Courtney Seeks World 880 Mark In Budapest Spike Meet

BUDAPEST (AP) — Tom Courtney, Olympic champion and holder of the world record for 880 yards, had his sights on a new 800-meter international standard tonight as he led America's athletes into a track extravaganza against the best of Hungary and Czechoslovakia.
 "I'm going for the world 800-meter record tonight," said the former Fordham ace from Livingston, N. J., who plans to retire after returning home. "I want that record. This race should give me a much better chance than the ones coming up in Athens because of the track and strong competition."
 Roger Meens of Belgium holds the world mark of 1:45.7. Courtney's world mark for the slightly longer 880 yards is 1:46.8.

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Puckett To Race At All-Star Game

PENDLETON (AP) — Star sprinter Jim Puckett of Cove, who twice ran the 100-yard dash in 9.3 this spring, will compete in an exhibition sprint at halftime of the class B Shrine East-West All-Star football game here Aug. 23.
 Puckett turned down an offer to play as a halfback in the game, "to give some bigger boy a chance." He weighs 130 pounds.
 Now he has challenged any runner-college or high school—to oppose him in the exhibition dash. Puckett resigned from the football all-star team as a precaution against endangering his track career.
 He will enter the University of Oregon this fall as the state's fastest high school sprinter.

South Salem QB Lost To State 11

PORTLAND (AP)—The upstate all-star football team has suffered a severe blow with the loss of South Salem quarterback Keith Burres.

Burres—who was benched on doctors' orders—was to have been the key man in the team's 7-formation against the Metropolitan all-stars in the annual Shrine benefit football game here Aug. 16.
 State coach Lee Gustafson—who coached Burres last season at South Salem—had planned to build the state attack around him.

The Metro team—drilling at Lewis and Clark College under the direction of coach Tom DeSilvia of Portland's Jefferson High School—went through signal drills and blocking and tackling practice Monday.

The two 27-man squads were to lay off Tuesday to visit the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children. Receipts from the game will be used to help finance the hospital's work.

Local Girl Named By Presbyterians
