Lane, Holt Cited For 'Courage' In NBA Ratings

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The National Basketball Assn., hailed as boxers of the month for August two fighters whose single achievements were being beaten in July. The NBA cited Kenny Lane and Mike Holt for "courageous exhibitions."

Lane, of Muskegon, Mich., lost a close decision to lightweight champion Joe Brown, while Holt, a South African, lost a light heavyweight battle to Yvon Durelle of Canada.

In the major change among its monthly rankings, the NBA moved Zora Foley up to the No. 1 position among heavyweights. Rating Committee Chairman Fred Saddy said Foley advanced with Eddie Machen dropping to No. 2 — "not because of his victory over Pete Rademacher, but because Machen has been inactive."

Cleveland Williams of Houston, Tex., was dropped from the heavyweight rankings because of his suspension by NBA, acting at the request of the British Boxing Board of Control.

Earl Murhard of Portland and Ralph Brown, of Vancouver, Wash., played for the title in the Class AA division for men over 60. Blakely advanced to the final round by downing four-time winner Marty Leptich of Portland 3 and 1.

Rosenblatt whipped Maryin Clark of Grants Pass 5 and 4. In the class AA division semifinals, Murhard beat Leon Ryan, Portland, 1 up and Brown beat Dr. R. F. Kenaga, Portland, on the 20th hole.

Hearings Start Sept. 17 On Pipeline Acquisition

WASHINGTON (AP)—Hearings will start here Sept. 17 on the proposed acquisition of the Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp. by the El Paso Natural Gas Co.

The date for the hearings to get under way was set Tuesday by the Federal Power Commission.

The Pacific Northwest system extends from the San Juan Basin gas fields of New Mexico and Colorado through Utah, Wyoming, Idaho, Oregon and Washington to the Canadian border. El Paso markets natural gas in the Southwest, California and Nevada.

The merger has been protested by members of Northwest delegations in Congress and state and civic interests.

Development Will Be Speeded Up At Parks Camp Sites

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Highway Commission approved Thursday a speed-up in developing camping sites in five state parks on the Oregon coast.

The commission gave its state Parks Department \$100,000 to add camp sites at Fort Stevens, Beverly Beach, Honeyman, Sunset Bay and Cape Lookout state parks.

The additional facilities will be ready for the start of the 1959 season.

C. H. Armstrong, state parks superintendent, said the sites are needed quickly because of the tremendous demand. He said that Honeyman Park is forced to turn away at least 50 campers a day.

The commission, which held its meetings in Portland, started a new policy of meeting in Salem.

It awarded 51 construction projects or referred them to chief engineer W. C. Williams for award.

CAB Asked To Grant Pacific Air Line Route

WASHINGTON (AP)—A parade of spokesmen for Northern California communities asked the Civil Aeronautics Board Thursday to grant Pacific Air Lines route extensions to Portland, Ore., and Reno, Nev.

They made their appeals in the second day of arguments involving Walter W. Bryan in the Pacific Northwest local air service case. Pacific Air Lines is the former Southwest Airways.

Bryan last April recommended that West Coast Airlines route be extended from Klamath Falls, Ore., to Sacramento and San Francisco and rejected Pacific's bid for an extension from Crescent City, Calif., to Portland.

B. L. Higgins, of the Coos County, Ore., Chamber of Commerce, urged West Coast service from Klamath Falls to Reno and the carriers extension to San Francisco via a coastal route through Crescent City and Yreka, both disapproved by the examiner.

Raymond J. Kasenberger, Pendleton, Ore., opposed a bid by Walla Walla, rejected by the examiner—for designation as a co-intermediate point with Pendleton on flights of United Air Lines.

Mayor Robert White, Salem, Ore., supported the examiner's recommendation against extension of United's service at the Oregon capital.

The hearing was expected to end later Thursday.

Python Found Dying From Cold During Heat Wave

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP)—A South American python was dying of the cold in Vancouver's heat wave.

He was found, all 3 1/2 feet of him, coiled around a banana stalk by workers at a produce wholesaler.

But he couldn't do much. He was suffering from the effects of 6-degree weather inside a banana car — just too cold for a python.

A workman clubbed him to death.

International Commission Given Look At How BPA Manages Power Operation

PORTLAND (AP)—The International Joint Commission Friday gets a look at how the Bonneville Power Administration manages its sprawling power development program.

The commission's inspection of BPA power facilities capped a 2,000-mile tour of the Columbia River.

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Both said the most serious problems hinge on a Canadian proposal to divert the Columbia into the Fraser River, and the American plan to build Libby Dam.

Wheat Growers Will Face Serious Losses

SALEM (AP)—Wheat growers in Baker, Union and Wallowa counties will have serious losses this year because of stem rust, the state Agriculture Department reported here.

The disease, a parasitic fungus, is worse this year because the crop in the three counties is two weeks later than usual.

It caused a substantial loss last year in Union County, and small losses in Baker County.

The department said the damage will total several hundred thousand dollars.
