PORTLAND (AP) — Two men found an old bottle bearing a label of 89-cent wine in a locker where they worked. Both drank from the bottle. One man died and the other became ill.

Contents of the bottle were sent to the University of Oregon Medical School for analysis after Edward J. Collopy, 60, Portland, was fatally stricken early Sunday.

A companion, Albert Wiley, 78, Portland, said he became ill after sipping a little. It tasted bad so he threw his share away.

BARONET DIES
LONDON (AP) — American-born Sir Gilbert Elliott, tenth baronet and chief of the clan, Elliot, died in London Saturday. He was 73. At one time, Sir Gilbert was the only American citizen to be a British baronet. He renounced his U.S. citizenship in 1937, however. His title now goes to his elder son Arthur.

LEAVES MOSCOW

MOSCOW (AP) — Austrian Chancellor Julius Raab left Moscow Monday after a one-week visit during which he won a 50 per cent reduction in oil reparations to the Soviet Union. Soviet Premier Khrushchev went to Moscow Airport to wish Raab a jovial goodbye. The Austrian independence treaty signed in 1955 committed Austria to supply 10 million tons of oil to Russia as reparations by 1965. The reduction was the chief object of Raab's visit.

Railroad Sued For Death Of Son In Fall From Car

PORTLAND (AP) — Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd B. Schmidt of Eugene sued the Northern Pacific Railway this week for the death of their 24-year-old son in 1956.

The suit said William L. Schmidt "suffered a fall from the said railway train, which fall immediately caused his death" near Sandpoint, Idaho.

The railway was accused in the federal court suit of negligence. The parents asked \$75,000 general damages and \$1,400 for funeral expenses.
