Officials Discuss Grid Rule Changes In Roseburg Meet

The first in a series of 13 football officials clinics was conducted Tuesday night at Roseburg High School, by the Oregon School Activities Assn. Oden Hawes, Assistant Secretary - Treasurer of the OSAA conducted the Roseburg clinic.

Rule changes which will be in effect this year was the major topic, with some 20 football officials from Roseburg and surrounding areas in attendance.

A movie and slides were shown with various situations which might arise pointed out and discussed by the grid officials.

The main change in the rules, affecting this year's play, is on dealing with an injured player. In the past, after four timeouts had been taken by a team, any additional timeout cost the team taking the timeout a delay-of-the-game penalty.

Rule Explained
This year, the time-out requested for an injured player will go as an official timeout, but the injured player must be removed from the game for at least one play before returning to action.

This rule is designed to protect the player from serious injury. Thus, the four timeouts which have been allowed a team in the past no longer will be. Hawes feels that although this situation might find excessive timeouts being called on the pretense a player is injured, the removal of the player in question might prevent a serious injury.

Although not a rule as yet, the OSAA is suggesting a doctor be on the bench during a game to immediately check any player forced out of the game due to an injury.

Other Changes Noted
Other changes in the 1958 rules deal with such things as: After a foul, the captain receiving the choice must make that choice before a timeout can be granted. Another recommendation is that the numbering system give the centers the highest numbers with those players eligible to receive passes having numbers below 60, that is, centers numbered from 80-89, guards, 70-79, tackles, 60-69, ends, 50-59, and backs, 10-49.

A small change has been made to cover the rare case where a player near the goal line is holding the ball over the out-of-bounds area.

Another slight revision has been made to show that the ball may become alive although the snap of the ball is illegal.

Now Illegal Pass
This year another rule has been revised, to make it an illegal forward pass, rather than pass interference, if an ineligible player who is legally beyond the neutral zone muffs, bats or catches a forward pass.

And this year, coaches and player may be on the field within five yards of the sideline for a conference during a charged timeout.

Most of the high schools will have an opportunity of trying out the changes in the rules for the 1958 season, as most Oregon prep clubs begin action by Friday, Sept. 12.

Roy Thompson's Roseburg Indian gridders open with Ashland on this date at Finlay Field.

The college series will run 14 Saturdays, concluding March 21, except for Dec. 27.

The schedule of games has not been drawn up, but it is believed a conflict of time difference would rule out any Pacific Coast games as they would finish too late and interfere with regular Saturday night shows.

WSC Official Voices 'Kill PCC' Scheme

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — The 43-year-old Pacific Coast Conference still has an official lease on life, for at least a few more days, but members have been taking turns posting death notices.

The latest somber prediction comes from Dr. C. Clement French, president of Washington State College. He said Tuesday that WSC believes the conference is finished and will support any recommendation to dissolve it.

That recommendation will probably come at the PCC meeting in Portland this weekend.

To Leave PCC
Washington, UCLA and USC have already set dates for leaving the conference. Stanford suggested dissolution last Friday and there were reports Oregon and Oregon State would support the move.

Idaho, which plays only Northern schools in football, kept on the sidelines with a statement from its president it was policy "not to discuss the vote of its athletic representative prior to his going to the conference meeting."

WSC's president said he hoped ways could be worked out for continuing athletic relations with the other PCC schools. But WSC plans to "move forward an intercollegiate athletics" in any event, French said.

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Top Amateurs Expected For Bend Tournament
BEND (AP) — A top field of amateur golfers will compete here in the eighth annual Oregon Golf Assn. medal play championships, opening a three-day stand Friday.

Advance entries indicate a field of about 100 players for the 54-hole event. Play is scheduled in three divisions, the championship or open class, the junior-senior bracket for players 45 to 54 years, and the senior class for those 55 and over.

Dick Stearns of Portland is the defending champion. Another top entry will be Keith Gubrium of Eugene, University of Oregon student who was the runner-up in this year's Coast golf tournament at Astoria.

The Phoenix Giants moved into a full game lead in the Pacific Coast League Tuesday night, beating Sacramento while second-place Vancouver and third-place San Diego both were losing, the latter a twin bill.

The Giants pounded out 13 hits, including three by Bob Prescott, in downing the Solons 9-6. Vancouver's Mounties took it on the chin 6-5 from Spokane and San Diego absorbed 3-2 and 5-4 defeats at the hands of Portland.

In the other league game, the Salt Lake City Bees whitewashed the Seattle Rainiers 3-0 on Eddie O'Brien's six-hitter.

Prescott drove in six runs with a three-run homer in the fourth, a one-run single in the seventh and a two-run double in the eighth. Carlos Paula drove in three runs for the Solons in the seventh with a home run.

Zanni Is Winner
Dom Zanni, who worked seven innings for the Giants, was the winner, Floyd Ross, the third of four Sacramento hurlers, was the loser.

The Mounties and Indians both had five-run frames, the Indians in the third on six hits, a walk and an error and the Mounties in the fifth.

Dick Scott, called in to put the stopper on the Mounties in the fifth, choked off the rally and then blanked them on two hits the rest of the way to win his third game against one loss. The winning run came in the fifth on Jim Gentile's double and Glen Gorbous' single.

Bevos Slurp
Portland whipped the Padres in the opening game with a three-run fourth inning. The first run scored on Dave Melton's double and Bob DiPietro's single. George Freese then chased in DiPietro with a two-run homer. The Pads got singletons in the third and seventh innings of the abbreviated game.

