to second before Kelso had recovered the ball and his thoughts. In the first game, Livingston in left field and Young in center both had just one chance during the game and handled them without difficulty. The two Lockwood outfielders might have been a bit lonely due to lack of action in their territories but they weren't. They were kept company by a wayward pheasant until just before the start of the second game.

Big Crowd Sees Brown Repel Lane Challenge

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Boxing's thin man miniature dark destroyer Joe Brown, is going to get a good rest, a reward for being one of the busiest champions in the game today.

Little Joe beat Kenny Lane of Muskegon, Mich., the last persistent challenger for his world's lightweight title, last night before the largest crowd in Texas boxing history — 10,994.

Lou Viscusi, Brown's manager observed: "He is the only champion to defend his title three times in eight months. He deserves a rest. I have no plans for him at this time. I am now concentrating on the Floyd Patterson-Roy Harris fight."

Viscusi also manages Harris.

Decision Is Close

Brown won unanimously but close decisions over Lane, the former farm boy from Michigan, who had some bright moments in his efforts to become the first left-hander lightweight champion.

In fact, Lane protested that he had won. He declared he had been robbed and Jack Kearns, Lane's manager, had the same opinion. Lane claimed he thought he had such a lead that he coasted the last round. But it was the last round that Brown won the widest margin — and that apparently was what clinched the fight to Brown.

It was a steady, hard-fought bout that saw Brown do the most physical damage but never able to land the kind of blow that had sent four previous challengers kicking since he became champion in August 1956.

Lane Gets Cut

Brown cut Lane's right eye in the ninth and opened it further with left jabs in the tenth. It was in this round that Brown hit Lane so hard with a left uppercut that he knocked his mouthpiece out. It left Lane's lip bleeding.

Brown bloodied Lane's nose in the 12th and in the 15th — Brown's great finishing round that obviously won him the decision — he again knocked Lane's mouthpiece loose.

The boys each entered the fight with each weighing 134 1/4 pounds.

Portland Loses; Padres Bounce Back Into Lead

Rademacher Set For 1st TV Ring Go

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The nation's boxing fans get their first view of Pete Rademacher, ex-ruler of the world amateur heavyweight, on television Friday night, and from all indications it should be something to see.

Big Pete created a sensation last year when, in his first match as a professional, he landed and lost a title battle with champion Floyd Patterson.

He was almost as choosy in opponents for his second fight as a pro. He meets Zora Foley of Chandler, Ariz., who shares with Eddie Machen the role of No. 1 challenger for Patterson's crown.

The encounter, billed for 10 rounds, goes on at 7 p.m., PDT. It will be televised by the National Broadcasting Co.

Matchmaker George Parnassus of the Olympic Auditorium predicts a near-sellout crowd of around 10,000.

The program, staged for the Sportsmen's Club's Annual Fight for Lives for the City of Hope, also features a 10-round featherweight bout between Mauro Vasquez, unbeaten Mexico City featherweight, and Enrique Aceves of Los Angeles.

Foley, 26, has not been beaten since he was stopped in this same ring by young Jack Johnson in December 1935. He is the betting favorite at about 2-1.

Foley, originally from Dallas, Tex., will weigh about 195. Rademacher's weight remains a mystery. His trainer George Chermers declared 23-year-old Pete weighed 212 or a pound or two under.

However, Rademacher weighed 202 for Patterson, and in his final workout Wednesday he looked much trimmer than a year ago. Both fighters swear they'll go for a quick knockout. Rademacher wants to prove he's a real pro.

Sacramento upset the Portland Beavers again Wednesday night, but the Portlanders did not lose any ground in their drive to climb into the first division of the Pacific Coast League.

Fourth-place Salt Lake City also lost, going down before Spokane 7-6, while fifth-place Portland was being edged 2-1.

A Seattle rookie meanwhile knocked the Vancouver Mounties out of first place.

Claude Osteen, a pink-cheeked youth of 19 working his first game for Seattle, held the powerful Mounties to four hits. The smooth southpaw fanned seven and walked three.

By their loss the Mounties dropped into second place and the San Diego Padres, who clubbed Phoenix 6-3, took over the top spot.

In other games, the Sacramento Solons tacked a 2-1 defeat on Portland and the Spokane Indians beat the Salt Lake City Bees, 7-6.

Osteen, who struck out 17 while winning 14 and losing four for Wenatchee of the Class B Northwest League before moving up to Seattle, was in command most of the way, although he did dip into the trouble twice. Each time, however, he worked himself out.

Suds Score 11

The Rainiers gave Osteen a pocketful of confidence in the second inning when they splurged for 11 runs. Gale Wade's three-run homer and Osteen's two-run single were the key blows in a nine-hit attack in that frame.

In the first frame, Vancouver's first three men got aboard, then Osteen went to work and struck

out the next two and got the next batter, heavy-hitting Ray Barker, on an outfield fly.

The Padres gave Bill Werle, their starting pitcher, a five-run lead in the first inning and Werle didn't disappoint his mates as he held the Giants to six hits while fanning five and walking none.

All three of Phoenix's runs came on homers. Don Taussig elbowed out solo blasts in the second and the fourth and Bill Wilson ditted in the seventh inning.

Joe Stanka, the Sacramento winner, held the Beavers to six hits while his teammates were combining Al Lary for 10, including Jim Westlake's eighth-inning double, which drove in Stanka with the winning run.

One of the six hits off Stanka, who fanned six and walked only one, was Ed Wineciak's inside-the-park homer in the first inning. The hit was a liner to right. Jim Greengrass slipped to the turf trying to nab the hit and the ball rolled to the fence.

The Indians spotted Salt Lake City a 3-0 lead after two innings, then moved into the lead for keeps with four runs in the fourth inning on a single, a hit batsman, Jim Baxes' triple and Jim Williams' two-run homer.

The Indians got three more in the eighth on two singles, an error, a sacrifice and a sacrifice fly to wind up their end of the scoring. Sam Milley was the power man for Salt Lake City, getting three doubles and two singles in five at-bats. He drove in two runs.

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
