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Roseburg Swim Club Takes 3rd In Eugene Meet

Paced by Jim Ridenour and Karen Wishart, the Roseburg Swimming Club easily nabbed third place Saturday in an invitational meet held in Eugene.

Coach Don Jacklin's charges scored 17 points. The powerful Eugene Swimming Club walked away with first place honors, scoring 397 points to 219 for runnerup Eugene Country Club.

Following Roseburg in the seven-team meet were North Bend, 44; Eugene YMCA, 24; Eugene River Road Swimming Club, 17, and San Francisco Olympic Club, 3.

Ridenour, swimming against some of the top splashers in the state, took down four second places and one third place. He nabbed second in a pair of 100-yard breaststroke races and the 100 yard individual medley and was a member of Roseburg's runnerup 133 yard relay team. He also swam on the third-place team in the other relay race.

Of special note was Ridenour's victory over Eugene's Deluke, one of the top swimmers in the state, in one of the breaststroke races.

Bob Steele took first place in diving competition for boys 17-years-old and over. Another first place finisher for Roseburg was Jed Young, who won the boys' 14-and-under backstroke event.

Miss Wishart won three places, including a second in the girls' 15-and-16-years-old freestyle race. Linda Carter nabbed second in girls' diving competition in the same division.

Jacklin said Roseburg's next competition will come on Aug. 9, when the locals host teams from Oregon and California in the Southern Oregon Invitational Swimming Championships.

Dichter Beats Gubrud In Ore. Coast Finals

ASTORIA (AP) — Lanky Keith Gubrud of Eugene might well be wary of playing in any more golf tournaments on the Astoria Country Club course.

The University of Oregon student was beaten in the finals of the Oregon Coast Tournament Saturday by Ralph Dichter—the second time this summer he has dropped a title match here.

Dichter pulled out a 2 and 1 triumph for his second Oregon Coast crown as Gubrud failed on a putt that would have pulled him even late in the match.

Earlier this year, Gubrud lost on this course in the finals of the Oregon Amateur to Bob Atkinson Jr. of Portland.

The women's title was won by young blonde June Robinson of Tillamook, who downed Portland's Molly Murphy by a 5 and 4 margin.

Last year Miss Robinson lost to the Portland players in the finals of this same tourney. But Saturday she picked up a seven-hole lead on the first round and walked to victory.

Dichter now has won the Coast crown twice, and been runnerup to the title four times. In the recent amateur test, he was beaten by Gubrud.

Taylor, Seattle Amateur, Cops NW Open Crown

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — Smooth Don Taylor, the Seattle amateur, won the laurels Sunday, but Twin Falls professional Cliff Whittle took home the cash in the Northwest Open golf tournament.

Taylor fired a 72-hole score of 278, cutting par by 6 strokes, for first place in the tourney. Whittle came in second with a 280, to win the \$800 first place prize money in the \$3,500 event.

Whittle and Taylor were tied at 63 holes, but Taylor gained two strokes on the final nine.

Four were tied at 282, good enough for third place. They were amateur Newt Carter of Boise and pros Bunny Mason, Salem, Ore.; Bill Eggers, Portland, Ore.; and Ockie Eliason, Tacoma, Wash. Eliason won the event in 1955 and 1956.

Giant Rooks Practice; Vets To Arrive Tuesday

Wall Wins Sudden Death Playoff For Eastern Open Title

BALTIMORE (AP) — Fording a new check for \$2,800, Art Wall Jr. must be thinking sweet thoughts today of a druggist at Honesdale, Pa.

The check is Wall's prize for defeating Bob Rosburg and Jack Burke yesterday on the first hole of a spine-tingling sudden death playoff in the Eastern Open Golf Tournament.

The druggist is George Lang, a long-time friend of Art's father. Lang once owned the antique wooden-shafted putter with which Wall yesterday sank an eight-foot birdie putt on the first extra hole at Mt. Pleasant golf course. He gave the club to Art for a Christmas present 13 years ago.

Rosburg and Burke matched par 5 on the showdown hole after they and Wall each had fired a 5-under-par 67 to finish the regulation holes all even at 276.

Earlier, Wall had canned a 15-footer for a birdie on the last green to gain the tie. Rosburg, playing with him in the next-to-last three-some on the course, also birdied the final hole, dropping a six-foot putt.

Gary Player, the bouncy little South African who had led the field by one stroke going into the last round, staged a rousing finish by birdying the last two holes. But his 69 was good enough for only a 277 total and fourth place.

Jim Ferree of Winston-Salem, N.C., also posted a final round 67 to finish with Mike Fetchick in a tie for fifth at 283. Fetchick had 71 yesterday.

One stroke behind them came Don Fairfield with a 71 in the finale, and Gene Littler, 72. Among six players tied at 285 were Sam Snead, with 74 yesterday, George Bayer, 71, Marty Furgol, 70, Jay Hebert, 70, Bob Goaly, 72, and Clarence Doser, 70.

Norkus, Loser To McMurtry, Says Pat's Better Than Harris

*TACOMA (AP) — The pride of Tacoma is a "better and much faster fighter" than the pride of Cut-and-Shoot in the considered opinion of Charley Norkus, fistic investigator from Port Washington, N.Y.

The pride of Cut-and-Shoot, Texas, Roy Harris, is getting ready to meet Floyd Patterson Aug. 18 in Los Angeles for the world title. Norkus lost a 10-round decision to him two years ago.

Bloody-nosed and sore-thumbed, the New Yorker completed his two-fighter study here Saturday night. Norkus, 193, tested Irish Pat McMurtry, 185, for 10 rounds and found the Tacoma's left jab satisfactory, his left hook excellent and his combinations more than ample.

The referee and two judges graded McMurtry 100 per cent on the 10-point must system and Norkus an average of 11 points less.

McMurtry banged Norkus around under a set of anemic ring lights that grew so dim at times the crowd of 4,000 couldn't tell Norkus from a ring post. There were no knockdowns, although McMurtry had his man staggering and grabbing in the sixth and eighth rounds.

Typically, Irish Pat did not follow up his advantage and Norkus weathered each storm.

After the bout, Norkus displayed a swollen right thumb and said he injured the digit in the second round. McMurtry was unscathed.

Californians Win Boat Race On Rogue River

GOLD BEACH (AP) — Two California speedsters won the annual Agness White Water boat race on the Rogue River Sunday, taking home a trophy and \$300 in prize money.

Johnny Walker, Trinidad, Calif., and Tommy Langford of Klamath, Calif., teamed in their outboard to travel the 12-mile course in 28 minutes, 56 seconds.

Last year's winners, Virgil and Ted Green of Weitchpec, Calif., finished second and won \$250. Hugh McGinnis, Agness, Ore., finished third and won \$150.

Only four of ten outboard-powered craft finished the race. The contest is an annual event of the Rogue River community of Agness.

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
