

Jehovahites Blame World Ills On Christendom Clergy

NEW YORK (AP)—More than 100,000 Jehovah's Witnesses adopted a resolution yesterday blaming the world's ills on organized Christianity.

"The clergy of Christendom," the resolution said, "stands as the most reprehensible and delinquent class on earth."

A loud chorus of "Ayes" greeted the resolution when it was read to the Witnesses at Yankee Stadium and the Polo Grounds.

There were 194,418 Witnesses in the ball parks or gathered in nearby streets for the sixth day of their international assembly. A crowd in excess of 200,000 is expected for the convention's finale tomorrow.

The resolution said religious leaders had erred in encouraging the people to follow man-made schemes for peace. The clergy "turned their backs on Jesus Christ," the resolution added, in seeking support for an added, in Nations and the United Nations.

"All the blind people who follow these blind religious leaders will suffer execution with them at God's hands" when the present world ends, the resolution added.

The Witnesses believed the world will end at the battle of Armageddon. Then, said the Witnesses, good will conquer evil and the Witnesses will inherit a new world of peace and everlasting life.

Prison-Liberated Segregationist To Resume Tirades

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Segregationist John Kasper, free again after serving eight months in prison for contempt of court, has pledged to continue his fight against integration.

In a talk from the steps of the Florida capitol Friday, Kasper also condemned racial integration in the federal prison system and called for a third party to free the country "from Negro and Jew control."

A small group of his followers also heard him say that both major parties are pledged to integration and the destruction of the white race.

In speaking of racial integration in the federal reformatory at Tallahassee, Kasper said he was forced to work alongside Negroes in the prison laundry.

"But under the circumstances, I didn't complain," he said.

Riot Charge Still Faced

He was sentenced to a year in prison for contempt of a federal court at Knoxville, Tenn., when he persisted in his rabble-rousing in defiance of the court order. An other six month contempt sentence growing out of the Clinton, Tenn., school riots is pending, and he faces trial in Nashville in September on state charges of inciting a riot. His first active effort since leaving prison probably will be made at Memphis, Tenn., where he said some friends have asked him to help prevent integration in the schools.

In Memphis, Public Safety Commissioner Claude Armour said Kasper would be unwelcome there.

The 28-year-old Kasper, 15 pounds thinner than when he entered prison.

LA GRANDE, Ore. (AP)—A teenage girl was killed Friday night as a car overturned on U.S. 30, east of here.

Wanda Marsh, 15, La Grande, was killed outright when she was thrown from the car. The vehicle rolled more than 240 feet before landing upside down.

Three others were injured. Larry Hood, 21, Spokane, suffered a concussion and shoulder fracture. Also admitted to a hospital here were Robert E. Pepper, 21, Riverside, Calif., and Linda Hamblen, 14, La Grande.

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Woman Accused In Killing Held In Drug's Grip

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—An attractive 42-year-old divorcee accused of killing a wealthy pharmaceutical executive because he spurned her for a younger woman was still unconscious today, but detectives said they were satisfied she did the shooting.

Police laboratory technicians said tests show that a pistol found in the purse of Mrs. Connie Nicholas is the gun which killed Forrest Teel, 34-year-old executive vice president of Eli Lilly & Co. drug firm.

Capt. Michael J. Smiley, chief of the homicide bureau, said he believes Mrs. Nicholas traced Teel to the apartment of Miss Laura L. Mowrer, 29, whom he identified as the woman Teel had been seeing for the last three months. He said Mrs. Nicholas apparently waited for Teel outside in his auto until after midnight, Wednesday, and that the shooting climaxed a bitter argument in a nearby parking lot.

Murder Charge Raised

Smiley said he believes the attractive divorcee drove immediately to the secluded riverbank where she was found, unconscious, after taking an overdose of sleeping pills.

Capt. Smiley called Mrs. Nicholas a "spurned woman" after a 15-year friendship with Teel. A preliminary charge of murder has been filed against her.

Teel, who was married and the father of a 14-year-old son, was director of all marketing for the huge Eli Lilly firm.

Miss Mowrer is a sales personal relations secretary at the Lilly company, and reportedly a friend of Mrs. Nicholas.

Muttering a protest, Gurnay bought a ticket, took off his wet clothes, donned a pair of dry swimming trunks and drove home.

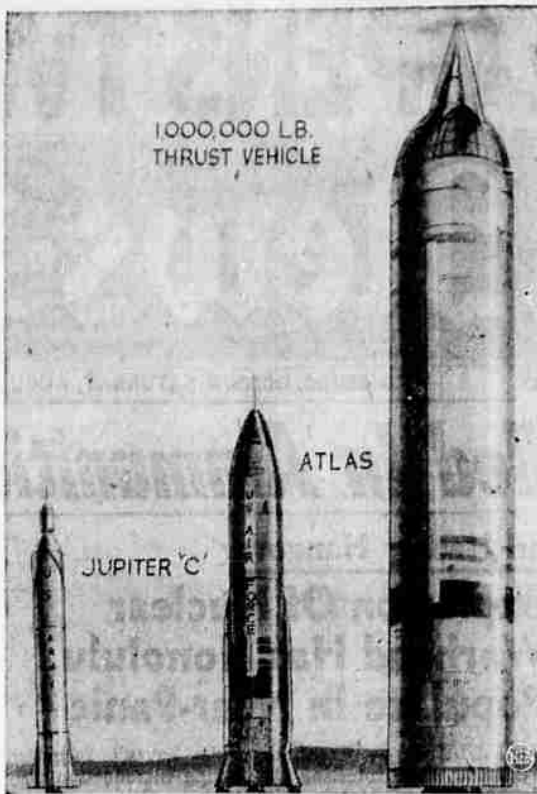

Mimeograph Fluid Drink Kills 2 In Reformatory

BUENA VISTA, Colo. (AP)—Thirty-seven young inmates of the Colorado reformatory drank mimeograph fluid late Friday. Two died later at a Salida hospital and two were in critical condition.

