Yakima, on the strength of a last-ditch double by Herb Anderson, Thursday night kept within a two-game reach of the Lewiston Braves.

The showdown in the battle for first place comes Friday night when the Braves and the Bears tangle at Yakima in the first of a four-game series.

Anderson, only two weeks ago a regular on the Salem roster, whipped his former teammates, 7-5, off driving in the winning run with a two-bagger in the 10th inning.

Lewiston, riding the crest of a four-game victory string, dropped Tri-City, 7-6. Eugene hopped over Wenatchee into fourth place by one percentage point by defeating the Chiefs, 10-3.

Senators Blow Lead

Salem took a five-run lead over the Bears with a rally in the third frame but stayed scoreless after that until it picked up its final run in the ninth. That tied the contest, 6-6.

Anderson's double drove in Ted Tappe and the triumph was Yakima's, giving it a 3-1 series win.

Tri-City kept pecking away but couldn't overtake Lewiston after the Braves went ahead, 5-3, in the second frame.

A four-run second inning gave Lewiston the lead after Tri-City had gone ahead in the bottom of the first with three tallies.

Ernie Sadler registered the win to give him a 14-5 season record, tops in the league percentage-wise.

Emis Jump Ahead

The battle for fourth place finally resolved itself, at least for the time being, when Eugene dumped Wenatchee on the Emeralds' home field.

The victory, giving Eugene a 3-1 sweep of the series, moved the Emeralds into fourth and dropped Wenatchee into fifth spot. Both teams are six games out of first place, but Eugene has a won-lost percentage of .486, a point ahead of the Chiefs.

The win came on the strength of Eugene's seventh inning spurge, when it scored nine runs to bring it from a 3-1 deficit.

The runs came in on seven singles, three errors and three walks. It was a 14-3 rout in the inning, and Bill Eastburn, Mel Krause and pitcher Bailey Brem each drove in two runs.

Brem won the contest to run his season record to 12-6.

The teams travel Friday with Eugene at Tri-City, Salem at Wenatchee and Lewiston at Yakima in the Friday night openers of New four-game sets.

The most important series of the National League season, beginning tonight, finds the first-place Milwaukee Braves up and ready and the second-place San Francisco Giants down and totally unprepared.

Events during the past two nights altered the pennant picture completely. Wednesday the Giants were sitting on top, a full game in front of the Braves after one of their typical Frank Merriwell finishes while the Braves were being slapped down by their nemesis the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Today, it is the Braves who are a full game in front, after winning two in a row against Los Angeles while the Giants were blowing two big ones to Cincinnati.

Last night's Giant loss to the Redlegs was a crusher. They led 6-0 after four innings and 9-4 after 7½. Cincinnati, however, rallied for five runs in the eighth and won, 10-9 on pinch hitter Pete Whisenant's single with the bases loaded and one out in the ninth.

Pizarro Hurls Win

Milwaukee, encouraged by Warren Spahn's first victory over the Dodgers in seven years Wednesday night, followed with a 4-1 triumph yesterday to capture their first series of the year against Los Angeles. Young Juan Pizarro went the distance, hurling a four-hitter.

Philadelphia won its third straight from St. Louis, 4-1, and moved past the Cardinals into sixth place. The Chicago Cubs defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-4 in a game halted after eight innings by rain.

In the American League, the New York Yankees widened their enormous lead to 15 games over Boston, vanquishing Kansas City 8-3 after Detroit had nipped the Red Sox 3-2.

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
