Changes For Polish Meet Made By U. S. Track Team

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Three changes have been made in the American men's track and field team which meets Poland tomorrow and Saturday after a triumph over the Soviets at Moscow.

Discus thrower Al Oerter of New Hyde Park, N.Y., second at Moscow, is returning to the United States, and Parry O'Brien, world champion shot putter, will double in his specialty and the discus.

James Segrest, Abilene, Tex., is being replaced in the 200 meters. Charlie Dumas, Los Angeles, has returned to orthodox practice and is expected to once again assume his position as the world's best high jumper.

These changes were outlined today by Coach George Eastman and as the American team went through its final practice session. World record disappointment in Moscow, where he cleared only 6 feet 7 1/2 inches and finished third behind the two Russians.

"Dumas now is training very hard," the coach said. "He will get back into form quickly."

Eastman said Oerter was called home but didn't give the reason. But O'Brien is a highly competent discus man and American chances shouldn't suffer.

Segrest finished last in the 200 at Moscow and another sprinter will be given a chance. Eastman said no decision has been made as to his replacement but Eddie Southern, a 400-meter man from Dallas, Tex., is a good guess.

Lebanon, Rainier Preps Named As All-Star Subs — PORTLAND (AP) — Gary Yates of Lebanon and Steve Oliva of Rainier Wednesday were selected for the Shrine All-Star football game here Aug. 17.

Yates, a 200-pound fullback, replaces Terry Alder, former standout for Willamette of Eugene who now is in the armed forces. Yates will play for the state squad.

Oliva, named to the Metro team, is a Rainier quarterback who will replace Jim Warren of Benson High in Portland. Warren also is in the armed forces.

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Drain Favored In NBC Tourney

The Oregon State NBC baseball tournament begins at Drain Friday night, with three games on tap. The first game will begin at 5 p.m., and the action will continue until the first round is completed.

Six teams are entered in the tourney, with the host team, the Drain Black Sox, the favorite. The Sox will take a 21-3 record into the tournament.

The five other clubs entered are Prineville, Albany, Riddle, Sutherlin and McKenzie. Prineville has played the most games prior to the tourney, compiling a 20-13 mark in the 33 games played.

Albany comes in with a 13-4 record, Riddle is 10-3, Sutherlin 9-1 and McKenzie is 7-5.

Seeing action first in the tournament will be the Sutherlin and Riddle nines as they look up in the opener of the triple-header Friday night. The second game will find Albany testing Drain and the last game of the night will have Prineville and McKenzie in action.

On Saturday night, another triple-header is scheduled with the first game again starting at 5 p.m. The final day of the tourney will begin at 1 p.m., with two games that afternoon and two more that night. Three tilts might be played that night, rather than just two.

Seafair Regatta Set For Friday

SEATTLE (AP) — So much spray will be kicked up by so many powerboats on Lake Washington in the next 10 days that the mist may not settle before winter.

The water-churning starts Friday when more than 150 outboards hit the lake for the Seafair regatta. Saturday and Sunday the nation's hottest pilots will shoot for championships in five limited inboard classes.

And Monday the big unlimited hydros will start their week-long qualifying trials for the 51st running Aug. 10 of the Gold Cup race, top event in the national speedboat picture.

The entry list for the Gold Cup, which closes at midnight Friday, had reached 18 at last check. The cup defense will be undertaken by Miss Thriftway, newly-built successor to the original Miss Thriftway which was wrecked in a race last fall.

Ten classes of outboards will be in action Friday, coming from all the West Coast states and British Columbia.

More than 50 entries are in for the limited races this weekend and race officials said the list might reach 100. Some of the pilots who go for national crowns in the small boats will step into larger craft next week and try for the Gold Cup.

National titles will be decided here in the 266 cubic inch class, 225, 136, 135 and 48. Non-title races also are slated for the 280s and the 7-liter class. Muncey, Brown and Hickling will drive 266s. Loomis will pilot his own 135 and Reeves a 136.

The most impressive figure wasn't runs, hits or errors in the Northwest League Wednesday night.

It was an attendance tally. 5,346 fans crowded into Eugene's 5,000-seat Bethel Park to watch the Emeralds split a doubleheader with Wenatchee.

The figure, easily the season's high for Eugene, was probably the best for the league this year.

It brought the Emeralds' total home attendance to nearly 60,000. Fifth place Eugene dropped the first contest with Wenatchee, 10-3, but squeezed out a 1-0 win in the second game.

In other games, Lewiston easily took Tri-City into camp, 7-4, and Yakima kept within two games of the front-running Broncs by dropping Salem, 9-4.

The Emeralds got their nightcap triumph behind the tight, four-hit pitching of Berlyn Hodges. The winning run came in the fourth frame, when Mel Krause rifled a triple that scored John Keller, who had walked.

Hank Bivens brought Wenatchee from behind in the third inning of the first game by blasting a two-run triple to make the score 4-3. The Chiefs never trailed after that, adding two more in the seventh and final frame.

The league's leading hurler, Thornton Kipper, notched his 17th win against eight defeats by tossing a six-hitter against Tri-City. The Broncs jumped into a quick three-run lead in the first stanza and were never headed.

Tri-City's Ray Looney was the only Brave to solve Kipper's stuff. The first baseman slammed two homers, one a two-run blow in the fourth, and banged out a single.

But the win didn't enhance the Broncs' league edge.

Yakima kept the spread at two games by decimating the Senators, 9-8, in a free-for-all at Salem.

The Bears were trailing, 8-7, when Pepper Thomas stepped to the plate in the eighth. Thomas powered one out of the park for two runs and the victory.

Ex-Fisherman Webb Is Sharp In Suzuzina Win

NEW YORK (AP) — A week ago Spider Webb was a 173-pound fisherman on vacation. Last night he was a sharp-punching 162 1/2-pounder who stopped Germany's Franz Suzuzina on a technical knockout in 1:30 of the seventh round at Madison Square Garden.

As a result of this quick switch, the high-ranked Chicago fighter now is in line for a Sept. 17 benefit show in Pittsburgh with Joey Giardello. He also has an offer for an early September match in Salt Lake City with Gene Fullmer, the ex-champ for whom he substituted against Suzuzina.

Suzuzina, a compact 161 1/2-pounder, was beginning to come on when Webb quickly decided to end things in the seventh round. A short chopping right started the German on the way and Webb drove home 12 straight punches before Referee Harry Kessler stepped between them.

"I got careless," said the German.

"I felt sharp despite only five days in the gym," said Webb, "I took off 11 pounds in a week after they told me Fullmer was out with a cut eye."

The Spider now has a fine 29-3 record with 13 knockouts. He never has been stopped.