In the nightcap, a perfectly-executed squeeze bunt by DiPietro in the last of the ninth let Bob Turley charge home from third with the winning run. Melton got a solo homer in the first inning.

O'Brien, who first won athletic prominence as a basketball player at Seattle University, let 13 men reach base on him but the Rainiers couldn't get anyone to make the complete circuit.

The Bees got a solo homer out of Pete Naton, in the fourth, and Carlos Bernier, in the seventh. The other Salt Lake City run scored in the sixth on a single by Ken Toothman and Jim McDaniel's triple.

Armstrong Seeks More Than Ranking
NEW YORK (AP) — It's nice to be ranked among the world's 19 leading middleweight contenders but a ranking by itself doesn't put too much meat on the table.

That's the way Gene (Ace) Armstrong sizes up his position today. He's holding on to his job as a pecker with Linden, N.J., liquor concern.

"I'm too young to retire and getting too old for this kind of work," said Gene. "But I've got a wife and two kids and fighting isn't bringing in enough money to keep us going."

Armstrong is a lean, 26-year-old 160-pounder who has won 14 of his fights in three years of fighting for cash.

Now ranked ninth by the NBA, he gets his big break Friday night when he faces rugged Rory Calhoun of New York in the television headliner at Madison Square Garden. That should earn him about \$5,000, including the \$4,000 TV fee. His biggest purse to date has been about \$1,500.

A victory over Calhoun, ranked sixth by the NBA and eighth by Ring, could move Armstrong up the ranking ladder and put him in line for some lucrative fights.

Jockey Injured When Mount Rolls In Portland

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All it took was a little dose of Lew Burdette magic to cool off the Pittsburgh Pirates as National League pennant contenders.

Although the Milwaukee right-hander allowed 10 hits, he maintained his old spell over the Pirates in a 6-1 victory last night that restored the Braves' five-game lead over San Francisco.

The Giants lost to the Cubs 10-9 in the 10th as Ernie Banks' single chased home an unearned run at the expense of Johnny Antonelli.

Cincinnati rallied for three runs in the last of the ninth to top Philadelphia 6-5. Frank Robinson knocked in the tying and winning runs with a two-run double off Dick Farrell. Jack Sanford gave way to Farrell in the ninth with two outs and the Phils leading 5-3.

St. Louis broke out of its batting slump with 21 hits in a 13-3 romp over Los Angeles.

Turley Wins 17th
Bob Turley, the majors' top winner, capped No. 17 for the New York Yankees, a 4-1 verdict over Baltimore. The Red Sox beat Washington 7-1. Cleveland downed Detroit 6-1.

Burdette shut out Pittsburgh for seven innings on the way to his 11th victory. Successive singles by Dick Groat, Hank Foiles and pinch hitter Ted Khushewski finally produced the run in the eighth. All Milwaukee scores were charged against Ron Kline, who gave up all five Brave hits for his 10th defeat.

Banks had four hits, including his 31st homer, high in both leagues. Rookie Morris Thacker also homered for the Cubs and Leon Wagner and Orlando Cepeda for the Giants.

Willie Mays, who had three hits for a .341 average, singled during the five-run seventh inning before Cepeda's 21st homer. The Giants tied it in the ninth on a wild pitch by winner Glen Hobbie only to lose on an error by Danny O'Connell, a walk and Banks' single.

When Sanford left the game in Cincinnati, the Phils had two on with none out. Farrell retired the first two men he faced but Groat slammed a single off his glove for one run and Robinson hit a 1-2 pitch into center field. Joe Nixhall was the winner on relief.

Muffett Muzzles LA
Billy Muffett went all the way in the steaming heat of an August afternoon in St. Louis, holding the Dodgers to seven hits. Danny McDevitt was chased with his fourth defeat.

You have to hand it to the fellow Bob Turley. When he starts something he finishes it. The New York Yankee ace, top winner in the majors with his 17-4 record, has completed 16 of 22 starts.

If Baltimore never sees Turley again it will be much too soon. The Orioles have scored only one run against their former teammate in 36 innings.

Turley's latest effort was a seven-hitter against the Orioles last night.

Mickey Mantle slammed his 30th home run off loser Connie Johnson with two men on in the third. The blow tied him with Boston's Jackie Jensen for the American League home lead.

The feeble Orioles suffered their ninth straight defeat, tying the Detroit Tigers for the longest losing streak of the year. The Tigers, now improved, had a six-game winning string snapped by Cleveland when Cal McLish pitched the Indians into fourth place. He scattered seven hits to make his record 11-6.

Billy Monbouquette, a 21-year-old rookie from Medford, Mass., beat Washington for his first major league victory for Boston. Ted Williams playfully eluded a fan in the outfield until the police caught up with the intruder in the seventh. Jimmy Piersall's three-run homer was the big blow off loser Camilo Pascual.

Chicago jumped on loser Bob Grim for five runs in the third inning and hung on for a victory over Kansas City with some neat relief work by Turk Lown.

25-Win Year Looms
With 49 games to play in almost eight weeks, Turley appears to have a good shot at a 25-win season for the Yanks. His best record was 17-13, in 1955. A walk, Gene Woodling's single and an infield out produced the Oriole run in the first.

Cleveland scored all its runs off George Susse in the first three innings. Two came on Mickey Vernon's homer. Charlie Maxwell led off the Detroit fifth with a homer for the lone run off McLish.

Monbouquette, brought up from the Minneapolis farm about four weeks ago, finally got some solid hitting and steady defense from the Red Sox. Among the batting beats was an acrobatic double by Don Buddin, who eluded a tag at second and then performed a swan dive from the shortstop side of the bag.
