

Portland Preps No Longer Will Be Privileged

PORTLAND (AP) — Athletes will get no more special privileges in Portland public high schools. Superintendent J. W. Edwards Thursday said he has ordered a general crackdown on extra-curricular activities—with the major pressure on athletics.

No longer, he said, will athletes be excused from class or study halls for games or practice sessions. And he put a 5:30 p. m. time limit on all practice sessions.

Other activities also will be curtailed sharply, including band and choir appearances for non-school events.

This will have some effect on school participation in the city's annual Rose Festival.

Complete details will be worked out later.

Eugene's Guburd Is Coast Semi-Finalist

WARRENTON (AP)—John Hedlund, and David Munro of Portland, Ralph Dichter of Astoria, and Keith Guburd of Eugene compete Friday in the semifinals of the men's championship round of the Oregon Coast golf tournament.

On Thursday, 15-year-old Hedlund defeated Phil Underwood of Portland on the 23rd hole. Munro edged John Kennedy of Astoria 1 up.

Dichter, who is medalist for the tourney, easily eliminated John Rippet of Astoria 3 and 2. And Guburd defeated Neil Sater of Portland 4 and 3.

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Jr. College Says Pro Aspect May Cause Pull-Out

LONGVIEW (AP) — Emphasis on what was described as the professional aspects of junior college sports may cause Lower Columbia Junior College to withdraw from the Washington state junior college conference.

The School Board voted approval of the stand taken by School Superintendent Scott Milligan who told board members, "Lower Columbia Junior College does not intend to play semi-pro junior college football."

Future relations with the conference depend on a study now being conducted in an effort to evolve an enforceable code of ethics for conference athletics, Milligan added.

He charged other schools in the conference with offering financial inducements to Kelso-Longview athletes for enrolling at their schools. He also said some conference participants are ignoring the rules governing scholarships and grants-in-aid.

An ex-coach himself, Milligan did not call present practices "wicked," but said they definitely were not in the best interests of the players.

Maverick Strong Tahoe Favorite

TAHOE CITY, Calif. (AP) A husky unlimited hydroplane called Maverick is the big favorite among at least 10 of the world's fastest speed boats in Saturday's sixth annual Lake Tahoe mile high regatta.

The 2½-ton craft, kicked along by a 12-cylinder, 2,500-horsepower aircraft engine, warmed up for the Mages Cup race at 115 miles an hour. Veteran driver Bill Stead of Reno was at the controls.

Millionaire Arizona sportsman William Waggoner claims his sleek Maverick has clocked 205 m.p.h. on Lake Mead. Maverick won the diamond cup races at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, several weeks ago.

Fans pick Ole Bardahl's Miss Bardahl from Seattle, winner of the Apple Cup at Lake Chelan, Wash., as another hot contender. At Miss Bardahl's controls will be Miro Slovak, who won here last year aboard Miss Whahoo.

Other entries include Thriftway Too owned by Associated Grocers, Inc., Seattle.

Gifford Aims For More Grid Season Movies After One

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Although he has signed a long-term movie contract, Frank Gifford plans another year of football with the New York Giants.

The star halfback said he will leave Tuesday for the Giants' training camp at Salem, Ore.

Gifford said he decided in favor of football when he saw teammates Harlan Sware, Cliff Livingston and Charley Conerly packing for training camp.

"You bums give me itchy feet," he told his pals. "I'm going up there with you if I have to break my contract."

Gifford announced his retirement from pro football after the close of the 1957 season.

4 Champs Among U.S. Boxers Set For Mexico Go

SEATTLE (AP) — Eight boxers, four of them national champions, have been chosen to represent the United States Aug. 6-9 in the second annual international amateur boxing tournament in Mexico City.

Al Neff, international chairman of the show, said Friday the American team would reach Mexico City Aug. 2 by air.

Twenty-one nations have entered teams in the world-wide fistic event which was inaugurated here last year.

The Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) selected the United States entry, picking boxers at 111 weights except 125 and 165 pounds. These two divisions still may be represented before the team heads south, Neff said.

The national amateur titlists on the squad are Charles Branch, Philadelphia, 115 pounds; Vincent Shomo, New York, 139; Sylvester Banks, St. Louis, 178; and James Blythe, Hartford, Conn., heavyweight.

Three of the others were finalists in the 1958 AAU tournament. They are Cyril Woodland, Philadelphia, 112 pounds; Norman Johnson, Indianapolis, 147; and Wilbur McClure, Toledo, 156. The eighth man is Adam Ellison of Columbus, O., veteran 132-pounder.

Player, Rosburg, Fetchick In Tie

BALTIMORE (AP) — Gary Player, the successful South African invader, and two domestic golfers desperately trying to regain the winning touch went into the second round of the Eastern Open Tournament today sharing the lead with 4-under-par 68s.

Deadlocked with Player were Bob Rosburg, Palo Alto, Calif., and Mike Fetchick, Yonkers, N.Y.

Although he has won a cool \$15,000 this year by consistently finishing in the money, Rosburg hasn't won a major tournament since the San Diego Open in October 1956. Fetchick's last No. 1 haul came two months later in the Sanford Open.

Behind the three leaders over the rain-soaked Mt. Pleasant course came four players with 69 — Art Wall Jr., Pocono Manor, Pa.; Lionel Hebert, Lafayette, La.; Wesley Ellis Jr., Ridgewood, N.J.; and Walker Inman Jr., Eglin Air Force Base, Fla.

Lionel's brother, Jay Hebert of Sanford, Fla., was among five players who posted 70. The others were Bill Ezrnicki, the former hockey player from Lynfield, Mass.; Marty Furgol, Lemont, Ill.; Don Stough, York, Pa.; and John O'Donnell, pro at Mt. Pleasant.

The 71 shooters included National Open champion Tommy Bolt, former Masters, PGA king Jack Burke and 10 others.

The veteran Sam Snead had a 72.

Two Fishing Boats Bring In Big Loads Of Albacore

ASTORIA (AP) — Two fishing boats have brought 5½-ton loads of albacore to packers at the mouth of the Columbia River. Fishermen said early reports indicate one of the best tuna seasons in years.

More boats, which have radioed reports of good tuna catches are due later this week. The boat operators have been catching their tuna about 130 miles off Newport.

Base price for the tuna was \$425 per ton, the highest in several years. Last year's maximum was \$300.

A number of spring halibut boats and salmon vessels here were reported rigging for tuna fishing. The salmon catches have been poor here this year.
