

## Bird Hunting Dates Set By Government

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hunting dates selected by the state for 1958-59 shooting of doves, rails, gallinules, woodcock and hand-billed pigeons were announced Thursday.

The open seasons by states, the bag and possession limits, and the exceptions to the usual shooting hours of one-half hour before sunrise to sunset include:

**Mourning doves**— Washington Sept. 1-30; Idaho Sept. 1-15; Oregon, in Hood River, Jefferson, Sherman, Wasco, and all counties west of the Cascade summit except Jackson County, Sept. 1-28, and in Jackson County and all other counties east of the Cascade summit except those listed, Sept. 1-14.

**Bag Limit** — Generally the daily bag limit remains at 10 with the possession limit increased to 20 after the first day of the season.

**Band-tailed pigeons** — Oregon Sept. 1-28 and Washington Sept. 1-30.

**Daily bag and possession limit** is 6, except in Oregon where the seasonal limit is 30.

## Fish And Wildlife Service Criticized During Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — A hearing on a bill to pay bounties on dogfish shark to reduce their threat to salmon and other food fish ended Wednesday with the suggestion that the Fish and Wildlife Service has too many office workers and not enough field men.

The suggestion was made by Milo Moore, director of the Washington State Department of Fisheries, before the House Fisheries Committee.

The bill would authorize payment of \$10 a ton for univerted dogfish sharks or 10 cents a pound for their livers.

**No Stand Taken**  
Ralph C. Baker, chief of the service's commercial fisheries resource management branch, told the committee the Department of the Interior had taken no position on the bill although it had opposed an earlier proposal which would have provided bounties also on sea lion and hair seals.

He said he didn't believe the bounty program would be too successful.

Moore challenged Baker as being "in no way capable of explaining the problem" and said he agreed with hardly any of the

testimony given by the bureau witness.

Studies conducted by the Washington department, Moore said, indicate dogfish will eat anything that is handy when it wants to eat.

**Might Be Controlled**  
He agreed the dogfish probably couldn't be eradicated but said it could be controlled under a bounty system.

The small sharks are so numerous, he said, it isn't unusual for a vessel to haul in some 30,000 pounds of them on a single half-hour setting in Puget Sound. Moore's criticism of the Fish and Wildlife Service drew a protest from Rep. George P. Miller (R-Calif.). Miller said he felt it was "not in good taste for you to come and leave an innuendo" against the service.

Baker's testimony also drew critical comments from Reps. Thor Tollefson and Tom Pelly, Washington Republicans.

No date was set for a further hearing.

### Gifford Arrives At Giant Camp

SALEM (AP) — Ex-Hollywoodite Frank Gifford arrived here Wednesday and went through a light workout with the New York Giants.

Gifford, the Giants leading rusher last year, just completed a movie role. The fleet halfback weighed in 10 pounds under his best playing weight of 205.

Holding their eighth full-squad drill, the Giants played an intra-team game with the offensive team on the long end of a 7-6 score.

Rookie Herb Drummond scored the offensive squad's touchdown on a five-yard run and Don Chandler added the extra point.

Jim Patton scored for the defensive team when he intercepted a pass and ran 60 yards for the touchdown.

### Near Capacity Crowd Expected For Card Tilt

PORTLAND (AP) — The exhibition baseball game between the St. Louis Cardinals and the Portland Beavers here Aug. 11 promised Wednesday to draw a near capacity crowd. Reserved seat tickets were reported nearly all sold.

In addition to the game, the evening will be occasion for selection of Queen of Portland Baseball by Stan Musial and his Cardinal teammates.

The field of contenders will be cut to 10 Sunday in a between-games selection by the Portland players. The queen contest is another in the series of attendance promotions aimed at bolstering the slim crowds at Beaver games this season.

BEND (AP) — There is a surplus in the fund raised here to send Larry Lermo, 20, to the national AAU swimming championships at Indianapolis.

### Conferees Agree Upon Compromise Trade Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate-House conferees agreed Wednesday on a four-year compromise reciprocal trade bill giving President Eisenhower most of what he asked.

The agreement, however, retained the House provision for a congressional review of the President's authority to override Tariff Commission findings of inquiry to domestic industry as a result of imports.

House insistence on this provision had deadlocked compromise efforts for more than a week, although the President had announced he would not oppose it.

### Three British Columbia Youths Killed In Wreck

WILLIAMS, Calif. (AP)—Three youths from British Columbia were killed when their small car ramed into a tractor carrying baled hay Tuesday night.

The dead: Frederick Walker, 18, Vancouver.

Donald Thomas, 17, Mission City, B.C.

Ronald Imekire, 16, Mission City.

The California Highway Patrol reported the youths were driving west on Highway 20. Their small automobile ramed into a tractor driven by Lee Williams, 47, of Williams, Calif. Williams escaped injury.

The impact drove the automobile's engine back, killing Walker, the driver, and Thomas. Imekire died two hours later.

### Roseburg To Receive \$37,836 Highway Funds

SALEM (AP) — Apportionment of \$2,500,415 of state highway fund revenues to Oregon cities was announced Tuesday by Secretary of State Mark Hatfield.

Money distributed is 10 percent of the state highway fund revenue for the six months ending June 30.

Payments to cities include: Eugene \$135,278; Klamath Falls, \$55,289; Pendleton, \$44,163; Portland, \$799,599; Roseburg, \$37,836; Salem, \$134,792; and Springfield, \$39,291.

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
