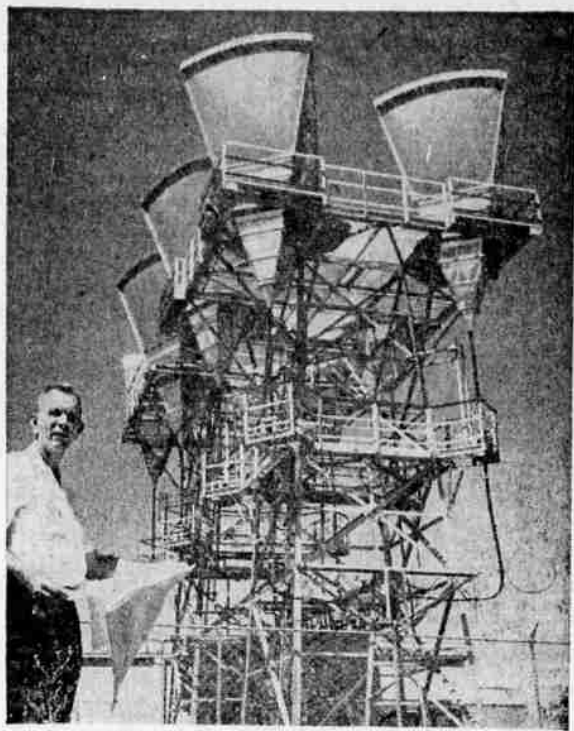

Woman Claims Hoffa Threatened Her By Telephone

WASHINGTON (AP) — A strikingly pretty blonde, clutching a silver rosary, swore Friday she was threatened with disfigurement or worse if she testified before Senate investigators about labor union racketeers in the Detroit area.

Testifying nevertheless, Detroit laundry operator Nancy Dawson said the telephone threats purportedly originated with "Hoffa of the Teamsters."

James R. Hoffa, president of the Teamsters Union, is scheduled to appear next week in the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee's inquiry into alleged union and hoodlum preying on Detroit's laundry and related industries.

The shapely Mrs. Dawson, speaking in a calm, cultivated voice, won warm praise from Chairman John L. McClellan (D-Ark) for courage in testifying.

Mrs. Dawson gave the senators a note written by her secretary, Virginia Slepak, reporting the telephone warnings.

It was dated July 9. Committee Chairman McClellan quoted it as reading in part, "Tell Mrs. Dawson keep her mouth shut and all will be all right. There will be no trouble."

Mrs. Dawson said the secretary quoted the caller as stating he was "Hoffa of the Teamsters."

The committee had announced recently that it had arranged police protection for a woman witness who had been threatened and who, it was feared, might come to harm for cooperating in the hearings.

Speeding Cross-Country Streamliner Leaves Rails

MILWAUKEE (AP) — A speeding cross-country streamliner suddenly began to rock and sway and in a matter of moments 11 cars careened off the rails, injuring 33 of its 487 passengers.

The last six cars of the Milwaukee Road Olympian Hiawatha whiplashed off the tracks and slid down a 20-foot embankment as the train raced into southern Milwaukee County at 90 miles an hour. About 1,000 feet ahead, the diesel-powered engine ground to a stop, five more cars tilting off the rails. All the cars remained upright.

Head brakeman E. C. Holden, 34, said, "The train just started to shake. The 13th car went into the ditch and everything followed. The rest of the train just wriggled and bumped along."
