14 Known Dead In Brief Haiti Coup Tuesday

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — The army claimed everything was quiet again in Haiti today.

At least 14 dead were counted after a pocket-sized coup attempt that willed under gunfire from troops and civilian partisans loyal to President Francois Duvalier.

Some of the Duvalier partisans wearing blood-stained shirts and firing their guns in the air. But most people kept off the streets to avoid trouble.

The U.S. Embassy warned Americans to stay indoors and the army ordered a 6 p.m.-to-6 a.m. curfew. The Port au Prince airport was closed throughout Tuesday, stranding nearly 400 U.S. tourists.

All news dispatches leaving Haiti were censored.

The army said that a party of men landed from a Miami, Fla., launch and tried to overthrow Duvalier. Seven attackers were killed.

The dead plotters, according to the army, included one known American, former Deputy Sheriff Arthur Payne of Miami; another man possibly an American; two Spanish-speaking "foreigners"; and three exiled Haitian army captains who supported former President Paul Magloire.

Magloire, in New York, denied any connection with the plot. Interior Minister of the Caribbean Negro republic, spoke to newsmen with a pistol stuck in his belt.

Two Roseburg youngsters were back in the arms of their mother this morning after they wandered away from a bean field near Winston and were missing for nearly two hours.

Rosalie, 10, and Richard, 9, children of Mr. and Mrs. Warren S. Ward, 563 W. Broccoli St., were found hiding in tall grass near Green bridge in Winston. Section about 1/2 mile from the bean field.

A sheriff's deputy said the children apparently had run away. Reported missing about 7:25 a.m. by their mother, they were found at 9:10 a.m.

The sheriff's office and people in the area carried on the search. There was some apprehension that the two might have fallen into the nearby South Umpqua River, so the county's disaster car was on the scene. Sheriff Ira C. Byrd also flew over the area in an attempt to spot the children.

Nuclear weapons note: The Geneva conference on policing a nuclear ban has recommended the use of earth satellites in the detection of nuclear explosions. The satellites would be equipped with special instruments to study radio and light waves.

Sec. Anderson Forecasts \$12 Billion Deficit

WASHINGTON (AP) — A rise in the government's debt ceiling to 285 billion dollars—with temporary permission to go to 288 billion—was approved Wednesday by the House Ways and Means Committee.

The committee acted after Secretary of the Treasury Anderson told it a 12-billion-dollar deficit is in prospect for the current fiscal year. The only dissent on the vote came from Rep. Noah Mason (R-Ill.).

The bill probably will come up in the House Monday.

Government fiscal officers have been talking heretofore of a deficit of 8 to 10 billion dollars for the fiscal year ending next June 30.

Anderson not only boosted the forecast to 12 billion, he hinted it might be even greater, depending on the course of federal revenues.

The secretary said the \$2,800,000,000 deficit for the fiscal year just ended was incurred because of a \$3,300,000,000 drop in tax revenues.

In the current fiscal year, he continued, he anticipates a further two-billion-dollar drop in revenues and a rising level of expenditures to a total of around 79 billion dollars.

An increase in the debt limit is "the only sound course at the present time," Anderson said, adding that even the new ceiling may present problems to the treasury before the end of the fiscal year.

President To Seek Conference In U. N. Within Two Weeks

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower has decided to propose that a summit conference on the Middle East crisis be opened in the U. N. Security Council in two weeks.

Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Macmillan drafted notes to Soviet Premier Khrushchev suggesting a meeting between Aug. 19 and 25 and submitted them Wednesday to the 15-nation Atlantic Pact Council in Paris.

Sources in London said unless the other NATO allies insisted on important changes — and this was not expected — the American and British messages would go off to Moscow late Wednesday night or Thursday.

Stand By Proposal

Eisenhower and Macmillan agreed they would stand by their proposal for a summit-level session between the U. N. Security Council. But French Premier De Gaulle was reported sticking to his contention that a special five-power conference, which Khrushchev originally proposed, should be held in Geneva and not under the auspices of the Security Council.

