With Bill Harper and Don Severson to be honored Wednesday night after the North Bend - Roseburg Area Four playoff game for their fine work in American Legion junior baseball, here's a six-year look at the seasons in which the Roseburg team has taken the league title five of the six years. Harper was the mentor during those five winning years and Severson assistant during three.

In 1952, Roseburg competed in a district composed of Myrtle Creek, Sutherlin, Drain and the local nine. In this year, prior to Harper's arrival, Myrtle Creek won the title with a 4-0 record while Roseburg was second at 3-3. Drain finished third at 2-3 and Sutherlin last with a 0-3 mark. Myrtle Creek advanced to the playoffs at North Bend with these two teams vying for the north berth in the state playoffs with Klamath Falls and Eugene.

Myrtle Creek lost to North Bend 5-0, defeated Klamath Falls 5-1 and then was ousted from the tourney by North Bend 4-3.

HARPER TOOK OVER the Roseburg Legion club in 1953 and the locals tied with Myrtle Creek for the sub-district title with records of 6-2. Roseburg beat Myrtle Creek 17-11 to gain the tie and won a 9-8 contest for the title.

Roseburg then met North Bend for the District 10 crown and won the first game 4-4 but lost the next two 11-5 and 3-2 in 11 innings. In 1954 found the Harper-coached team rolling to nine straight wins in district play for the title. This league was made up of Roseburg, Oakland-Sutherlin, Myrtle Creek and Drain.

Roseburg continued the win streak in the first playoff game with Bend on a 16-2 win as Jerry Droscher threw a no-hitter. The Bend nine won the second contest 8-3, but the Roseburg juniors grabbed the final game of the series by a 12-3 score.

THE NEXT STOP this year was Albany for a three-team tourney with the Medford club the third team. The Roseburg nine was ousted on a 8-2 loss to Albany and a 16-7 loss to Medford. In 1955, Severson joined Harper as assistant, and the club battled into the state finals.

In newly-formed District Three play with Eugene, Cottage Grove and Springfield, Roseburg again won the title, this time with a 3-1 record. That year Eugene and Springfield tied for second at 3-2 and Cottage Grove was 0-6.

In the first playoff series, Roseburg downed North Bend in two straight by scores of 4-1 and 12-4. The next stop was a series with the Central Point - Medford club with Roseburg winning the first game 7-4 in 12 innings and the second game 10-0. The second contest was a one-hitter by Droscher.

The Roseburg Legion nine then downed the defending state champ, Albany, in two games by scores of 7-4 and 10-8. The second game in 11 innings. . . . to move into the state finals.

Roseburg took a 14-1 record into the final series against The Dalles and dropped the first game 6-3 as Denny Peterson whiffed 15 batters. Roseburg evened the series with a 7-6 win in the second game but The Dalles came on to win two straight and the state title by scores of 3-0 and 4-2.

THEN CAME the season in which the Roseburg team gained third in the nation - 1956. In another new district, this was called District 33 containing Medford and Grants Pass, Roseburg again went into the playoffs this time with a 5-1 mark in league play. The first opponent was Klamath Falls and Roseburg increased the season mark to 15-2 with wins of 18-9 and 13-3.

Eugene fell next by scores of 11-5 and 19-8, in the Area Three playoff series and Albany in the semi-finals by scores of 4-1 and 12-3.

Again Roseburg met The Dalles for the state crown in a thrilling series which went the five-game distance. Roseburg won the first tilt 3-2 in 11 innings and The Dalles grabbed the next two by scores of 11-2 and 7-4. Roseburg evened the series with another extra-inning effort, winning the fourth game 13-5 in 13 innings. The lo-

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS More and more it is becoming evident that the San Francisco Giant pitchers have been getting a bum rap.

For weeks critics have been claiming the Giants would be far out in front in the National League if only they had some respectable pitching. But, in fact, the hitters have been the guilty ones, not the pitchers.

Last night's impressive route - going performances by southpaw Mike McCormick and right-hander Ruben Gomez in the Giants' 3-2 and 2-1 sweep of a twilight night double-header in Philadelphia furnished additional proof that the San Francisco hurling has been underrated.

In their last seven games (not including the resumption of last month's suspended game), Giant pitchers have permitted 29 runs, half of them in one game. During the same period, the hitters have produced only 10 runs.

Hitting Feeble It is to the pitchers' credit that with such feeble hitting support they were able to win three and tie one of those seven games. Yesterday's double triumph boosted the circuit's Cinderella team to within one percentage point of the front-running Milwaukee Braves.

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College Coaches Scornful Of Football's Draft Value

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bud Wilkinson, Duffly Daugherty, and Bowden Wyatt have told Congress they don't like pro football's player draft.

The three bowl-winning college coaches expressed the same law opinion of legislation designed to relieve professional team sports of many antitrust law restrictions.

Oklahoma's Wilkinson, Michigan State's Daugherty and Tennessee's Wyatt testified yesterday before the Senate Antitrust subcommittee.

They hit the draft line harder than any witnesses since hearings began last summer.

"Very unfair," each said of the system by which National Football League teams acquire exclusive bargaining rights with designated college players.

