Duren Hurt Said Brain Concussion

DETROIT (AP) — New York Yankee pitcher Rindolf Duren suffered a brain concussion when he was hit on the left cheek by a pitched ball here Thursday and will be hospitalized several days, his physician said.

Dr. A. H. Whitaker, however, described Duren's condition as good Friday.

"I have ordered a series of tests to determine whether there was brain injury, although I do not think there was," the doctor added.

The physician said Duren bore no resentment over the incident.

U. S. Distance Men Not Conceding To Russ, Hold Secret Workouts

MOSCOW (AP) — U.S. distance runners, never an internationally feared group, refuse to concede anything to their Soviet opponents in the mammoth dual track and field meet opening tomorrow in 100,000-seat Lenin Stadium.

World track experts say the Soviet distance runners will run off and hide from the Americans in the races of more than 1,500 meters.

But the U.S. distance men ran "off in the park somewhere" yesterday, hiding special tactics they were apparently cooking up for the 5,000 and 10,000 meter runs and the 3,000 meter steeplechase.

The steeplechase, won by Horace Ashenfelter at the 1952 Olympic Games in Helsinki, was the only distance title Americans have won in the Olympics since 1908.

Officials Mum

No American official would elaborate on the brief information about the park. But when the six U.S. distance runners failed to train with the rest of the men and women preparing for the two-day meet, it appeared the United States was trying to match Soviet distance superiority with American ingenuity.

With the score tied, 1-1, in the bottom of the third, Eugene launched a three-run rally on a Yakima error and was never headed after that.

A crucial hit in the inning was a double by Carl Hutzler.

Yakima's quickie lead in the first frame came when Pepper Thomas homered.

It didn't last long. Eugene tied it in the bottom of the first when Tommy Agosta singled in Mickey Hopkins, who had tripled.

Lewiston flexed its muscles in scoring a win over Tri-City. Two-run homers by Rodger Herrscher, in the second, and Hillis Layne, in the sixth, were instrumental in keeping the Broncs ahead of the fighting Bears.

Salem Hurler Wild

Salem pitcher Hal Reniff walked three in a row in the first frame against Wenatchee. Bob Famous promptly stepped up, clouted a double and the Chiefs were ahead by two runs.

A third-inning homer over the left field wall by Joe Wilson was the eventual winning run.

Game Commission Sets Regulations For 1958 Hunts

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon's Game Commission Friday approved final regulations for deer, elk and bird seasons for the 1958 hunting season.

The buck deer season was set for Oct. 4 through Oct. 26 in all parts of Oregon.

The elk season was set for Nov. 1 to Nov. 16 in the Coast Range, with the remainder of the state from Nov. 1 to Nov. 26.

The commission set the pheasant season from Oct. 11 to Nov. 16 throughout the state. A bag limit of four cocks a day and 12 in possession will be allowed.

Hunters will be allowed a bonus of one hen in the bag or in possession in Malheur County only Nov. 8-No. 16.

McMurtry Speed Pitted Against Norkus Punch

TACOMA (AP) — It will be boxing skill and speed versus ring savvy and sock when heavyweights Pat McMurtry and Charley Norkus meet here Saturday night.

McMurtry, until recently rated among the world's 10 top heavyweights, is considered the favorite by virtue of his speed and boxing skill. The young Tacoma man has won 27 fights, lost two and boxed one draw in his professional career.

Norkus, however, is given a good chance to win because of his experience and solid right hand wallop. He has a record of 32 wins and 27 losses.

McMurtry, who has had two wins since his loss to Will Beamanoff last February, wound up heavy training Wednesday weighing 185. At that time Norkus weighed 193.

Ted Apologizes For KC Incident

CHICAGO (AP) — Red Sox outfielder Ted Williams apologized Friday for spitting at the fans during a Red Sox-Athletics game at Kansas City Wednesday night.

A statement released by Red Sox spokesmen in his name said: "I'm sorry I did it. I was so mad at the park that I lost my temper and afterward I was sorry about it."

American League President Will Harridge fined Williams \$250 on Thursday, saying the Red Sox star's spitting was "conduct detrimental to the best interests of baseball."

Manager Mike Higgins refused to comment as the Red Sox arrived in Chicago for a three game series with the White Sox.

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Rademacher Decked Four Times, KO'd

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The strange saga of Pete Rademacher must be over or is it? While Zora Folley stands out today as the top contender for a crack at the world heavyweight championship.

Big Pete tried his hand at professional fighting for the second time last night, and it was even worse than the first time.

The dangerous hitting Folley, from Chandler, Ariz., knocked the former amateur king out in one minute 15 seconds of the fourth round.

It took Floyd Patterson, the world titleholder, six rounds to do it at Seattle last August.

Folley had 29-year-old Zora, who split a pair of decisions with Pete when they were amateurs.

Sportsman Rademacher was high in praise of Folley.

"Frankly," said Pete, "Patterson was nothing like this fellow. He had real power — and he was very good with his head."

Rademacher referred to the only controversy of the scheduled 10-rounder. He said Folley, accidentally or otherwise butted him in the second round.

The referee called it a punch, and to some ring observers, it seemed more likely that when Rademacher's long right slopped over Folley's shoulder, they simply collided with a bang.

In any event, Folley was never in trouble, and it took but one short right chop to the jaw that traveled hardly 12 inches to start Pete on the downhill road. Another short right to the chin sent him down again.

But before the round ended Pete charged Folley into the ropes and they fought savagely seconds after the bell sounded.

Rademacher came out with a rush in the fourth but ran straight into a beautiful right cross and down he went again.

Folley closed in, there was a flurry capped by a ripping uppercut to the chin, and that was it.

Later Pete was asked if he would fight again.

"I'll write you a letter," he quipped. But a moment afterward he said he wanted to mix it again, maybe in six weeks. He has no idea where or against whom.

Folley, now unbeaten since 1955, weighed 200, Rademacher 188.

Matchmaker George Parnassus renewed an offer to Patterson of \$250,000 for an outdoor fight against Folley in Los Angeles in September or October.

Dichter, playing sharply on his home course, defeated David Munro of Portland on the 20th hole in his semifinal match.

Saturday's title engagement was the second meeting of the year between Dichter and Gubrud.

Earlier, Gubrud defeated Dichter 3 and 2 in the semifinals of the Oregon Amateur. Gubrud lost the title match — on the Astoria Country Club course.

MCCALL, Idaho (AP) — The Vandals should go it alone, the University of Idaho's representative to the Pacific Coast Conference told a booster club meeting here Friday night.

Idaho would be better off playing as an independent, he said, but should maintain its close athletic ties with Coast and North-west schools.
