Northwest Shingle Mills Shut Down By Strike

SEATTLE (AP)—Northwest shingle mills were shutdown this week after a midnight walkout of shingle weavers.

The strike is the result of a contract dispute between employees and the Washington-Oregon Shingle Weavers' Union Council over wages.

Approximately 2,000 workers employed at mills in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana were affected by the walkout.

The union is seeking a 7½-cent hourly cost-of-living increase and changes in working conditions. A 3-cent an hour increase offered by employers was rejected.

Representatives of the two groups have met with James L. Macpherson, federal labor conciliator, without success.

Magnuson Says Russia Planning Tunnel To Alaska

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) disclosed Friday he is seeking detailed information on a Russian proposal for construction of a rail and vehicular tunnel under Bering Strait to connect America and Asia.

Magnuson, chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, said he has asked Soviet engineer Arkady Markin for a complete copy of the proposal he made public at the Brussels World Fair.

Markin, of the U. S. S. R. Power Institute in the Soviet Academy of Science, proposed joint U. S.-Soviet action to construct such a tunnel.

When the information is obtained, Magnuson said, he wants to discuss it with officials of Canada and Alaska at a meeting next fall of the Alaska International Highway Commission, of which he is vice chairman.

In his letter to Markin, Magnuson recalled that a similar Bering Strait tunnel proposal was made "at the turn of the century" by New York railway magnate E. H. Harriman, father of New York Gov. W. Averell Harriman.

The senator said a study of the Harriman proposal left him "deeply intrigued" by the possibilities it offered in expanding trade and development in the North Pacific area and increasing intercontinental trade "between America, Asia and Europe."

Plans Outlined For World Series Of U.S. Cowboys

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—Plans were outlined Thursday for the first annual world series of rodeo, a five-day climax to the 11-month season for U.S. cowboys.

John VanCronkhite, Nacogdoches, Tex., who is named to head the sponsoring commission, said the first such event will be held in December 1959. The site has not been picked.

"This is something we have dreamed of for years," said VanCronkhite, a businessman and rodeo performer. "It will be rodeo's biggest payoff, with \$30,000 prize money plus entry fees."

World champions will be crowned in each of seven rodeo events used by the Rodeo Cowboys Assn. in figuring top money winners, he said. These are bareback and saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, calf roping, Brahma bull riding, steer roping and team roping.

Seven members of the commission were named. VanCronkhite said he would set up an office in Denver.

India Likes Soft, White Wheat

PORTLAND (AP)—India prefers the soft white wheat of the Pacific Northwest to the red wheat grown in areas east of the Rockies.

That announcement came from the Oregon Wheat Growers League and four members of the Indian government wheat mission after a meeting here Thursday.

The League is protesting a federal Department of Agriculture plan to shift Indian wheat allotments under the surplus disposal program to Gulf and Atlantic ports, where surplus red wheat is stored.

"It is about time that the United States Department of Agriculture should be pleased the customer country," said Robert Steward, Oregon agriculture director.

"Pacific Northwest wheat growers should work through their congressional delegation at Washington to break the false moral concept which is blocking the export sale of some Oregon wheat," he said.

About 25 per cent of the wheat grown in the Pacific Northwest is of the soft white variety.

The Indian delegation is scheduled to tour a bakery and grain handling facilities here.

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Cost Of Living Rises 105 Per Cent Since 1938, New Government Figures Show

WASHINGTON (AP)—Living costs have gone up 105 per cent in the 20 years since 1938, years that have included World War II and the Korean War.

That means that on the average, you must pay \$2.05 today for something you could have bought for a dollar back in 1938, when Hitler was poised for his blitz of Europe.

A bit of analysis into what's happened seemed in order after the government released its latest living cost index this week. It showed a fractional rise from May to June, less than one-tenth of one per cent. But it was a new living cost record, the 20th set in the past 22 months.

Figures Provided Government experts provided figures on request showing the story of those 20 years, two decades, broken down into five-year stanzas.

While the over-all living cost level soared 105 per cent in those 20 years some individual family budget items didn't go up that much and some advanced much more.

For example, where the cost of gas and electricity rose only a little over 11 per cent, coal and fuel oil jumped 129 per cent.

In the 1938-58 span the cost of a

pair of baby shoes rose 171 per cent, a new car 125 per cent, rent 60 per cent and food—the main drain on the family budget—a whopping 151 per cent.

Oddly enough, costs of men's clothes in those two decades rose 110 per cent, but women's clothes climbed only 78 per cent.

Rise Now Slower

Now turn to the past five years under Eisenhower, in which living costs have risen 8 per cent. This again is a composite of many different changes.

