Pete, Zora In Top Shape

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Heavyweight boxer Zora Folley and Pete Rademacher, each a fighter with a mission, were pronounced in top shape for their 10-round match Friday night.

Rademacher, former kingpin of the world amateurs, wants to prove that he can win as a professional. Folley hopes to score a quick knockout to remain in contention for the heavyweight crown.

Match On TV
The engagement at the Olympic Auditorium will be nationally televised by the National Broadcasting Co., starting at 8 p.m. PDT.

Los Angeles will be blacked out within a 150-mile radius. Sensational Mauro Vazquez of Mexico City meets Enrique Aceves, Los Angeles, in a 10-round featherweight bout.

Folley, 26, from Chandler, Ariz.,

with 45 pro fights to his credit, rates as a 2-1 favorite over Big Pete, a veteran of one.

Rademacher, 29-year-old Olympic Games champion from Columbus, Ga., by way of the state of Washington's rich Yakima Valley country, is the much talked about but virtually unseen fellow who stood boxing on his ear a year ago.

All he did was step directly from the amateur ranks to fight the greatest pro in the world, Floyd Patterson. Pete went down seven times and out in six rounds.

But here he is again, mixing it time with a top contender for Patterson's title, Zora Folley.

Whether the winner will get a crack at Patterson is something only the champion's manager, Gus D'Amato, can say. And this was not a sure thing.

Umpqua Post 16, American Legion, has approved a feverish two-day work project aimed at boosting the seating capacity of American Legion Park to 1,500 by the time the Roseburg Junior League team embarks on state playoff competition Wednesday night.

The executive committee of the post placed final approval on the weekend project Thursday night. Workmen will include at least 25 members of Carpenters and Joiners' Local 1961 plus other volunteer help.

All Help Volunteer
Rudie Ritzman, an executive board member, said all help will be volunteer. He said the union local has donated the aid of its membership to the project. He said anyone else with carpenter's experience is welcome to lend a hand, and added that such help will be greatly appreciated.

Refreshments will be served from the Umpqua Lions Club's concession stand, which was donated by the club for use during the project. The refreshments themselves will be donated by the legion, which will donate sandwiches and coffee, and the local Coca Cola Bottling Co., said Ritzman. Legion members will do the serving, assisted by Lions Club members.

He said work will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday and again at the same time Sunday.

Aim Is 1,000 Seats

The park, currently known as Stewart Field, has seated in the neighborhood of 600 since it was opened two weeks ago. It is that really just a two-team race in the National League. Or aren't those St. Louis Cardinals dead after all?

While there's hardly any daylight from third to seventh in the race behind Milwaukee and San Francisco, the Cardinals appear to be the only club capable of a serious challenge, even with two months to go.

Trouble is, the Cardinals, just off their second seven-game slump of the season, still have to prove they're breathing. They've won four of their last six, and trail the skidding third-place Chicago Cubs by only half a game, but they're still fourth, 6 1/2 games back.

Sad Sam Jones, seldom given much support, made the Cards look like winners yesterday, shutting out the Braves 4-0 with a four-hitter.

It was Sam's fourth consecutive victory, but he just managed to clear .500 with an 8-7 record. The Cards have averaged less than three runs in his defeats, have averaged less than four in the games he's won.

Braves Keep Split

Despite a split in four games with the Cardinals, the Braves retained first place by a half game since second-place San Francisco was rained out at Philadelphia. The Cubs lost their fifth straight 4-3 at Cincinnati. Pittsburgh whipped Los Angeles 5-3.

In the American League, the New York Yankees took their largest lead yet, 13 1/2 games, with a 10-7 victory at Detroit. Second-place Boston was rained out at Kansas City. Baltimore beat the

Chicago White Sox 7-3, and Cleveland defeated Washington 6-1.

The Cardinals got rid of 12-game winner Warren Spahn, who has whipped them 50 times in his career, with two runs after two were out in the first inning. Consecutive singles by Stan Musial, Ken Boyer, Del Ennis and Gene Freese counted the pair and brought on Bob Rush, who gave up two more in the fifth.

The slipping Cubs, only 2 1/2 games behind a week ago, blew a 3-2 lead when Ed Bailey rapped a two-run homer, his seventh, off losing reliever Bill Henry (2-1).

The Pirates, just .001 ahead of Cincinnati, gained a 13-7 season edge over Los Angeles. A four-run fourth, triggered by rookie Dick Stuart's two-run fifth homer, did it.

