Maverick Is 1st Gold Cup Race Qualifier

SEATTLE (AP) — Bill Stead of Reno, Nev., whipped the monstrous mahogany Maverick up to 119.956 miles an hour Tuesday and opened Seattle's annual week of speedboat madness by becoming first to qualify for Sunday's 51st running of the Gold Cup race.

Miss Pay 'n Save, one of nine Seattle entries, became the second qualifier, barely beating the minimum with a 95.632 miles an hour average.

Although there was little to see and long gaps of dull time between the appearances of the big unlimited hydroplane, thousands of persons elbowed one another for vantage points on the sunny shoreline of Lake Washington.

The official parking lot, which holds 1,200 cars, was crammed to capacity.

Copter Patrols
As the boats came out for trial runs or qualifying attempts, a yellow Coast Guard helicopter lifted from its perch on a barge near the piers to patrol the route. Coast Guard cutters and small craft lined the three mile course, ready to rush to the aid of troubled drivers.

And several were troubled. Hawaii Kai III reeled off one lap at 119 miles an hour and caught fire in the second lap. Driver Jack Regas and nearby coast-guardmen doused the blaze. Thriftway Too had engine trouble after a 101 mph lap and had to be towed ashore.

Miss Spokane romped one lap at 108 and retired with mechanical trouble.

95 Minimum Speed
Nineteen boats had entered the race out everyone must qualify by clicking off three laps at an average speed of 95 miles an hour or better. Few will be content to settle at 95, the drivers shooting for the Cooper trophy which goes to the speediest qualifier each year.

Stead cracked his own qualifying record set last year at 117 mph, giving the other drivers a tough target. Wildroot Charlie, the Buffalo, N.Y., pulled one lap at 97 and pulled off the course.

Miss Bardahl of Seattle got in a lap at 100 before heading for the pit for tuning.

All of this year's entries are capable of making the basic 95 miles an hour. If all get in, the first two heats of the Sunday race will have to be split into three sections each. Race rules limit each running to seven boats.

The best seven will qualify for the final 30 mile heat of the 90 mile race.

Kids' Baseball Event Slated For Thursday

Baseball fans will see some 140 kids in action at Legion Field Thursday night, as the Peeewe and Little League Jamboree is conducted.

Baseball youngsters from eight years of age to 16 will play 28 innings of ball. The big night of baseball will include all the youngsters playing ball in the Roseburg summer-time program.

The eight and nine year old players will play in two two-inning games and the 10 and 11 year old players will be seen in action in two three-inning games.

The tilts will be longer contests for the 12-13 year olds and the 16 year old and under players. The former group will take the field in two four-inning frays, while the latter section will play two five-inning games.

The Peeewe and Little League finale will begin at 6:30 p.m., with the night of baseball ending when all the games have been played.

Coleman Takes Over As Top Steeplechaser

BUDAPEST (AP) — Horace Ashenfelter first taught Americans all steeplechasers aren't horses. Phil Coleman has taken it from there.

Coleman is a 27-year-old teacher from Champaign, Ill., who won the 3,000-meter steeplechase Tuesday against a group of very good Hungarians and Czechoslovakians in a track and field meet which ends Wednesday night. Americans won 11 of the 15 events Tuesday but no official point scores were kept, as at Moscow and Warsaw.

Coleman's victory was the most significant for an American distance runner since Ashenfelter looked over his shoulder during the 1952 Olympic steeplechase at Helsinki, saw a Russian closing in and then beat the Soviet runner, in the Russians' favorite event.

Coleman's triumph along with the fine distance running by Bill Dellinger, former University of Oregon athlete now in the U. S. armed services at Neah Bay, Wash., should do much toward making their events more popular at home.

Coleman's time over the water jump and heavy hurdles Tuesday was 8:43.4.

Dellinger, 24, is ordinarily a 5,000-meter runner.

He didn't know until Tuesday he could run the 1500 meters (the metric mile) so well. But after running 5,000 meters in 14:28.4 and 14:04.8 at Moscow and Warsaw, he decided to try the 1500. He was highly successful and set an American record of 3:41.5—roughly equivalent to a sub-four-minute mile of 3:59.5.

"Dellinger will be giving more attention to mile races from now on," said Coach George Eastman.

Dellinger's race, however, was not good enough for victory as Istvan Rozsavoelgyi of Hungary improved on his own accepted world record for 1500 meters with a 3:40.3 clocking.

Top American victories also were turned in by Glenn Davis of Columbus, Ohio, in the 400 meters with a 45.6 clocking and Earlene Brown, Los Angeles housewife. Mrs. Brown won the discus throw with a toss of 156 feet, 7.89 in.

