Carlton Willey, Milwaukee's smooth-working rookie pitcher, is making a strong bid to succeed teammate Joey Jay as the National League's "player of the month."
The 27-year-old right-hander, who was farmed out to Wichita at cut-down time now has won six, the last four in succession. As a result, the Braves boast a six-game lead, their biggest bulge of the season.
Willey threw a three-hitter at Pittsburgh last night for a 2-1 victory. While he was dropping the third-place Pirates eight games off the pace, the San Francisco Giants were dropping an 8-7 decision in St. Louis. The Giants blew a 5-0 lead and just missed in the ninth when Jim Brosnan choked off a rally.
Roberts Wins
Robin Roberts allowed three home runs but still managed an

8-5 victory over Cincinnati, while Los Angeles took a 5-2 triumph at Chicago.
Stan Williams was the winner over Johnny Briggs, although he needed help from Clem Labine in the sixth.
In the American League, the New York Yankees continued to roll along, knocking off Baltimore 3-1. Boston turned back Washington, 8-2. Chicago's Billy Pierce won his 11th with a six-hitter against Kansas City 4-2. The Cleveland-Detroit game was postponed because of rain.
Stan Musial climbed into a tie with Edie Ashburn of Philadelphia for the National batting lead at .343, driving in three runs for the Cards.
Chick Stobbs, third St. Louis pitcher, tamed the Giants after Bob Maize and Bill Wright failed. Stobbs won his first as a National Leaguer on five scoreless innings before he had to leave the game because of a blister. Don Johnson was the loser.

Homer Race Tops
With the New York Yankees leading by 16 games the best race in the American League is for the home run title.
Jackie Jensen of Boston, Mickey Mantle of New York, Roy Sievers of Washington and Bob Cerv of Kansas City are engaged in a four-way fight that could go right down to the wire.
Jensen slammed No. 31 yesterday during Boston's romp over Washington in which Pete Runnels of the Red Sox also assumed the batting lead. Runnels took over from Chicago's Billy Goodman with three hits for a .333 average.
Sievers burst into a second-place tie with Mantle by hitting two off Tom Brewer at Boston to make it 30 for the year. The senator slinger won both the homer and runs - batted - in titles last season.
Mantle had only one hit, a single, in the Yankees' victory over Baltimore. Art Dittmar extended the Orioles' losing streak to 10,

longest in the majors this season, with a five-hitter, handing Jack Harshbarger another hard luck defeat.
Mantle Tumbled
Mantle was chased by Plate Umpire John Flaherty for protesting a third strike in the eighth.
Pierce had Kansas City eating out of his hand most of the night. Cerv, however, hit his 29th homer with a man on base in the first inning. Goodman had only one hit - a triple - and dropped a point to .332.
A thunderstorm at Detroit washed out the Detroit-Cleveland game with the Indians leading 1-0 in the third inning.
Brewer turned in a brilliant job for the Red Sox with a three-hitter. He didn't allow a hit until Sievers homered with two out in the sixth. Sievers hit his second of the day leading off the ninth.
Jensen, Frank Malone and Ted Lepcio were Boston's home run hitters and Ted Williams tried to drive in his 1,700th run. His total bases now stand at 4,501.
Pierce helped himself with a fifth-inning single and rode home on the first of Luis Aparicio's two triples, breaking a 2-2 tie.

Portland, Klamath, Idaho Teams Win In Babe Ruth Event

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (AP)—Thumping big margins marked opening games in the Northwest Regional Babe Ruth Baseball Tournament here Wednesday night as Portland, Klamath, Id., and Klamath Falls turned in victories.
The first round started with Portland measuring Vancouver, B. C. 9-2. Then Kellogg beat Cheyenne 14-2. Finally the host team clobbered Kalispell, Mont., 26-2.
Twelve runs scored by Klamath Falls in the first inning matched the number of errors made by Kalispell in the game.
Winner of the double elimination tourney, which ends Sunday, will go to Vancouver, B. C. Aug. 18-24 to represent the district at the Babe Ruth World Series.
Portland's Steve Jones wielded the big bat for the Oregonians. He tripped home one run in the second and punched out a bases-loaded homer in the fourth.