One well-informed U. S. official said the United Nations headquarters in New York is the logical place to hold the extraordinary session but that Eisenhower is willing to go to some other city — probably Geneva — if others prefer.

Eisenhower's latest note is in answer to an angry Khrushchev message Monday.

The Soviet leader accused Eisenhower then of virtually rejecting the heads of government conference, of being responsible for aggression in the Middle East and of plotting new military adventures there.

Khrushchev also called again for a five-power meeting outside the U. N. But the Soviet news agency Tass said last night this was not a rejection of a U. N. meeting, and said Khrushchev still is willing to attend a Security Council meeting.

He refused to go any farther.

Roseburg Youth Killed In Crash Of Truck, Auto

PENDLETON (AP) — A 17-year-old Roseburg youth was killed Wednesday morning in an automobile-truck and trailer collision three miles west of Pendleton.

Clarence Daniel Siles, who was riding in the car, was killed instantly in the crash. His companion, Jesse Lowell Bulkley, 17, Juneau, Alaska, was hospitalized with undetermined injuries.

Siles' address is 417 SE Sykes in Roseburg.

The driver of the truck, L. H. Hooker, 48, Idaho Falls, said that the car came straight across the highway and smashed into his trailer. He said the vehicle did not appear to swerve.

Police were not sure which youth was driving the car. There are three traffic lanes in the stretch of U.S. 30 where the accident occurred.

Hooker and his son, who was riding with him in the truck car, were not injured. The truck and trailer jack-knifed and turned over, spilling 1,500 cases and 60 barrels of beer.

Siles' death was the 36th Oregon traffic fatality of July and the 27th of the year in the Associated Press tabulation. It was the 10th this year for Umatilla, six of which have occurred in the same, relatively straight stretch on Highway 30.

Boy Dynamiter Ordered Sent To MacLaren

A 14-year-old rural Roseburg youth who confessed June 10 to blowing up the California Oregon Power Co. radio transmitter near Dixonville, has been committed to MacLaren School for Boys.

The youth had told police "the idea came to me to dynamite a radio station . . . after finding the explosives on a hill behind the Roseburg Lumber Co. mill. He said he did not stay to watch the explosion, nor did he hear the charge go off."

Juvenile Judge Charles S. Woodrich heard the case Monday afternoon along with those of two others who were implicated in crimes with the youth. The other boys, ages 13 and 14, were remanded to custody of their parents and placed on probation.

Tells Friends of Cache

The 14-year-old boy, also from near Roseburg, admitted he told his friend where the dynamite was cached, but did not participate in the act.

A second friend 13, was picked up by city police with the "dynamiter" after the pair stole two revolvers from a show case in a Roseburg store last June. From the questioning came the story of the COPCO transmitter dynamiting which occurred May 10.

The youth readily told how he broke into the eight-foot square transmitter building, placed 22 sticks of dynamite around a cap, attached a 63-foot fuse and lit it. He then walked away and hitchhiked back into Roseburg. The resultant explosion completely demolished the transmitter, valued at \$5000.

Red Cross Blood Smeared On Road

WOLF CREEK (AP) — Dozens of pint bottles of donated Red Cross blood were smashed on the highway pavement near here Tuesday in a collision between a Red Cross pickup truck and a loaded logging truck.

State police said the Red Cross vehicle, driven by Robert H. Widman, Portland, came upon the slow-moving truck pulling up a steep grade on the Pacific Highway near Sexton Summit.

The smaller vehicle smashed into the rear of the blood logging rig. The cargo of blood-filled pint bottles spilled onto the pavement and smashed.

The Red Cross truck was en route from Coos Bay to Grants Pass on its regular blood distribution rounds to hospitals. It had left Portland Monday morning with a full load of 120 pints of blood, after processing in Portland for redistribution in areas in which the blood had been donated.