Duren Clouted

Ryne Duren, the New York Yankees' ace reliever, finally has been plunked.

A pitch by Paul Foytack felled the controversial rookie, frequently accused of throwing at batters, in the Yankees' 10-7 victory at Detroit yesterday. He apparently wasn't seriously injured — just a bruised and cut left cheek — but he'll stay in a hospital for several days for observation.

Duren's mates call him Mr. Magoo. Casey Stengel calls him "my blind man."

The rest of the American League calls the big right-hander with the thick specs less humorous things. They say he zeroes in before ruffing his high, hard and inside stuff. Duren denies he deliberately throws at anyone. He's hit two.

The pitch from Foytack, who also throws hard, came on a two-strike, no-ball count in the ninth, after the Tigers had blown a 3-0 lead. Duren had worked two innings of perfect relief, dunking slugger Al Kaline with his first pitch.

The Yankees, blanked for six innings on one hit by Jim (No-Hit) Bunning, left Detroit for Cleveland with a three-game sweep and a 13 1/2-game lead, their largest yet.

Birds, Tribe Win

Baltimore whipped the Chicago White Sox 7-3 and moved within two games of second-place Boston, rained out at Kansas City. Cleveland smacked Washington 6-1.

Four homers counted nine runs for the Yankees. Marv Throneberry walloped a three-run homer in the seventh. Yogi Berra's 16th was good for two and chased Bunning in the eighth. Gil McDougald and Mickey Mantle (26) blasted in a four-run ninth after Duren was hit. Rookie Milt Pappas hit his first pro homer and won his seventh for the Orioles, giving up only five hits, but walking six. Jim Wilson (6-7) lost. Bob Nieman hit a two-run homer for the Birds, who had 12 hits.

Gary Bell, another rookie right-hander, allowed Washington only four hits for a 4-4 record. The Nats

had but one hit for six. Ken Aspromonte's third-inning homer. Russ Nixon had four hits, one a homer, and drove in four runs — a two-day total of seven — for the Tribe.

Duren Beating Stirs NY, Tiger Player Feud

DETROIT (AP) — The New York Yankees and the Detroit Tigers had a mild rhubarb going today over the pitch that felled Yankee reliever ace Ryne Duren.

The 29-year-old right-hander, credited with 16 saves and a leading candidate for Rookie of the Year and Most Valuable Player awards, was hospitalized after he was struck high on the left cheek by one of Paul Foytack's fast balls in the ninth inning of yesterday's contest at Briggs Stadium.

He was being observed Friday for possible concussion and attendants at the Detroit Memorial Hospital reported he was in "fair" condition, a term used for persons being observed for concussion.

The Yankees won the game 10-7 to complete a sweep of the three-game series, but Duren — who was credited with the victory — is to spend several days in a Detroit hospital. He suffered a bruise and a cut that required several stitches to close.

Doctors said X-rays were negative and that there was no cranial injury.

The Tigers denied the incident was deliberate but some of the Yankee players maintained that it was. One New York player said Foytack "looked into the Tiger dugout just before he threw the ball."

Duren, who had to be carried from the field on a stretcher, nearly hit the first Detroit batter he faced. His first pitch, a high inside fast ball, sent Al Kaline sprawling into the dirt. Just last week the Kansas City Athletics accused Duren of deliberately hitting slugger Bob Cerv.

Detroit Manager Bill Norman said, "I would never tell any pitcher to throw at any batter. Sure, the pitchers brush the batters back. That's baseball. But I wouldn't want my pitchers throwing at anybody. You could kill or maim a guy doing that."

Foytack denied he threw at Duren. "I was just trying to get out of the inning," he said, "and the pitch got away from me."

Three teams were jammed up at the top of the Pacific Coast League standings Friday, with the San Diego Padres holding the top spot by one lonesome percentage point over Phoenix's Giants and the Vancouver Mounties.

Seattle's 1-0 victory over Vancouver Thursday night and the Giants' 10-1 inning, 3-1 decision over the Padres set up the log jam at the head of the standings.

Portland split a twin bill with Sacramento, the Beavers losing the nightcap 3-0 as Roger Osenbaugh threw a two-hitter for the Solons and then winning 6-3. Salt Lake City cracked a three-game losing streak by whipping Spokane 6-2.

