Gardiner, Robinson, Indian Runner Win At Empire Games

CARDIFF, Wales, (AP)—Keith Gardiner of Jamaica and the University of Nebraska won the 120-yard high hurdles at the British Empire Games Thursday after finishing second to Tom Robinson of the Bahamas and the University of Michigan in a photo finish final of the 220-yard dash.

The hurdles victory gave Gardiner his second gold medal of the games. He won the 100-yard dash last Saturday.

Gardiner came back for his hurdles victory after he had almost collapsed at the finish of the 220 in which Robinson just nipped him at the tape. Both runners were timed in 21 seconds flat for a new Empire Games record.

A second Games record fell when Milka Singh of India won the 440-yard run in 46.6 seconds. Malcolm Spence of South Africa was second and Terry Tobasco of Canada and the University of Washington was third.

Lewiston manager Hillis Layne batted his team into the Northwest Baseball League lead Wednesday night by hitting a two-run 12th inning homer that beat Salem, 5-3.

The Lewiston win, combined with Tri-City's 12-8 win over Yakima, gave the Chiefs a half-game lead over the Bears who slipped to second in the standings.

Wenatchee edged Eugene 4-3 in the night's other league game. Layne's big blow was a heart-breaker for Salem pitcher LeRoy Johnson. He had a three-hitter going into the 12th. He talked Lewiston pitcher Ken Mourund, who incidentally spread 10 Salem hits. Johnson got the next two batters out before serving up the fatal pitch to Layne.

Twink Pederson hit a two-run homer for Salem in the eighth. Layne drove in two other Lewiston runs in the fifth inning with a single.

Tri-City matched Yakima's five-run first inning with an eight-run second of its own in the donkeybrook at Yakima. Seven hits, including doubles by Ray Figueroa and Al Muench, provided the bulk of the Brave runs in the second inning outburst.

At Wenatchee, Elio Aboso provided a thrilling end to the game with Eugene. He broke up a 3-3 tie in the ninth by scoring all the way from second on an infield. Two were out at the time. Wenatchee had tied the game in the eighth when Charlie Turner singled home Flip Valdes.

Horse Wins Utah Endurance Test

ROOSEVELT, Utah (AP)—A winded, weary horse won but a New York City traffic cop and a North Carolina postman made a good showing for the human animal in a 157-mile marathon race.

The horse, with 24-year-old Stewart Paulick of Tooele, Utah aboard, crossed the finish line in this eastern Utah cattle town Wednesday afternoon just 28 hours, 31 minutes and 42 seconds after the race began in Salt Lake City Tuesday.

Paulick's horse, described as a seven-eighths thoroughbred, was placed under a veterinarian's care. It was feared he might be coming down with pneumonia.

When the horse reached Roosevelt, postman Paul (Hardrock) Simpson, 33, of Burlington, N.C., was still running—about 50 miles from the finish. He vowed he wouldn't quit until he reached Roosevelt. Officials—after ordering removal of his escort car and formally declaring the race ended—finally persuaded him to quit about 8 p.m. He was still about 35 miles short of his goal.

Edo Romagnoli, 37-year-old New York policeman from Ozone Park, N.Y., was neck-and-neck with the horse for 100 miles. But he dropped behind and quit at the 118-mile mark—his toenails worn off and his legs aching.

Romagnoli covered the 100 miles in 21 hours, 22 minutes.

"I don't think anyone ever ran 100 miles like that before," he said.

Three distance runners and four horsemen started the marathon.

Everybody Happy; U.S. And Russ Both Will Win In Moscow Meet

MOSCOW (AP)—American and Russian officials have been getting along so well that it was decided today neither team would lose—and both would win—the big track and field meet next Sunday and Monday here.

It's all in the scoring system. The Russians are going to score the men and women separately because they think it really is two separate meets. The American men are heavily favored and should have no trouble piling up a solid margin.

But the Russian women, likewise, appear to be far out front. By combining the two scores, the Russians probably will show a higher point total.

No Appeal Jury

Relations are so amicable, in fact, that there will be no jury of appeal, a standard fixture in international competition. Instead, Pinky Sober, chief of the AAU's track and field committee and a world authority on track and field rules, and Pavel Stepanenko of Russia will act as associate referees.

"Everything has been working fine," said Sober. "It couldn't be better."

Ted In Spitting Act; Fans Boo

BOSTON (AP)—Dispatches to Boston papers after Wednesday night's Kansas City Athletics' 3-1 victory over the Red Sox said Ted Williams spat again.

The Globe's Bob Holbrook said it happened in the fourth inning when Williams grounded out to Harry Simpson at first base. Holbrook wrote:

"He (Williams) jogged part way to first, saw the play was routine and then made an abrupt turn and started back to the dug-out."

"For his lack of fire on this play the Kansas City fans set up a crescendo of boos."

Boos Thunder
"Ted bristled, and made his dying swan leap, spitting at the fans as he piroquetted through the air. That's all the fans needed. They set up a thunderous round of boos, the spontaneity of which amazed the observers in this sector."

Tom Monahan wrote in the Traveler that Williams was in the spotlight after he had demonstrated "his hitting and spitting talents."

"This was nothing new for Williams," the story continued. "He had displayed a talent for both in the past. But while he has hit doubles repeatedly he had not demonstrated his powers of ex-pectoration since he was fined \$5,000 for doing the same thing (in Boston) two years ago."

Fued Begins
Mike Gillooly in his story to the American said Williams started a "wide open feud with the (Kansas City) fans."

"The fans were shocked," Gillooly said. "They booed more vigorously and then continued on Williams' every appearance the remainder of the game, even when he doubled off the left field wall to drive home the Sox' only run of the game in the eighth inning."

The biggest hit of the game was by North Bend's Bill Swain, who cracked a two-run, 360-foot homer over the left field fence.

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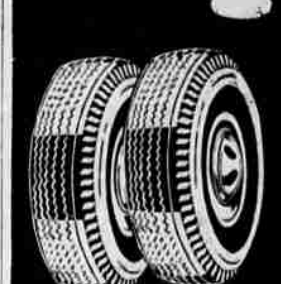
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