A spokesman for the Red Cross blood bank in Portland said he could not determine at once how many pints of blood were lost in the mishap.

Virgil E. Hensley, Grants Pass, the logging truck driver, escaped injury.

County Judge Jackson Has Two Years Lopped Off Term By Supreme Court Ruling

An Oregon Supreme Court ruling aimed at Jackson County also cuts two years off the term of V. T. Jackson, Don Jas County Judge.

Jackson, who thought he was elected to a six-year stint, instead finds his term lopped to four years. "I have no intentions of running again," the judge says. His term in office will expire in January of 1960.

The change in terms is a result of the Legislature in 1951 removing judicial functions from county judges in counties such as Douglas. Judicial duties such as acting on probate and juvenile matters no longer are handled by the county judge in Douglas or Jackson counties. They were transferred to circuit court.

Provided By Constitution

Oregon's constitution states that when a term of office is not provided for by the constitution the Legislature shall not create any office with a tenure of more than four years. The only offices with terms of more than four years are judicial posts.

The amended law in effect puts the county under a commission form of government although the statutes neglect to change the titles. It still is called a county court with two commissioners and a non-judicial judge.

The Supreme Court ruling came about when Bereth Hopkins, Jackson County clerk, refused to file a declaration of candidacy for an aspirant to the office of county judge. As did Jackson, Judge Rodney Keating thought he had been elected for six years.

The high court ordered the Jackson clerk to permit the candidate to file for the office and for his name to appear on the ballot. After the primary election was over, the Supreme Court handed down a written opinion on the matter stating that Keating was not elected as a judge and that the county court of Jackson is not a court within the meaning of the constitution as amended.

Not Considered A Judge

That was the primary question, the ruling stated, whether the county judge, or Jackson County possesses the powers and is (Continued on Page 2 Col. 2)

Gov. Faubus Wins Election

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Gov. Orval Faubus Tuesday won an overwhelming mandate to resume school integration as he swept a third-term Democratic nomination.

"The returns indicate clearly the sentiments of the people," he said in a victory statement.

Crowds of jubilant supporters overflowed the street in front of Faubus' downtown campaign headquarters here and a sound truck screamed "Dixie" the traditional Southern fight song, as the outcome of the balloting in the preferential primary became evident.

Faubus, 48, bowled over two opponents by the widest majority ever accorded a gubernatorial candidate in Arkansas. In this heavily Democratic state, nomination is tantamount to election.

With 2,189 of 2,321 precincts reporting, Faubus amassed 243,253 votes. Curtis Finkbeiner, 37-year-old Little Rock meat packer, received 33,033 votes, and Lee Ward, 51, a state judge from Paragould, 33,480.

Finkbeiner and Ward were avowed segregationists but advocated a law and order procedure on integration problems.

Russia Claims U. S. Plane Flew Over Her Territory

LONDON (AP) — Moscow Radio asserted Wednesday a U. S. plane had flown 15 miles into South Russia and was forced to turn back by Soviet fighters. It said the plane flew from the direction of Iran.

Moscow Radio said protest notes were handed to U. S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson and Iranian Ambassador Mostafa Samis in Moscow.

The notes said that on July 26 a U. S. military aircraft flying from the direction of Iran crossed the Soviet border in the Caspian Sea area 130 miles southeast of the town of Asmara.

British Library, Information Center Wrecked By Bomb

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — A time bomb wrecked the British library and information center in Amman and a second exploded outside the garage of a banker Wednesday night.

The bombings seemed to be in retaliation for the dispatch of 2,000 British paratroops to back up King Hussein's regime. They came as the army reported a new clash with alleged infiltrators from President Nasser's United Arab Republic province of Syria.

The bomb in the British library wrecked the interior and scattered books and splinters of wood everywhere. A small fire started. The bomb had been planted on a book shelf.

