

Neuberger Cites Need For Hospital At Medford

WASHINGTON (AP) — A hospital should be constructed at once by the Veterans Administration at Camp White, near Medford, Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Tuesday.

Such a hospital would serve an area which has a population of more than 500,000 persons, Neuberger told the House Committee on Veterans Affairs.

Veterans in the area now must obtain treatment at VA hospitals in Portland or Oakland, Calif., both more than 300 miles from Medford.

Neuberger proposed that a 100-bed hospital be built at the camp, where the VA now operates a 50-bed infirmary, and a 350-bed domiciliary.

There also are brick buildings, not now in use, which could be turned into a 400-bed hospital, Neuberger said.

Umatilla's Pea Crop Cut By Heat And Aphids

PENDELTON (AP)—Umatilla County's important pea crop has been cut by heat and aphids to about four-fifths of last year's total, processors reported.

A canner in Milton-Freewater was hardest hit among Umatilla packing plants. Its yield was cut to 70 per cent of 1957.

One canner official said aphids have been worse this season than at any other time in his memory. It has been the hottest harvest season on record.

The harvest is nearly completed.

GRAIN YIELDS POOR

RICKREALL (AP) — A grain company official said grain yields here are of the poorest quality and quantity in many years.

Robert Rogers said average Bushel wheat weight now is 33 to 35 pounds, compared to the former average of 60 pounds.

The Pacific Grain Co. official also reported low yields for clover, oats, vetch and rye.

Some Military Purchasers Buy Goggles While Others Declare Surplus, Claim

WASHINGTON (AP) — House investigators said Tuesday they have evidence that some military purchasers are buying sun goggles at the same time other officers are selling them as surplus.

This new disclosure came as the House Government Operations subcommittee sought further information about 300 tons of auto brake linings that found their way back to this country after being sold as surplus overseas.

A Brooklyn firm reportedly bought the brake linings from the Army in Germany. The subcommittee asked the Pentagon for a prompt explanation after a witness Monday said the government is still buying linings in this country.

Loose Disregard

House majority leader John W. McCormack (D-Mass.) said the Commerce Department has shown "loose disregard of the law" that exists to protect American markets from the competition of products that might re-enter the United States. The Commerce Department handles re-entry permits.

U.S. surplus stocks sold abroad are not supposed to be returned to the United States unless they benefit the economy.

The brake linings, still unused, were said to have been sold by the Army at 21-34 cents a unit. Fred Weyburne, general manager of the Bendix Aviation Corp., told the

committee his company's price is \$1.25.

Under questioning, Weyburne said the government is still buying jeep linings in the United States and Bendix bids for the federal contracts. But "some body" — not a known manufacturer — "always licks us by 50 per cent," he said.

"In other words," Rep. Clarence J. Brown said, "the government is buying new ones today and selling them at the same time. That's pretty stupid, isn't it?"

"Yes, sir," Weyburne replied.

Spoiled Egg Salad Sandwiches Blamed For Sudden Illness

SEDRO WOOLLEY (Skagit County) (AP) — Spoiled egg salad sandwiches were believed to have been responsible for the illness Sunday of 20 men fighting the stubborn Cultus Mountain forest fire nine miles southeast of here.

State Land Commissioner Bert Cole reported from the scene that none of the men were seriously ill, although one unidentified firefighter was hospitalized. He said doctors attended the sick on the spot.

Meanwhile, crews were extending a protective strip around the fire, which remained under control after blackening more than 1,600 acres.

Cole also reported that a small fire had broken out at Elbe in south central Pierce County but that it was believed under control.

With the temperatures remaining in the high 90s, the U. S. Forest Service closed the Gifford-Pinchot National Forest in Clark, Skamania, Lewis and Cowlitz counties until midnight Tuesday. The forest was the last Western Washington area partially open to logging operations.

Witnesses Telling U. S. World's End At Hand

NEW YORK (AP) — Thousands of Jehovah's Witnesses go from house to house today to tell New Yorkers that the end of the world, as they know it, may be at hand.

The canvass was called for this week by Nathan H. Knorr, president of the Watch Tower and Tract Society, which is the Jehovah's Witnesses legal name.

Knorr told 151,003 Witnesses, packed into Yankee Stadium and the Polo Grounds, that all the signs of Jehovah "portend that we are standing at the threshold of a peaceable, happy and life-giving new world."

"This is the grandest news," he said, "although it means that we are living at the end of this worry-filled, problem-racked, insane, loveless old world."

A night session last night attracted 133,283 persons to the two ball parks.

Premier Fanfani Pledges Italy's Full Cooperation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Premier Amintore Fanfani pledged Italy's full cooperation with the Free World Tuesday in efforts to bring peace to the Middle East.

The Italian told a plauding members of Congress that because his country has been able to revive itself with American aid it now is in a position to make a substantial contribution to the peace of the world.

Meetings with President Eisenhower and others here on his state visit "will produce positive results, you may rely on that," Fanfani assured the legislators.

Eighty senators were on hand to hear the Italian premier. He spoke later to the House.

Proposing that Italy will cooperate with the Free World "to the limits of her power and within the framework of her alliances," Fanfani said the Italians especially will urge upon other countries "the danger of Communist subversion that has been averted in our own land."

Italy is in a position to counsel with the people of the Middle East, he said, because of proximity to the area and long association with its people. Italians can talk to the Arab people without arousing suspicion because Italy has no ambitions in the area, he explained.

Fanfani spoke in each house about 15 minutes, half the time being taken by his interpreter, and delivered the same speech in each chamber.

The House chamber had many empty chairs.

The premier was to begin talks with Eisenhower on the Middle East emergency at a stag luncheon in the White House after his appearances on Capitol Hill.

CHICAGO (AP) — The Board of Trade reported this week that the visible supply of wheat in the United States increased 11,603,000 bushels last week to 348,245,000 bushels.

Corn decreased 1,544,000 bushels to 81,139,000, oats increased 398,000 to 6,924,000, rye increased 484,000 to 5,298,000, barley increased 311,000 to 13,802,000, and soybeans increased 1,071,000 to 7,512,000.
