Rep. Porter Takes Jet Plane Ride

WASHINGTON (AP)—Members of Congress frequently are subject to pressure, but Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) is telling his colleagues of a new type—that of pulling out of a faster-than-sound dive in a jet plane.

Porter, who recently was promoted to the rank of major in the Air Force Reserve, took his first jet flight at the Patuxent (Md.) Naval Air Station in an F9F-8 Cougar.

On the flight he and his pilot, Lt. Cmdr. G. R. Monahan of the Naval Test Center, broke the sound barrier in a dive from 40,000 feet to 15,000 feet.

"I had no particular feeling when we passed Mach 1 (the sound barrier)," he said later, "but, boy, when we started to pull out!"

Porter said he asked to go on the flight in an effort to keep up with advances in aviation.

"This is a jet age and I felt I should know something about it," he said.

British Consul Receives Roses To Honor Victory

KANSAS CITY (AP)—For seven straight years, the British consul in Kansas City has received on Aug. 1 seven red roses in honor of an English victory in the Seven Years War.

The donor is anonymous. Consul A. J. Evans, who told of the mystery this week, said he and his staff know only that the donor is a man who lives in this area.

Identical cards were attached to each of the bouquets. They carried the notation "Minden Day, Aug. 1, 1759" and listed the British regiments which defeated a French army at Minden, Germany on that date.

The battle at Minden was part of the war of 1756-1763 in which England and Austria fought Austria, France, Russia, Sweden and Saxony.

EDMONTON, Alta. (AP)—A California family of three missing for a week in northwestern Canada have been spotted by a Royal Canadian Air Force search aircraft in the southern Yukon.

Missing Berry Picker Found Dead On Mountain

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)—Joseph Engeln, 68, a Rockford, Wash., berry picker reported missing overnight, was found dead Tuesday in the Monmouth Mountain area about 17 miles northeast of here.

Cause of death was not determined immediately. Engeln and a companion separated Monday to look for wild blue berries in the area and sheriff's officers started a search for him when he failed to return.

Rep. Tollefson Wants Action On Fish Legislation

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Thor Tollefson (R-Wash.) wants to see Congress act on four pieces of merchant marine and fishing legislation before it winds up for the year.

Tollefson, ranking Republican on the House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, hopes to obtain agreement from Chairman Herbert C. Bonner (D-NC) to hold hearings on the proposals in the next few days.

The chief ones would authorize payment of construction differentialials on fishing vessels and would increase the fisheries loan fund used by fishermen to finance construction repair or equipping their vessels.

The construction differential would offset the added cost fishermen must pay for new vessels as the result of requirements that fishing craft must be built in U.S. yards. The added cost, roughly one-third more than comparable vessels built in foreign yards, has added to the competitive problem of New England fishermen and West Coast tuna operators.

Tollefson said he hopes the House also will act on a Senate-passed bill which would authorize payment of \$10 a ton for unlicensed dogfish skins or 10 cents a pound for dogfish shark livers as a means of ridding Northwest salmon waters of the predator.

Rate Increase Approved For Gas In E. Oregon

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—A rate increase for Cascade Natural Gas Co. customers in Eastern Oregon was approved by Oregon Public Utility Commissioner Howard Morgan Tuesday.

The increase will total \$35,000 annually to 1,135 residential and commercial natural gas users in Pendleton, Baker, Athena and Weston.

Morgan rejected another company proposal which would automatically have passed on without notice to customers any increase in costs imposed by Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp., the supplier of natural gas to the company.

He also turned down a plan which would have eliminated any pro-ratings of bills to customers. The PUC commissioner said previous rates, which were filed in 1936, were unrealistically low from the very start.

Morgan said the new rate schedule will increase Cascade's operating revenues and will provide a rate of return of about 2.91 per cent.

Air Base To Be Renamed For Lt. Gen. Chennault

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force announced Tuesday the late Charles A. Force Base in Louisiana will be renamed in memory of the late Lt. Gen. Claire L. Chennault, effective Nov. 1. It is a medium bombardment training station.