Second Bomb Goes Off

The second bomb went off outside the garage of the assistant manager of a British-owned bank. Arab Legion guards immediately tightened up on security and began searching persons entering Amman buildings.

An army communiqué said a Jordan patrol exchanged fire with the band of infiltrators northeast of the frontier town of Ramtha and captured one of the band, a resident of Syria, along with a quantity of arms.

Jordan authorities said the border incident, the second such in four days, showed Syrians were attempting to adopt the same methods of infiltration against Hussein that were used to foment rebellion in Lebanon.

Meanwhile, an oil crisis in Jordan, created by the revolt in Iraq from which this country normally draws its supply, was eased further.

A British Navy tanker arrived at the port of Aqaba with 1,400 tons of oil. An Italian tanker is due to arrive Thursday with 2,000 tons and another Italian tanker on the way with 10,000 tons.

South Umpqua Declared Unsafe For Swimming

The South Umpqua River, now entering its low water stage, today was declared unsafe for swimming because of heavy contamination.

Dr. Mary Soules, Douglas County public health officer, said the health department recommends that swimming in the river be discontinued during the extreme heat.

A heavy bacterial contamination has become apparent during the heat wave along the river. Sewerage and other sources are responsible, she said.

Army Figure Is Lauded Before Vote

Term Of Chamoun Will Expire On Sept. 23; Rebels Lay Down Terms

BEIRUT (AP) — A stream of Parliament deputies began calling on Gen. Fuad Shehab Wednesday to congratulate him on election to the presidency even before the election.

Many believe the nonpartisan army chief of staff is the one man who can bring peace to Lebanon. Parliament Speaker Adel Osserian predicted Shehab would be elected "by a near unanimous vote" when Parliament assembles Thursday.

The term of President Camille Chamoun, chief target of Lebanon's rebellion, expires Sept. 23. The rebel National Front has laid down severe conditions for its support of Shehab. But it appeared that the Front's four deputies in the 66-member Parliament were disposed to vote for him. Most of the others, it seemed, were ready to elect him unconditionally and leave to the general the problem of making peace among contending factions.

Demands Troops' Withdrawal

The National Front, which includes leaders of Lebanon's 82-day-old rebellion, said it would support no candidate unless he demanded immediate withdrawal of U. S. troops. The front also renewed demands for Chamoun's immediate resignation.

Informants close to Shehab doubt he would agree to any conditions. The 56-year-old army commander has insisted he would accept election only if no strings were attached.

Some deputies said that opposition members of Parliament are loyal to Shehab personally and like to vote for him despite the National Front statement.

Prime Minister Sami Solh threatened to resign unless the elections were postponed until internal security is re-established. His threat followed an attempt to assassinate him in which eight other persons were killed.

New Postal Rates In Effect Friday, Carstens Reminds

New postal rates will go into effect Friday, Clyde Carstens, Roseburg postmaster, reminded Douglas County residents today.

The new rate will require letters, first class mail, to have a four-cent stamp for each ounce of weight. Postage required on other mail will be: Postal cards, three cents; domestic air mail letters, seven cents; airmail postal cards, five cents; and books, nine cents for the first pound and five cents for each additional pound.

Third class mail, which includes circulars and miscellaneous printed matter, will require three cents for the first ounce and one and a half cents for each additional ounce up to and including 15 ounces. Books and catalogs with 24 or more pages will need the same amount of postage.

The postage increase is the first since about 1932 when the rate for letters went up from two to three cents, Carstens said. The amount of postage due collections in Roseburg is expected to increase considerably during the next couple of months, the postmaster added.

Persons may bring the amount of postage required on their mail up to the proper amount by adding one-cent stamps. Parcel post rates will not increase. The parcel post rates for heavy mail weigh more than 16 ounces.

By Wednesday morning the amount of mail going through the Roseburg Post Office had not increased in spite of the new rates going into effect Friday.
