

2,500 Persons Rehired At GM, Kaiser Plants

NEW YORK (AP) — Rehiring of 2,500 workers at five General Motors Corp. divisions and two Kaiser Aluminum & Chemical Corp. plants was announced Monday.

In New Orleans, Kaiser said it reemployed 240 workers at Chalmette, La., returning the plant to full production. Another 150 workers are being called back to Kaiser's Mead, Wash., plant.

Four General Motors divisions in Dayton will recall 1,620 workers by Oct. 1. Frigidaire called back 400 beginning Monday, boosting the payroll to about 14,000. Inland Manufacturing will rehire 500 by Oct. 1. Moraine Products will take back 450 by Aug. 25. Delco will add 270 by Sept. 8.

House Approves Bill To Cancel Seed Wheat Duty

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House passed and sent to the Senate Monday a bill which would cancel a tariff advantage of approximately 10 cents a bushel on quota-free imported seed wheat, chiefly of Canadian origin.

The bill would remove seed wheat, which has been treated with poisonous or other substances from the tariff category of "unfit for human consumption" and classify it simply as "wheat" subject to full duty. Its quota-free status would be unchanged.

This would mean that seed wheat, which normally sells at prices substantially above wheat for milling purposes, would not be allowed a tariff discount of about 10 cents a bushel which now applies to wheat classified as "unfit for human consumption."

Virtually all seed wheat entering the United States comes from Canada.

The House Agriculture Committee cited customs figures showing that imports of seed wheat classified as "unfit for human consumption" rose from around 4,000 bushels in 1952-53 to 1,860,000 in 1956-57.

Publishers Paper Co. To Add Paper Bag Plant

OREGON CITY (AP) — The addition of a kraft paper bag plant to its operations was announced Monday by Publishers Paper Co. here.

The bag plant will be installed in the old Oregon City Woolen Mills building.

Kraft bags, used principally for groceries, will be made from pulp purchased from the Oregon Kraft Paper Mills, said president S. J. Robinson.

Workmen are preparing the building for the new plant machinery which will add 25 persons to the Publishers' payroll, Robinson said.

Shakespearean Festival's Founder, Producer Holds Audience In Palm Of Hand

ASHLAND (AP)—Holding the audience in the palm of his hand every minute he was on stage at the Oregon Shakespearean Festival's production of "The Merchant of Venice" Sunday night was Angus Bowmer, founder and producing director of the festival.

Particularly interesting was Bowmer's demonstration of the techniques by which a skillful actor can take the same lines and identical situations in the same play and portray an entirely different character. Bowmer's Shylock, as played on the Ashland stage in 1954, was both comic and villainous, as Shylock must be, but there was much that was sympathetic in the role. The viewer was led to believe that the usurious Jew was a product of racial persecution experienced by his race for centuries.

Despicable Character
Sunday night, however, Bowmer's Shylock was a thoroughly despicable character, embodying, and even caricaturing, every undesirable trait assigned to the Jewish race by the most fanatical anti-Semite.

Whatever one's personal preference in the interpretation of the role of Shylock, the fact remains that Bowmer was superb in both characterizations.

Also outstanding in the fast-paced comedy were Nagle Jackson of Walla Walla, Wash., as the clown, Launcelot Gobbo and Margaret Vafiadis of West Columbia, Tex., in the coveted role of Portia.

Jackson, whose rollicking gobbo delighted the audience, will study mime in Paris this fall. Margaret Vafiadis, wife of George Vafiadis, a popular festival actor, was

charming and intelligent as Portia.

Seen as Jessica, Shylock's sweet and lovely daughter, was Ellen Kay, natural and pleasing in her only major role this season. Miss Kay, now a candidate for a doctorate in English literature, studied in England last year on an AAUW fellowship. Her first volume of poetry has just been published by the Swallow Press.

The cast was well balanced, with capable actors in all roles, large and small. Among the many who turned in fine performances were Jerry Turner as Antonio, William Nye as Bassanio, Keith Fowler as Lorenzo and Michael O'Sullivan as old Gobbo.

Sharply characterized and highly amusing were the performances of Herbert McLellan as the prince of Arragon and Michael Addison as the prince of Morocco.

"The Merchant of Venice" will be seen on the festival stage again on Thursday, Aug. 7 and every fourth day thereafter, closing the festival season on Thursday, Sept. 4. Other plays of the cycle are "Troilus and Cressida," "Much Ado About Nothing" and "King Lear."

Panama Lawyer Target Of Assassin's Bullets

PANAMA (AP) — Ruben Mico who never made good on his promise to tell all he knew about the assassination of President Jose Antonio Remon, survived a burst of gunfire from an unidentified automobile last night.

The dapper, 43-year-old lawyer suffered flesh wounds in his left chest and right arm, and a third bullet lodged in his right buttock. He drove himself to a hospital and his condition was described as not serious after removal of the bullet.

CHAMONIX, France (AP) — Five mountain climbers missing in the Alps were all found Monday in good condition.
