

Sec. Dulles Warns Against Indirect Aggression Threat

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said Wednesday indirect aggression threatens another world war—"this time with even more disastrous consequences."
World events now show "disturbing symptoms such as preceded and forecast World War II" Dulles said in a speech prepared for a luncheon given for him by the American Chamber of Commerce in Brazil.
Dulles spoke to the American business community just before flying with Brazilian President Juscelino Kubitschek to Brasilia, the nation's capital under construction 600 miles northwest of Rio. It was the secretary's last stop on his 2½-day visit to Brazil. He was to fly back to Washington Wednesday night.
Dulles and Kubitschek were reported near agreement that a summit conference of the presidents of the 21 American peoples should be called to knit together the strained ties between the United States and its Latin neighbors.

Municipal Judge Metes Fines In Tuesday Court

Two Camas Valley loggers, charged with assault by committing indignities upon a housewife, pleaded innocent to the charges today at their arraignment before District Judge Warren A. Woodruff.
The court set bail at \$500 each for Erwin Merle Smith, 32, and his brother, Wesley Bedford Smith, 31. Trial is set tentatively for next Monday afternoon.
The complaint was signed by a Camas Valley housewife, alleging the act was committed July 30 while visiting with Mrs. Wesley Smith at the family home.
The brothers were arrested Tuesday night by the resident deputy sheriff and booked in county jail. The report said the act was committed while Mrs. Smith and two small children looked on.
The pair were released this morning after posting the required bail.

Cooling, Moist Air To Flow Into Western Oregon

Cooling, moist air will begin flowing into Western Oregon Thursday and will reach across the Cascades the following day. The Weather Bureau at Portland forecast Wednesday.
A Pacific storm moving down the Canadian coast brought rain to the northwestern tip of Washington state Wednesday. It was expected to touch northwestern Oregon by Thursday.
However, some high temperatures can be expected to persist inland in Oregon with the maximum perhaps up to 85 degrees in the southern part of the western section of the state Thursday and Friday.
Thundershowers are likely in the mountains of Eastern Oregon late Thursday or Friday.
Two small forest fires on the Rogue National Forest were being mopped up Wednesday in the Klamath District.
One, set up by lightning Monday night, was up Seven Mile Creek under Bunker Hill.
The other, which spread from a logger's cabin, was in the Fish Lake District, near Ashland. Both Klamath and Ashland district officers sent suppression crews.
The fires came during an extension of the extreme heat which has made the forests critically dry.
Medford and Grants Pass each reported 97 degree readings Tuesday. Several other points had temperatures in the 90s, including Salem, Eugene and Roseburg with 92. Newport on the coast was cool with a top of 68.

School Superintendents, Doctors To Convene

School superintendents from throughout Douglas County will gather in Roseburg Monday with doctors and dentists to discuss physical examinations for students and bus drivers.
The meeting will be held in the office of Roseburg School Supt. M. C. Deller, between 7 and 8 p.m. School administrative heads will meet with representatives of the Umpqua District Dental Society to discuss problems and the feasibility of setting up a dental clinic.
At 8 p.m. the superintendents will meet with representatives of the Douglas County Medical Society and the County Health Department to discuss physical examinations for students and school bus drivers. New legislation requires bus drivers to have physical examinations.

Burn Victim's Story Falls Apart With New Evidence

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP)—The sketchy story that Teamsters Business Agent Frank Kierdorf gave after he stumbled into a hospital, burned almost from head to foot, began falling apart today.
At the same time, police had a warrant for the arrest of Kierdorf's uncle, Herman Kierdorf, either a vengeance-bent hunter or the fear-shaken prey of an anonymous telephone threat.
Herman, a former Teamsters business agent, disappeared after swearing he would get even with the people who had mistreated and set him afire and left him, pain-wracked and nearly naked, on a hospital lawn.
While the 56-year-old Frank clung to a thin strand of life in a police-guarded hospital room, Prosecutor Frederick Ziem said: "The man had prior medication before he ever came to the hospital. Furthermore, there is no evidence to back up his statement that he rolled in the grass to put out the flames."
Ziem based his conclusions on the word of a pathologist, Dr. Richard E. Olsen, who said he found traces of a salve on Kierdorf's neck and face that was not administered at the hospital.

Why did he leave home Sunday night with two strangers? He said they told him it was union business, but he later admitted he was wearing only a robe over trousers and an undershirt.

Hatfield Continues Governor Campaign In Douglas County

In his second day of campaigning in Douglas County in 72 hours, Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, Republican candidate for governor, maintained a busy schedule of visiting mills and meeting with delegations Tuesday.
Hatfield spoke to the building trades and fire fighters conventions Saturday but Tuesday was devoted to intensive personal campaigning throughout the area.
Although he has not been endorsed by the official union slate, Hatfield said he looks for "considerable" backing among individual union members. "It is clear to me after visiting with delegates that the rank-and-file union members will make up their minds on the basis of the candidate's record and qualifications," Hatfield said.
"These individual union members want some legislation that will give them protections such as required auditing of trust funds and secret balloting," Hatfield observed. "Oregon has been relatively free of labor scandal but we can avoid it only by the rank-and-file participating more fully and actively in their organization's affairs."
Hatfield said that "it is ironic to find the unemployment commission fund for out-of-state travel for a half that time and to note that we spend twice the amount on unemployment officialdom we allot for travel of industrial development ambassadors."
He said the \$12,000 for Unemployment out-of-state travel is used up whereas the Department of Planning and Development has only \$5,500 with which to travel beyond Oregon seeking new jobs and new industries.
Hatfield, during the day, visited Martin Bros. Container and Timber Products Corp. at Oakland, Roseburg Lumber Co. at Dillard and U. S. Plywood Corp. in Roseburg. At noon, he was a guest of Roseburg Kiwanis Club.
Mrs. Hatfield was entertained at a series of coffee hours in the Roseburg area.
The two appeared Tuesday evening as a "meet-the-public" session at Umpqua Park.

