Sutherland, Drain, Prineville Win In NBC Tourney

Sutherland, Drain and Prineville all were winners Saturday night as the National Baseball Congress state championships got under way at Drain.

The tourney began with the Sutherland Merchants downing the South Douglas Trojans from Riddle, 4-1, behind the five-hit hurling of Leon Hayes. The Drain Black Sox, tourney favorites, got off on the right foot, with an 8-2 victory over Albany and Prineville made the most of three hits to edge McKenzie, 3-1.

Tonight's Games Set

Tonight's action will pit Riddle against Albany at 5 p.m., Sutherland against Drain at 7 p.m. in the winners' bracket and the winner of the Riddle-Albany game against McKenzie in the third game. The losers in the first and third games will be knocked out of the tourney in the double-elimination setup.

Top hitter in the opening game was Sutherland catcher Earl Plueard, who drove in what proved to be the winning runs with a two-run single in the third stanza. Riddle fielders contributed to their club's downfall by committing six errors.

Droscher Smacks Homer

Drain found the going tough until the top of the seventh, when ex-Roseburg High School star Jerry capped a four-run rally with two-run homer. Droscher also drove across a pair of Drain runs in the second inning with a single.

Prineville copped the weird third game although it was out-hit by McKenzie 3-7 and committed five errors in three for McKenzie. First baseman Ray Lundy barked across all the runs Prineville needed in the first inning with a two-run single. Lundy also collected a double. Les Ramsey, Bob Gardner and John Westholm all had two hits for the losers.

Navy Wrestling Coach Says U.S. Must Stress Physical Fitness

STILLWATER, Okla., (AP)—Navy wrestling coach Ray Swartz says if the United States doesn't do something about physical fitness at the high school level "we're headed for serious trouble."

Swartz was interviewed here yesterday after conducting a wrestling clinic at Oklahoma State University at Stillwater, where he once was a star athlete.

"Youngsters of today have gone soft. They're nothing like they were in my school days," he said. "We get some surprising examples at the Naval Academy. Even the boys from the small country

towns are in poor condition. So many can't even do simple push-ups and have trouble lifting a barbell."

"The change at Annapolis is remarkable, showing what can be done there and what should be done everywhere. After 60 days of our rigorous program these same youngsters are hard as nails."

The program launched by President Eisenhower is a wonderful project. Perhaps it's a good thing that the Spartans and athletic defeats by Russia came along. We need to realize the situation and be prodded into doing something about it.

Gordon Choice Looks Good
Fast-shuffling Frank Lane virtually dealt himself a new Cleveland team this year but the most important Indian acquisition appears to be Joe Gordon, the manager.

The double triumph by the Indians Friday night extended the Tribe's longest winning streak of the season to six.

Gordon missed a month ago took over a badly disorganized team that had dropped 26 of its 67 games. Since then the Indians have won 19 while losing only 16. No American League team, other than the Yankees, has done as well.

Bob Turley pitched a five-hit shutout and Bill Skowron drove in four Yankees runs with a home run, double and single as Chicago's Billy Pierce suffered his eighth defeat. It was Turley's fifth shutout and 16th victory. He has lost four. Pierce has won 10.

Jim Lemon smashed two home runs and Roy Sievers hit one, his 27th, as the last place Senators collected 17 hits against four Kansas City pitchers.

Robbin Roberts, with 200 victories already in the bag, may become the first truly modern National League pitcher to win 300 lifetime games.

Although Early Wynn of the Chicago White Sox, with 244 victories, and Milwaukee's Warren Spahn, with 217, are far ahead of him, the still-brilliant Philadelphia right-hander appears to have the best chance to join the elite dozen who have reached the charmed circle.

Roberts thinks he has a good chance to do it. "If I can keep pitching the way I have," he said after his three-hit 3-1 triumph over the Chicago Cubs Friday night, "I might make it. My arm really feels fine now. I'm throwing with that easy motion."

Braves Up Lead

The Braves increased their National League lead to two games over San Francisco, defeating the Giants 4-2, Pittsburgh handed St. Louis its fourth straight defeat with a 2-0 shutout. Los Angeles rallied for five runs in the ninth to crush Cincinnati 6-2.

The New York Yankees soared to their biggest lead of the season—16½ games—shutting out Chicago 7-0 while Cleveland was sweeping a doubleheader from Boston 7-1 and 3-1. Detroit downed Baltimore 3-1 and Washington drubbed Kansas City 10-4.

Relief pitcher Don McMahon threw a called third strike past Willie Mays with the tying runs on second and third to save Lew Burdette's 10th straight over the Giants.