The Salt Lake City Bees and the Seattle Rainiers seem to be settling themselves up as the class of the Pacific Coast League, swat and clobber division.
Monday night the two clubs staged a wild, 10-minute, knuckle-busting riot for the fans at Salt Lake City — no extra cost — and Wednesday night they took turns bombing each other legally in a game that bore only faint similarity to the game Abner Doubleday invented.
The final score was 18-13 in Salt Lake City's favor.
In other games, Sacramento's Solons drubbed the league-leading Phoenix Giants 9-4 and the Portland Beavers split a twin bill with San Diego, winning 6-2 and then losing 5-3. Vancouver and Spokane were rained out.
The Bees were trailing 8-1 going into the last of the fifth inning when they suddenly came to life. They got five runs in that frame and five more in the sixth and seventh and the seventh and two in the eighth.
Bob Rosell proved to be the downfall of the Giants. The husky Sacramento backstop drove in four runs with two homers and a single as his mates tagged Phoenix pitching for 12 hits.
The Giants got their first run in the first inning on Andre Rodgers' 28th homer of the year and then splurged for their final three in the eighth on two singles, an error and Rodgers' 400-foot triple.
The Beavers forged in their winning, four-run lead in the opening against San Diego in the sixth frame. The key blow in the inning was Ed Winceniak's three-run triple. Frank Kellert solo homered for the Beavers in the fourth inning.
Kellert and George Freese both homered for Portland in the second game with the bases empty but the Padres got 11 hits to Portland's six to win it for Gene Lary. With the score tied 2-2 going into the fifth, the Padres took a lead they never relinquished by getting two runs on a single, Larry Raines' triple and Dave Pope's double.

Hydro Antics Create Stir At Cup Races

SEATTLE (AP) — One high speed, water tosing spout and a bucking bronco show by the aptly named "Maverick" caused more excitement than a trio of successful qualifying efforts Wednesday on the Gold Cup speedboat course.
Four boats qualified for Sunday's 51st running of the unlimited hydroplane classic, raising the list to six and leaving 13 still to qualify. Each entrant must run three laps on the 3-mile course at 95 miles per hour or better to earn a berth in the race.
Jack Regas made the grade in Hawaii Kai III of Seattle, roaring around at an average 113.445 miles per hour. Fred Alter of Detroit hit an average 107.427 to land a spot for Miss United States 1. Bob Schroeder qualified Wildroot Charlie, a Buffalo, N.Y., entry, at 96.428, and Bill Muncy brought the Miss Thriftway in at 106.144.
Previous qualifiers were the Maverick, of Lake Mead, at a record 119.9 mph, and the Seattle-based Pay 'N' Save at 95.6.
The thrill of the day for the thousands watching from the shore of Lake Washington came just before the course was closed to qualifying at 5 p.m. (PST).
The Thriftway Too, which somewhat resembles a monster turtle, completed one qualifying lap at 109 mph. Driver Bruen Wyle was pushing the 1700-horsepower giant up the backstretch when it lost its rudder and spun in a geyser of flying spray.
Wyle was unhurt and the four-ton boat, except for needing a new rudder, was not seriously damaged.
Out for a practice run in Maverick, driver Bill Stead was logging about 175 miles per hour when a crosswind hit the boat. For 100 yards it bucked and twisted, jumping five feet above the water. Stead got it back under control without damage.

DUBLIN, Ireland — Australian Herb Elliott, with a fabulous record mile time of 3:54.5 as his authority, sat back today and told the world:
"I think a 3:50 mile could come within a couple of years."
The 20-year-old Aussie quickly added, "Of course we shall need track conditions like the ones we had last night in Dublin — conditions as near to perfect as any runner could want."
It was at Dublin's Santry Stadium that Elliott ran his eighth sub 4-minute mile — with the most fantastic timing ever.
"Elliott's time of 3:54.5 is one that will stand as a mile record for years and years," said British sports experts. "He clipped three and a half seconds off John Landy's official world mark."

Elliott Readies For Assault On Two-Mile Mark

DUBLIN, Ireland — Herb Elliott, fit and fresh after his incredible 3:54.5 mile Wednesday night, trained on the Irish sands Thursday for another world record attempt Thursday night — this time at two miles. The record is 8:33.4.
The rugged, 20-year-old Australian jogged along by the sea and talked freely with newsmen.
"I feel no ill effects from last night's race," he said. "I'm confident the two mile record can be broken Thursday night. The man I fear most is New Zealand's Murray Halberg."
Halberg finished fourth in 3:57.5 in the mile Wednesday night when the first four runners broke John Landy's listed world record of 3:58 and the fifth man bettered four minutes.
Originally the six-foot Australian was scheduled to face Olympic mile champion Don DeLaney of Ireland in the half mile Wednesday night but he decided to concentrate on the two mile mark. DeLaney was third in 3:57.5 Wednesday night.
Hungary's Sandor Iharos set the listed mark of 8:33.4 for two miles at London, May 30, 1955.
Elliott has not run two miles since he covered the distance in 9:01 as an 18-year-old in Melbourne.

record-breaking mile smashed 4 minutes — the first time in history that such a thing had happened.
Three did it in 1955 in London when Laslo Tabori of Hungary was timed in 3:59. Four were under 4 minutes in 1957 when England's Derek Ibbotson hit 3:57.2 — a controversial clocking as the race was placed.

(1) Elliott, 3:54.5. (2) Merv Lincoln, Australia, 3:55.9. (3) Ron Delaney, Ireland and Villanova, Philadelphia, 3:57.5. (4) Murray Halbert, New Zealand, 3:57.5.

