

Confession Clears Convicted Slayer

JEFFERSON, Ga. (AP) — A murder indictment was sought today against Charles (Rocky) Rothschild, whose confession of a slaying saved another man from the electric chair.

Prosecutor Alfred Quillian prepared to appear before a grand jury and ask it to indict Rothschild, former policeman of Cairo, Ill., and A. D. Allen, used car salesman from Windsor.

Quillian charges them with the holdup killing of Charlie Drake, 40-year-old Jefferson merchant. Rothschild's confession named Allen as an accomplice in the killing.

James Fulton Foster, a house painter from Greer, S. C., was twice convicted and twice sentenced to death for the shooting of Drake. Foster was freed on bond after Rothschild confessed last month.

Aug. 11 has been set as a tentative date for hearing Foster's motion for a new trial to carry out legal technicalities for clearing him of the murder charge. He is married and has seven children.

Captured American Flier To Be Tried In Indonesia

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — Foreign Minister Subandrio told newsmen that captured American flier Allen Lawrence Pope will be tried soon before a military tribunal.

He did not name a date but said all investigation in the case of the American, now under detention in a military hospital, has been completed.

Pope was captured when his rebel-owned B25 bomber was shot down over east Indonesian waters May 18 and brought here May 30.

Pope, 30, of Miami, Fla., has been in a hospital ever since, undergoing an operation for an injury to his left leg sustained when he baled out.

35 Officers Suspended For Traffic Violations

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Thirty-five patrolmen, sergeants and detectives were suspended Saturday for varying periods by Police Commissioner Thomas J. Gibbons. They were charged with violating departmental safe-driving regulations.

Farm Loan Assn. Report Members' Loans \$260,027

L. G. Perkins, secretary-treasurer of the Roseburg National Farm Loan Assn., at Roseburg, reported today that members used the organization to provide themselves credit amounting to \$260,027 in the fiscal year ending June 30.

Perkins said this money was obtained by members in Douglas, Coos and Curry Counties, the territory served by the NFILA.

The NFILA officials said the major purposes for which money was borrowed was for refinancing of indebtedness, purchase of land and livestock, improvements to land and buildings and general farm operations.

Eugene H. Fisher, director of the bank, said the co-operatively-owned group now owns \$90,190 in capital stock. The stock is in the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, the institution for which the association makes loans.

A total of 65 NFILA units in the five Northwest states own all of the bank's capital, said Fisher.

During the last fiscal year, the Roseburg NFILA shared in a \$313,380 dividend declared by the bank, the bulk of which was passed on to association members.

Trouble Shooter Robert Murphy To Visit Cairo

CAIRO (AP) — President Eisenhower's envoy, Robert Murphy, is expected in Cairo Tuesday to confer with President Nasser. A U.S. Embassy spokesman said, "You can quote us as confirming that Murphy comes on the invitation of the United Arab Republic government."

The government has been trying to convey the impression that the initiative for Murphy's visit was all on the United States side.

The embassy spokesman said the agenda for talks is "up to the U.A.R. government." This is expected to include U.A.R. allegations that American and British landings in Lebanon and Jordan are an aggression.

Nasser's ambition to attend a summit conference as the chief Arab spokesman almost certainly will be brought up.

And Murphy may raise U.S. proposals that Nasser let his Middle East neighbors work out their own future.

Murphy will be coming here with new prestige and respect as a result of his weekend talks with the new Iraqi government leaders in Baghdad. These apparently were so hopeful for the West that big Egyptian newspapers published only scantiest accounts.

On another diplomatic front the Egyptian government is working to bring a second African-Asian conference like that held in Bandung in 1955 and would like it held before the year's end in Cairo.

The Cairo press said President Nasser made "contacts of particular importance with the chiefs of 10 African-Asian nations since his return from Moscow three weeks ago."