Chamber To Curb Solicitations Of Local Businesses

Members of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce board of directors Tuesday voted to promote a program to control donation solicitations from local merchants.
Chamber Secretary - Manager Harold Reaume said pressure has been mounting to set up a solicitation control system because of the great number of demands for money donations being made by groups and organizations.
He said large numbers of solicitations are made of business firms for donations, advertising and merchandise which are "of questionable value to the firms, either from an advertising or good-will viewpoint." He said if they are not controlled, they will cost "in the aggregate many thousands of dollars each year."
Placards showing the approved and not approved lists of solicitations will be sent to all merchants so they may refer to them when solicitations are made. And cards of chamber approval will not be issued to those on the "not approved" list.
In other action, it was announced that efforts will be made by the Chamber to secure approval from the Douglas County Court to erect a sign in California urging tourists to come to the county. The county is paying for the sign. It had formerly been planned to set up the sign at the south end of the county, but Chamber directors decided the sign would come to the attention of more potential tourists if it were set up near Weed, Calif.
Plans for two meetings were made. The first is a Friday noon meeting of the Highway, Roads and Streets Committee in the Umpqua Hotel. Members will discuss the proposed Oak Avenue Bridge, Rose Street couplet and "North Umpqua Highway."
The second meeting planned will involve the chamber, County Court and City Council desiring to solidify relations among them. A date has not been set.

Driver Slightly Hurt When 2 Trucks Collide

Driver of a pickup truck, 48-year-old Earl John Hunt of Rt. 1, Roseburg, suffered a slight head cut Tuesday afternoon when the vehicle he was driving collided with an oil tanker about nine miles west of Winston on Highway 42.
According to state police, Hunt was attempting to pass the tanker, driven by Selmer David Looney, 37, of 2133 SE Ohio Ave., Roseburg, and failed to see a turn signal. When Looney swung his truck into a left hand turn it was hit by Hunt's pickup.
Damage was extensive to both vehicles, it was reported. Both were towed to a Winston garage. Looney escaped uninjured.

More than 45 minutes of searching brought no results.
Then Jimalene remembered the obvious. She looked in the child's bedroom and there he was, fast asleep just where he should have been at that late hour.

He was born in Loretta, Pa., Aug. 9, 1917, and moved to Oregon at the age of nine. Dodson was reared in the Salem area. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fredrick Dodson of Pennsylvania; one brother, J. Blayne Dodson of Denver, Colo.; five sisters, Mrs. James Patterson of St. Helens, Mrs. Harold Seik of Portland, Mrs. Harold Chapin Mrs. Frances Jones and Mrs. Robert Mathers, all of Oregon City; one aunt, Mrs. Tom Sanders of Eugene, and cousins, Mrs. Elton Zuber of Roseburg and Donald Ling of Tenille.

ICC Doesn't Say Yes To Morse On Rate Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission didn't say "yes" to a request by Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) that it hold a hearing in Oregon on proposed new lumber freight rates. But it didn't say "no" either.
The commission recently announced it would hold a hearing Aug. 18 in San Francisco on the requested cut in rates on lumber shipments from Oregon and California into California and Arizona. Morse said he thought it would be advantageous to the commission as well as to Oregonians if a supplemental session could be held in some centrally located Oregon area.
In his reply, ICC Chairman Howard Preas noted that it was not unusual for the commission to receive a number of requests for such hearings and that it would be impracticable to comply with all of them.
Preas then continued: "It is likely that other requests similar to yours will be received, and considerable will be given to all of them. Interested parties should not assume that a supplemental hearing will be granted, and should be prepared for hearing at the assigned time and place."
"Be assured, however, that every consideration consistent with the commission's practice will be given to your suggestion."

Old Plywood Mill At Myrtle Creek Declared Hazard

A report stating an old plywood mill not in use is a fire hazard to the city of Myrtle Creek was read at a City Council meeting Tuesday night.
The report was from the state fire marshal. The council voted to have the city attorney draw up a letter to the owner stating the hazard has to be corrected or legal action will be taken.
The mill, located behind business buildings on 99BR in Myrtle Creek, is owned by Umpqua Plywood Corp. The state fire marshal recommended that the council request the company to hire a full time watchman and activate the inside overhead sprinkler system.
In the report, the marshal stated the mill is an extreme fire hazard and if it caught on fire and with the right wind, fire could sweep through most of the Myrtle Creek business district.
Council action will be taken on the new ordinance Tuesday night. Euth Evans, News-Review correspondent, reports. A copy of the report is being sent to the company stockholders. The city recorder was authorized to notify the stockholders and businessmen whose establishments are next to the mill that the ordinance will be passed. In other business before the council, an application from Norman's Super Market for a bottled wine license was approved. The council authorized free parking during the Myrtle Creek Fall Festival Aug. 15 and 16.