Five Dodgers singles, off four Redleg pitchers, produced five runs that enabled Los Angeles to overcome a 2-1 deficit in the ninth. Ronnie Kline pitched the Pittsburgh shutout against St. Louis, a four-hitter that gave him his fourth straight victory and 11th of the season.

Clutch North Bend Hurling Drops Lockwood Club, 3-2

Two unearned runs gave the North Bend American Legion junior baseball team a lead in the second game of the area four title series with Roseburg Friday night.

To these two tallies, the North Bend nine added another run and then hung on to win the game and the semi-final berth, by a score of 3-2.

Inability to hit in the clutch cost the Lockwood Motors club dearly Friday night, as it did in the first game of the series Wednesday night. In this game, Roseburg left just seven men on base as opposed to the 11 left in the first game. But five of these runners were left after the Lockwood club had narrowed the North Bend lead to just one run.

Again a pair of North Bend hurlers kept the Roseburg bats well in check, as just four hits were gained by Lockwood batters. The Tower Motors team grabbed six right-hander Bob Whipple. Four of these were in the first three innings.

Tom Younker pitched the win for North Bend and received help from Gary Wallace in the last inning, when Roseburg left the bases full.

North Bend jumped to a one run lead in the first frame as Younker doubled left, scoring Bill Swain. It could have been more, but a Livingston-to-Gene Wagner double play took the Lockwood club out of further trouble.

The Tower Motors team took a 3-0 lead in the third as Tom Gates was safe on an error. Swain doubled and Ron Kersey singled.

Casey Says Baseball Needs Players, Not Rule Changes

CHICAGO (AP)—"All baseball needs is more good ball players," grumbled Casey Stengel, manager of the New York Yankees, when asked for comment on a proposal to change baseball's rules.

Stengel's flat rejection of the proposal made yesterday by American League President Will Harridge summed up feelings of most managers and officials in the game.

In a memo to club owners, Harridge asked that consideration be given to an amendment that would permit use of a substitute player twice in a game. Harridge said the proposal was suggested by Lou Fouce, former major league player and manager who is now motion picture director for the American and National Leagues.

Permits Re-Entry
The change would permit a player removed from a game for other than rules infraction to reenter the contest provided one inning had elapsed between his departure and return.

Harridge said the proposed change may contain "some flaws we have not discovered," but, he added, "we have the feeling that the change would please the public and give managers more leeway in their strategy."

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Brundage Takes Top Background To N. C. Event

Mike Brundage, Oregon State Jaycee boys tennis champ, leaves for Chapel Hill, N.C. tonight, to represent this state and Roseburg in the National Jaycee finals Aug. 5-10.

The Roseburg High School sophomore-to-be won the state boys crown at Corvallis in a three-day tourney completed June 29. Before and since, his tennis accomplishments have amazed tennis fans by his caliber of play.

The most surprising aspect of his rise to the state title is the fact he began playing the game just last summer.

Becomes Mainstay
Brundage has competed in all sports in school, but just last spring as a Roseburg High freshman, he turned out for Al Hoffman's tennis team. He promptly became one of the mainstays on a tennis club which has been one of the top teams in the state for over 10 years.

The start toward the state boys crown began in early June, when the Roseburg Jaycee tourney was conducted. Competing in both the boys and junior men's divisions, Brundage scored a complete sweep of both titles to win his berth in the state tourney.

In the boys division, he downed Don Harris 6-0, 6-0, Don Lowe in a Kramer set, 8-1, and Tommy Kirk in the final match 4-6, 6-3, 8-6. In the junior men's play, he

scored wins over Dick Petersen 6-4, 6-2, Doug Green 6-0, 5-7, 6-0 and in the final match, Dave Montgomery 6-1, 6-1.

Wins At Corvallis
At Corvallis, Brundage competed only in the boys division and scored straight set wins over his three opponents in the drive to the title. In the first round action, it was a win over Ted Green of Portland 6-0, 6-1. In the second match he downed Bud Walton of Eugene, 6-0, 6-0, and for the crown he defeated Merv Logan of Springfield, 6-0, 6-1.

Brundage also teamed up with Kirk to win the state boys' doubles title with a win over the team of Logan and Walton, 6-0, 6-1, and a win over two Salem men, a n, George Stratlin and James Rose, by a score of 6-3, 6-1.

Next action for the Roseburg champion was the Oregon state tennis tournament in Portland. In the first day of action, Brundage downed a Seattle, Wash. boys' division competitor, Robbins Harper, 6-0, 6-2. He continued his winning ways with a victory over John Wynn of Sacramento, Calif., 6-3, 6-1. The local netman was finally defeated in the quarter-finals, when he lost to John Yeomans of Los Angeles, 8-6, 6-2.
