

Ike Dosen't Change Tires, Changes Cars

WASHINGTON (AP) — When President Eisenhower's automobile gets a flat tire, Eisenhower doesn't wait for a tire change. He changes cars.

That's what happened Sunday as the President and Mrs. Eisenhower were returning to the White House from a weekend rest at their Gettysburg farm.

A flat tire on Eisenhower's big black limousine halted the 10-car presidential motorcade just south of Frederick, Md., briefly blocking traffic on busy U.S. Route 240.

Reporters and Secret Service agents swarmed out of other cars in the motorcade to see what had happened. Eisenhower and his wife calmly stepped out of his car, glanced at the flat rear tire and then climbed into a spare limousine.

In less than 90 seconds, the motorcade was off again, leaving the first car and a driver at the side of the road.

Shark Savagely Attacks 8-Year-Old Boy Sunday

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — A shark savagely attacked 8-year-old Douglas Lawton Sunday in shallow near Longboat Key where he was bathing with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard G. Lawton.

The elder Lawton carried his son ashore with the 5-foot shark's jaws still clamped around Douglas' left thigh. The jaws had to be forcibly disengaged. Surgeons amputated Douglas' leg close to the hip.

180,000 Attend Witnesses Meet

NEW YORK (AP) — More than 180,000 Jehovah's Witnesses overflowed Yankee Stadium and the Polo Grounds Sunday to open an eight-day Divine Will International Assembly.

A light afternoon rain failed to dampen the Witnesses' spirit and was met by only a few umbrellas. Negroes, whites and Asians mingled freely and heard Milton G. Henschel, convention chairman, emphasize that there is no "nationalistic or racial barrier."

"We are one," Henschel said. "Others may claim to be Christians but actions speak louder than words. Here we have true Christian love. We are genuine Christians and real disciples."

Officials have called this New York City's largest convention ever.

A spokesman for the Witnesses said 117,285 were at the Stadium and 62,996 at the Polo Grounds. Thousands were in streets nearby, many munching hot dogs while listening to the speeches over amplifiers.

Space Pioneer Killed In Crash

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Capt. Ivan Kincheloe, designated by the Air Force as one of the first pilots to fly into space, was killed Saturday in the crash of a jet plane.

The ruggedly handsome space pioneer, who holds the American altitude record of 128,000 feet, was killed when his F104 supersonic jet crashed shortly after taking off from this air base in the Mojave desert, the Air Force said. He was 30.

There were no other immediate details on the crash.

Kincheloe was a jet ace of the Korean war and an aeronautical and mechanical engineer.

He was a member of the select team of Air Force pilots training for flights into the fringe of space in the secrecy-shrouded rocket plane the X15.

Defense Dept. Summons 11,000 New Draftees

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department asked Monday for 11,000 draftees in September, an increase of 1,000 over the calls of previous three months.


All inductees will be taken by the Army.

Draft calls of 13,000 were made monthly between February and May and then dropped to 10,000 each for June, July and August.

The 11,000 in September would increase the total to 2,383,430 men since drafting was resumed eight years ago during the Korean War.