The official world mark is 3:58 set by Australia's John Landy at Tarku, Finland, June 21, 1954.
Ibbotson's 3:57.2 at London's White City Stadium July 19, 1957, has not been ratified because of a pacing controversy.
Elliott has all the power and energy of a great miler.
Has Strange Diet
He got them through an unusual diet and method of training. His training diet consists of oats, nuts, raisins, dried fruits and dried bananas. Through the winter his training schedule calls for runs and climbs on the rugged hills around Portsea, some 60 miles south of Melbourne. He never has lost a mile race since starting his long competition in December 1956.
Lap times for Elliott's famous run were 58 seconds, 1:58, 2:59 and 3:54.5 — ideal timing for any world record run. The last quarter was run in the remarkable time of 55.5 seconds.

Commission Says Angling Good In Some Ore. Spots

Good fishing is likely this weekend in waters in all parts of Oregon — for those anglers who pick the right spots.
That is the outlook from the weekly report prepared by the Oregon State Game Commission. Its report, by districts:
Northwest
North coast streams are low and clear. Upriver trout angling has been poor to fair with larger streams best. Nestucca and Trask have been fair in the upper reaches. Tidewater angling for searun cutthroats is good. Bottom fishing offshore on jetties and in bays is good to excellent for bass, sea perch, flounder and a few lingcod. Yaquina Bay salmon fishing has been slow over the bar. McKenzie River and tributaries are fair. Lookout Point Reservoir is fair at the east end.
Southwest
Summer steelhead angling in the North Umpqua is fair to good but trout angling is only fair. It is poor to fair in Lemolo Reservoir. Winchester Bay salmon angling is very good with many limit catches. Coos Bay salmon fishing is fair to good. Striped bass angling in forks of the Coos River is good.
Central
The Deschutes River has been fair for trout in the Maupin area and some steelhead are being taken there. Steelhead fishing at the mouth of the Deschutes however has been slow. East fork of Hood River has been very good for trout. East and Paulina lakes have been good and Crane Prairie Reservoir has been yielding rainbows 12 to 15 inches and eastern brook up to 20 inches. Blue Lake has been good for fly fishing in early mornings and in evenings. The Deschutes above Bend has been especially good for fly fishing in the evenings. Most lakes have been good.
Northeast
Steelhead angling on the Columbia River below McNary Dam has been fair to good. Angling for liberated rainbow has been excellent on the upper south fork of the Walla Walla River between the power plant and Elbow Canyon. The upper Umatilla River between Bobbed Creek and the forks also has been good to excellent for liberated rainbow. McKay Reservoir has been slow. This weekend should produce good catches of liberated rainbow in upper Catherine Creek. The Grande Ronde has been giving up rainbow of 18 inches to drift fishermen using grasshoppers. The Wallawa River between Joseph and Enterprise is fair to good and the Lostine has been only fair for rainbow. The high Wallawa lakes have been good. Upper Eagle Creek and Pine Creek should be good for rainbows. Lookingglass, Eagle and Bear lakes have been producing cutthroats up to 14 inches. Angling in ponds adjacent to the upper Powder River above Sumpter should be fair. Angling has been slow here. Higgins and Murray reservoirs.
Southeast
Lake Owyhee is good for crappies and bass and Malheur Reservoir for bank fishing for small trout. Beulah Reservoir is poor. North fork of the Malheur and Little Malheur rivers are fair to good. Snake River is poor for bass and channel catfish in Harney County. Fish Lake has been fair for small trout. Blitzen River is fair in higher elevations and DeWint Lake is fair. Warm Springs Reservoir is good for small bass and poor for rainbow. Most streams are too warm. In Lake County, Blue Lake is good as is Ana Reservoir. Deadhorse and Campbell lakes and Dairy Creek and the Chewaucan are fair. Dog Lake is good for warm water fish.

Versatile Davis Sets Record In 440 Hurdles

BUDAPEST — Glenn Davis is a rare athlete who is good in practically all track and field events, great in three or four and supreme in one or two.
The Ohio State star can run the 400-meter hurdles in world record time of 49.2 seconds as he did yesterday and then go across the field and pole vault 13 feet.
Davis' world mark yesterday raised to five the number of international standards set by American, Soviet, Polish and Hungarian athletes in two weeks.
The other records are: decathlon — Rafer Johnson, Kingsburg, Calif., 8,392 points; 1,500 meters — Istvan Rozsavolgyi, Hungary, 3:40.3; 3,000-meter steeplechase — Jerry Chromik, Poland, 8:32; and hop, step and jump — Oleg Ryakovski, Soviet Union, 54 feet 5 1/2 inches.
In addition, eight American records and 14 Soviet, Polish and Hungarian national marks were bettered. The Americans get another chance to continue the record-breaking orgy at Athens Saturday and Sunday. They wound up their day competition against the Hungarians and Czechoslovaks by boosting their total victories to 23 in 30 events.
Johnson bettered the former world mark after only nine of the decathlon's 10 events. Davis didn't take the usual tenth of a second off the old mark. He took three tenths. The previous hurdle record of 49.5 was his own set two years ago in Los Angeles.