They disagreed with NFL Commissioner Bert Bell, who contended that the league would collapse without a draft to equalize the strength of all 12 pro teams. They questioned whether one club could tie up all the good players.

Wilkinson, draft aside, declared he would recommend pro football only to men of superior skill. "A Sammy Baugh or a Sid Luckman or a Don Walker," he might also help those with a definite goal, such as a career in law or medicine, to pay for advanced education, he said.

"Beyond that," he testified, "anyone who plays is making a bad mistake."

Wilkinson, president of the American College Football Coaches Assn., said a collegian's only

All other National League teams were idle. In the American, the New York Yankees stretched their commanding lead over runner-up Boston to 15 games with a 14-7 triumph over Kansas City after Detroit had taken an afternoon 5-4 decision from the Red Sox. The Chicago White Sox nipped Washington 6-5.

McCormick, still more than a year away from voting age, hurled a nine-hitter, outlasting rookie Roman Semproch and Dick Farrell in the opener for his eighth victory.

Gomez permitted only four hits in the nightcap.

Hurlers Tough With the exception of the 10-0 rout to Pittsburgh last July 25, no Giant pitcher permitted more than three runs in any of the team's last seven games. Failure to win more than three of them can be traced to the hitters' inability to score more than three runs in any of those contests. Twice the team was shut out and twice it was held to one tally.

Rookies Felipe Alou and Orlando Cepeda provided the key hits in the Giants' twin victories. Alou followed a fifth-inning double by McCormick with a home run to provide the key blow in the first game, although it took an error by relief pitcher Farrell to provide the Giants with the winning run in the ninth.

Cepeda figured in both second-game runs. He singled and scored on Valmy Thomas' single in the second inning, and drove in Willie Kirkland with another single in the sixth.

Apparently the rest cure was all Mickey Mantle needed to emerge from his prolonged batting slump. Handicapped by a sore right shoulder practically from the start of the campaign, the New York Yankee slugger had stubbornly shrugged off repeated suggestions that he take a brief rest. His batting average dipped as low as .270.

It took another injury—a bruised left forearm—to finally sideline the switch-hitting star just before the

team's current Western swing. Since returning to action in the second game of this trip, in Detroit, Mantle has cracked 15 hits in 27 times at bat for .556. That seven-game surge boosted his mark to .294.

Mantle walloped two home runs and a single last night as the Yankees outslugged Kansas City 14-7. Gil McDougald of New York and the Athletics' Bob Cerv also slammed a pair of homers.

Yanks Widen Gap The victory, coupled with Detroit's 5-4 triumph over Boston, widened the Yankees' first-place margin over the Red Sox to 15 games. The Chicago White Sox snapped a fourth-place tie with Kansas City, shading Washington 6-5.

In the only National League action, the San Francisco Giants swept a two-night double-header from Philadelphia 3-2 and 2-1.

Mantle homered batting left-handed and right-handed.

A big five-run New York inning decided the game. Zach Monroee, although batted out in the sixth, was credited with his second victory. Dick Tomaneck was the loser.

The White Sox overcame a four-run deficit to defeat the Senators. Sherman Lollar's three-run homer in the fourth eliminated a four-run rally against Jim Constance that put Chicago in front 5-4. Washington tied the score in the fifth but Chicago regained the lead in the sixth on a triple by Nellie Fox and an infield out.

Turk Lown, National League castoff, gained his first AL triumph, in relief. Dick Hyde was the loser. Washington's Albie Pearson slammed his first major league home run, off starter Early Wynn, in the first inning.

Leo Kiehl's bases-loaded pass to Charlie Maxwell with two out in the bottom of the ninth pushed over Detroit's winning run against Boston.

Al Kaline slammed four hits, drove in two runs and scored once. Bill Fischer, in relief, was the winner.

Soviets Show Progress In Sports; Track And Field Team Downs Americans, 172-170

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviets are closing in, surely and speedily, on American leadership in sports. And even a controversial ruling and a debatable scoring system can't make it appear otherwise.

In the first United States vs. Soviet Union track and field meet, which ended last night, the Soviets outscored the Americans 172 points to 170; their women athletes defeated the American women 63-45; and, most important of all, the American men could only defeat the Soviet men 128 to 109.

"This was the greatest day in Soviet track and field history," said the Soviet men's coach, Vavri Korobkov.

"Who would have thought we could beat the American pole vaulters, that we could finish one-two in the high jump and javelin? Or who would have thought a Soviet sprinter would finish second in the 200 meters, that another would be second in the broad jump and that we would set a world hop-step-

jump record? It was a wonderful showing."

Women Look Good As the U.S. team packed to go on to meets in Warsaw, Budapest and Athens, the American women could look back with considerable pride on their performances here. So could some of the men. Unquestionably, the greatest feat of the two-day meet was Rafer Johnson's world record score of 8,302 points in the decathlon, wiping out his own 10,000-meter mark and the unofficial 8,013 points made by his Soviet rival, Vasily Kuznetsov.

The only things that rankled a bit were the Soviet system of lumping together the scores of men's and women's competition and the disqualification of Gordon McKenzie in the 10,000 meters.

There was no real bitterness; just some discontent among U.S. coaches and officials.

U.S. Losses Point McKenzie's disqualification in a controversial ruling cost the U.S.