Dr. H. D. Smith said three other inmates taken to the Salida hospital were in fair condition. Thirty of the youths were taken by ambulance and private car to the state prison hospital at Canon City.

Authorities said none of the youths at the prison hospital was in serious condition.

AIM AT SIX-MILLION-POUND THRUST—Sketch shows, at right, a projected missile that can be boosted with a million-pound thrust engine. It is compared for size with well-known existing missiles. Rocketdyne division of North American Aviation, Inc., has just received an Air Force contract to build major components for the unprecedented engine. An essential step toward interplanetary exploration, the development of a single-chambered engine in the one-million-pound class will make a cluster of six for a six-million-pound thrust relatively easy. The million-pound engine will have a liquid propellant system, similar to those used in the Rocketdyne engines for the Atlas ICBM, the Thor and Jupiter's IBM's and the Redstone missile that provided the first-stage boost for the satellite-launching Jupiter-C.

Milwaukee R. R. Strike Blocked By Court Order

CHICAGO (AP)—A U.S. District Court order late Friday night has blocked temporarily a strike against the Milwaukee Railroad called for Monday by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.

Judge Win G. Knuch signed the temporary restraining order fixing a hearing in Chicago Friday, Aug. 8, after hearing a petition by the railroad.

The strike authorization was announced Friday at the union's headquarters in Cleveland after a failure of railroad and union officials to settle a dispute over the dropping of brakemen's jobs on various Milwaukee road trains.

A strike by the union, whose membership includes brakemen, switchmen, conductors and dining car stewards, could tie up the road's service on lines extending from Chicago to the Northwest.

Death Defeats Plan For Kidney Transplant

BOSTON (AP)—Nils-Olov Wisell, 50, of Sweden, died last night at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. He had been awaiting a kidney transplant operation.

The 11-year-old youngster from Motala, Sweden, was born with one kidney, which he lost last April when he toppled from a merry-go-round near his home.

A hospital bulletin said Nils' death was due to the inability of his system to accept bone marrow transfusions from his mother. She was to have donated one of her kidneys.

The boy died with his parents at his bedside and his bed surrounded by gifts which had poured in from all over the nation since his admission on July 1.

Nils' operation would have been unprecedented, since kidney transplants have been successful only between identical twins.

Many Nuns Suffering From Hunger, Pope Says

CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy (AP)—Pope Pius XII said Saturday that some convents of cloistered nuns are in want and their inmates suffering from hunger.

The 82-year-old head of the Roman Catholic Church in a series of broadcasts urged them to work to meet their needs.

There are about 100,000 cloistered nuns in 3,000 convents throughout the world. Many of them heard the Pontiff on radio for the first time in the current series of broadcasts—the first of his kind. The Pope spoke from the studio of his summer residence here.

Can you imagine a nation such as ours without a standard of weights and measures? Each one would determine for himself what constituted a pound of material or a yard of distance. All monetary values would be determined by the desires and dictates of the individual concerned. Naturally chaos would be the immediate result of such a condition. Strife and diverse parties would be the rule of the day. That such conditions would exist in the absence of a set of standards is so evident that the greatest care is exercised to maintain, publish, and protect a recognized standard of weights and measures. 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Visibility Times Of Sputnik III In NW Told

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Eight passes of the Sputnik III rocket carrier will be visible in most parts of the Pacific Northwest in the next three days, the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory announced Saturday.

The rocket will be traveling in a southeasterly direction about 650 miles above the earth.

The timetable, with all times Pacific Standard:

Sunday, Aug. 3—May be seen at 9:04 p.m. northeast of a line from Washington state to South Carolina.

At 10:48 p.m. it appears over northwest Canada and goes into the earth's shadow at 1:56 west of the Great Lakes. It may be seen everywhere in the country except the Southwest.

Monday, Aug. 4—At 12:30 a.m. it will soar over Alaska. At 12:39 a.m. it goes into earth's shadow over Idaho. It may be seen west of a line from Lake Superior to central Texas.

At 2:14 a.m. it comes into visibility west of Alaska. At 2:22 a.m. it goes into earth's shadow far out to sea west of Washington state. It may be seen only in the Northwest.

At 9:01 p.m. into visibility west of Hudson Bay and at 9:09 enters earth's shadow over Nova Scotia. May be seen northeast of a line from Washington state to South Carolina.

It comes into visibility over northwest Canada at 10:44 p.m. and at 10:52 goes into earth's shadow over Michigan. May be seen everywhere except the Southwest.

Tuesday, Aug. 5—At 12:35 a.m. appears over Alaska and at 12:34 enters earth's shadow over Idaho. May be seen everywhere west of a line from Lake Superior to West Texas.

The final pass, 2:09 a.m. comes west of Alaska, goes into earth's shadow 2:17 west of Puget Sound and may be seen only in the Northwest.

DEFAULT ORDER ISSUED

A default order and judgment by Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich has been entered in the court record allowing the \$902 claim of United Adjusters, Inc., against Charlton A. Sr. and Elizabeth Munyon.
