

Newspaper Says Nasser Leaked Russia's Plans

BERLIN (AP) — The West Berlin tabloid newspaper Nacht Despeche said here that President Nasser of the U.A.R. leaked Russia's intentions to President Tito of Yugoslavia during their Beirut meeting earlier this month.

The newspaper said Tito relayed the information to Washington and forestalled a planned Russian region.

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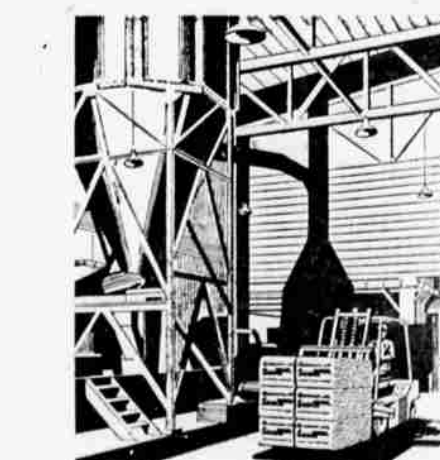