Wienand Wins

Ted Wienand won it for the Rainiers, holding the Mounties to three hits while striking out nine. He had a no-hitter working until the eighth inning when Bill LaJoie hit a hot grounder that bounded off first baseman Hal Bevan's glove for a single.

Seattle's run came in the last of the ninth. A walk and a wild pitch sent Seattle's Gale Wade up on second, then Jim Wade pounded out a single that sent Wade around.

Portland Prep Athlete

Enrolls At Oregon State
CORVALLIS (AP) — One of Portland's top high school athletes will enroll at Oregon State College this fall. Track Coach Sam Bell announced Thursday.

He is Norm Fones, who won the Portland 800-yard track while competing for Grant High School last spring. Fones placed second in the 880 in the state A-1 prep meet.

Salem Counts 2 More

The Senators scored twice more in the sixth while holding Lewiston to single runs in the second, fifth and ninth innings.

The win went to Salem's pitcher-manager, Vern Kindsfater, who now holds an 11-8 season record. Wenatchee's defeat of Eugene swept the three-game series and lengthened the Emeralds' losing streak to seven games.

Bob Campbell whiffed 17 to earn his third win of the year against four defeats. He allowed only nine hits, two of which were solo homers by Bailey Brem, in the seventh, and Bill Eastburn, in the eighth.

The loss went to Brem to run his record to 10-9.

Eugene overcame a two-run deficit to tie it in the eighth but Wenatchee came back in its half of the inning with five hits, three of them doubles, to score three runs and take the game.

The teams change fields Friday. Yakima hopes to increase its lead at the expense of the fifth place Emeralds at Eugene; Tri-City travels to Lewiston to battle for second place, and Wenatchee moves to Salem.

Phoenix's two winning runs in the 10th were set up by San Diego by errors which placed Jim Finigan on third and Bill Wilson on first. Finigan scored on a sacrifice fly and Wilson moved home on Andre Rodgers' single.

Salt Lake got all of their runs by pairs, two in the third, two in the fifth and two in the eighth.

Singles by Maury Wills, Tom Saffell and Glen Gorbous and an error accounted for Spokane's two runs in the seventh inning.

Osenbaugh Hot

Osenbaugh of Sacramento didn't give the Beavers a hit until the sixth inning, when Alex Cosmides swatted out a double that went for naught. The Solons, meanwhile struck for their three runs in the first inning on Jim Westlake's single, Nippy Jones' single and Cal Segrist's triple.

The Beavers spotted Sacramento a 2-0 lead in the first inning of the nightcap and then stormed back to give veteran Larry Jansen his sixth victory in 14 decisions. Jansen gave up nine hits, including Jim Greengrass' solo homer in the ninth. Dave Melton got a single, a double and a homer for Portland in five trips to the plate.

Bell Says Pro Football Could Use Exemptions
WASHINGTON (AP) — Commissioner Bert Bell of the National Football League says pro football could stay alive with limited exemptions from the nation's business laws. Rep Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) says pro sports can't be trusted with anything but limited exemptions.

Bell and Celler expressed their views on a House-passed sports bill yesterday as the Senate anti-monopoly subcommittee closed the football end of its hearings.

The group headed by Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) turns back briefly to baseball next week and then winds up with basketball, hockey and harness racing.

Signs are that the subcommittee will approve something less than the blanket antitrust law exemptions proposed in the House measure. Several members have suggested the bill goes too far. It is designed to remove doubts as to the legality of sports' player reserves and drafts, territorial and broadcast rights.

Celler has proposed that exemptions be limited to those a court would hold are reasonably necessary to the games. The House brushed aside his bill, voting instead the flat exemptions now under Senate study.

Celler told the Senators that lobbyists for organized sports have "descended on Washington like locusts" to push the House-passed bill.

Bell said pro football would much prefer the bill with broad exemptions but would accept Celler's proposal in the absence of anything else.

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Chinook Run Nearing End In Umpqua

The spring chinook run in the Umpqua River apparently is nearing its end for this year, although there was a slight surge in the migration during the first half of July.

The Oregon Game Commission said the migration of adults reached 3,695 fish at the counting board at Winchester Dam July 15, with 94 fish being counted during the first 15 days of the month.

Normally, about 95 per cent of the migration is complete by that date.

In the meantime, the summer steelhead run is on in full force, with 612 fish being counted during the first half of the month. That brought the total of the run so far to 946.

The percentage of the run completed by July 15 has fluctuated from 31 to 39 since 1949.