For example, in the 1953-58 period food has increased 7.8 per cent, housing 8.6, rents 11, gas-electricity 9.7, coal-fuel oil 6.3, and clothing 1.8 per cent. Hospital costs rose 33 per cent, hospitalization insurance the same, shoes 12.7, haircuts 23.1, movies 25 and newspapers 20.

But in the past five years there were substantial price declines, too. Appliances, probably due to price discounts, declined 15 per cent, including TV sets 6 per cent, radios 10 per cent, refrigerators 33 per cent and vacuum cleaners 33 per cent.

You can't beat it. But one government price-watchers say he's now getting out of all the letters he can to friends. Reason: The four-cent stamp goes into effect Aug. 1.

New Home For Orphans Now Getting Final Touches By Sponsor Harry Holt

SEOUL (AP)—In a quiet green valley at the northwestern edge of this city stands a new home for orphans with most facilities built to find in other orphanages.

Busy giving it the finishing touch is Harry Holt, a 53-year-old farmer from Creswell, Ore., who in 2½ years has single-handedly arranged adoption by U.S. families of 902 mixed blood children from Korea.

Another large group of children—70 to 80—is expected to fly Wednesday with him to their new homes in the United States.

"I wanted to make this home as cheerful as possible for the children, who will be away from home when they leave their mothers," Holt said.

The orphanage will serve as a temporary home for up to 200 children—mostly fathered by American soldiers—while they wait for completion of immigration processes here.

Cost \$40,000 Holt expects that he will have spent about \$40,000 for the new home when it is completed some time in October. He said children will move soon into the already finished main building. The construction began early last month.

The home standing on a two-acre lot consists of five buildings. The main building, where the children will live, a hospital and clinic, a warehouse and laundry house, a dormitory for girl attendants, and a doctor's house.

The buildings will have hot and cold running water, power around the clock, and central heating.

Children are now housed in a rented building in downtown Seoul. It often gets overcrowded. The new home is about four times the size of the old one.

Asked to pose for a picture in front of the light gray buildings, Holt said with a twinkle in his eyes: "I'm a little bit of a show-off, but I'm the dirtiest looking man around."

Didn't Wipe Off Sweat

He did not bother to wipe sweat and dust off his face or tidy his greying hair. He moves about busily among a group of Korean construction workers every day from dawn to sunset, looking exactly the opposite of the common Korean concept of a rich, smartly dressed American.

The ruddy-faced farmer wearing a faded pink sports shirt, khaki trousers and "two-year-old" shoes draws approving friendly smiles from passersby when he rides downtown in a rickety Korean bus. When he leaves here for home, he will do so with dual pleasure. While taking another large group

of youngsters to happy new homes, he will also be headed for a ceremony in Eugene, Ore., July 28 where eight children he adopted from Korea nearly three years ago will become U.S. citizens.

The children, four boys and four girls, three to six in age, live with the Holts who have six children of their own.

Washington Court Rules Advertising On Meters Okay

OLYMPIA (AP)—The Washington State Supreme Court upheld Thursday the right of a city to sell advertising space on its parking meters.

In two concurring opinions, the high court held that the city of Yakima had not violated its right in passing an ordinance and contracting with a private firm for advertising on parking meters in the Central Washington city.

The advertising had been challenged by Roy Winkler and the Republic Publishing Co. They had relied upon a Pennsylvania county court decision in which the trial judge had said: "If the city's position is tenable, it could then divert to private and commercial use all forms of apparatus maintained by the city on sidewalks and public property."

"Thus, the city's fire trucks, fire alarm boxes, police call boxes and traffic light standards could be utilized by the city for commercial advertising, if the principle for which defendants are here contending is valid."

The purpose of opinion of the Washington Supreme Court, written by Judge Robert C. Finley, said "a parade of horrible possibilities is not necessarily a sound reason for invalidating an ordinance or a legislative enactment."

Neuberger Gives Up Now On Wilderness Proposal

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) says he and other backers of a bill which would create a vast wilderness area have given up for the time being.

"With some problems unresolved, the measure does not appear able to gain majority support at this time," Neuberger said. He said, though, that the bill probably will be put before the Senate at its next session.

Neuberger said hearings on the measure probably would be held in Portland, Lake City and Steamboat, Colo.

The bill would create a system of federal lands which would be preserved in their natural state. Some lumber and cattle interests fought the measure, saying it would impede the West's economic development.

Four Horses Bolt During Cheyenne's Big Rodeo

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—Before thousands of startled spectators, four horses bolted while pulling a stagecoach in the Cheyenne Frontier Days Rodeo. One of them was dragged for two blocks and was covered with blood before the rig was stopped.

Mrs. Leora Krueger, 50, Berthoud, Colo., suffered a broken leg but 11 children inside the stage escaped injury when they were pulled out in time.

The horses were halted by Floyd Farris, who rode alongside the runaway and slowed them to a stop.