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Hungarian Star, Dellinger Set Marks In Run

BUDAPEST (AP) — Istvan Rozsavoelgyi of Hungary broke his own listed world record for the 1,500 meter run in the U.S.-Hungary dual track meet Tuesday with a time of 3:40.3. The time was three tenths of a second under the accepted record he made in 1956 but slower than the still unapproved mark of 3:38.1 made by Stanislav Jungwirth of Czechoslovakia last year.

In the same race Tuesday Bill Dellinger of Neah Bay, Wash., former University of Oregon runner and 1956 U. S. Olympic Team member, broke the American 1,500 meter record with a time of 3:41.5. He bettered the mark of 3:42.8 held by Wes Santee.

Housewife, Pilot Are Bowling Classic Winners

OGDEN, Utah (AP)—A housewife from Omaha, Neb., and an Air Force pilot from Portland, Ore., were big winners in the fourth annual world endurance bowling classic which ended here Tuesday.

Nearly 1,200 bowlers from 38 states and Canada competed in the 38-day tourney.

Mrs. Pauline Bickel of Omaha won both the scratch (no handicap) and handicap division for women by averaging 197 for 20 consecutive games. Mrs. Bickel, a 181 average bowler, had a high game of 243 and a low of 167.

Al Kellogg, a 185-average keger from Portland, averaged nearly 205 for 40 games in one night to win the men's handicap division—worth \$2,000. Kellogg started with a 256 game and finished with 9,110 with handicap.

The handicap was based on an average of 220 for men and 200 for women.

Yakima tightened its grip on first place Tuesday night as the Northwest League baseball season neared the midway point of its second half.

The Bears bounced Salem, 7-4, to move a game and a half in front of Lewiston. The Broncos lost to fifth place Eugene, 6-4, and Tri-City sneaked by Wenatchee, 3-2.

Outpitching Yakima 10-8 wasn't enough to win the game for Salem. The Senators committed four costly errors and hurler LeRoy Johnson gave up seven equally expensive walks.

Ted Kambour notched the win, his 12th against four defeats. Eugene hunched its scoring in the middle innings to dump the Broncos at Lewiston. A tie-breaking three-run homer by Dan Holden boosted the Emeralds into a 5-2 lead in the fifth frame. Holden singled in the seventh to bring in Eugene's final tally.

Lewiston scored single runs in the first two innings and closed out its scoring with two more in the seventh on Roger Herrscher's home run.

The win went to Bob Wales, who throttled the Broncos with six scattered hits.

Another homer broke up a tied Braves-Chiefs contest at Wenatchee. Harry Williams of Tri-City lofted one out of the park to crack a 2-2 deadlock in the eighth frame.

The Chiefs had taken a 2-1 lead in the bottom of the first. Tri-City tied it in the second and the two clubs battled scoreless until Williams' four-bagger.

Winning pitcher was Jack Kelly, who struck out 10 and walked four to chalk his fifth win against one loss.

A full round of action is on tap again Wednesday night with Tri-City at Wenatchee, Salem at Yakima and Eugene at Lewiston.

Phoenix Players Battle On Plane

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (AP) — Two baseball players for the Phoenix Giants of the Pacific Coast League were reported Tuesday to have engaged in such a violent fist fight aboard a Western Air Lines plane that they were taken off at San Francisco International Airport.

The report of officer Leo Bunner of the airport police identified them as Dusty Rhodes, 31, veteran outfielder and former major league star, and Joseph Margoneri, southpaw pitcher.

The incident occurred as the team was flying from Portland to Los Angeles, Monday, en route home to Phoenix.

Officer Bunner reported the plane commander, Capt. Joseph Seday, radioed ahead to ask airport police to meet his ship. Seday declined to press charges and the two players were put on a plane of another air line. Bunner said they appeared friendly as they left.

Neither player was in the lineup at Phoenix Monday night as Sacramento defeated the Giants 4-2.

Rhodes leads the Phoenix club with runs batted in.

Injured Player Replaced On State All-Star Squad

PORTLAND (AP) — The State squad gained a man on the Metro-politans Tuesday with addition of a lineman for the Shrine Hospital all-star football game.

That was because the Metro team lost a halfback with an ankle fracture, and State put tackle Andy Erickson of Springfield on its roster.

This addition by State was permitted to fill the vacancy left when Salem quarterback Keith Burres was ruled out in the physical examination held before the start of drills. Coach Leo Gustafson said he picked the lineman because he needed added strength in the forward wall, and had good quarterback replacements already at hand.

Metro, though, will not be able to replace Paul Goddard of Lincoln High, who suffered an ankle fracture in Tuesday morning's drill. Vacancies occurring after opening of practice are not filled.

Loss of Goddard takes from the Metro squad one of Oregon's flashiest halfbacks, whose speed had been expected to be an important factor in the Aug. 16 game.
