

Lana Turner Nervous On Returning To Work

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Lana Turner, returning to work for the first time since Johnny Stompanato was stabbed to death by her daughter Cheryl, 14, said: "I'm terribly nervous. I'm always nervous on the first day... but I'm especially nervous this time."

The blonde actress, looking slim and glamorous, distributed kisses to her producer, director and cameraman Tuesday and then went into rehearsal on the film, "Imitation of Life."

Cheryl was stabbed by an inquest jury in the slaying of her mother's sweetheart.

Two Gliders Collide Killing One Of The Pilots

BISHOP, Calif. (AP) — Two gliders collided at the 25th National Soaring Meet yesterday, killing one pilot.

Dr. John Sawyer of El Centro, Calif., plunged to his death from 250 feet. The other pilot, Harner Selvidge of North Hollywood, landed his craft at Bishop Airport, and was unharmed.

All contest event for the rest of the day were canceled.

Timber Will Be Divided So Joint Owner Can Cut

PORTLAND (AP) — A 22,000-acre stand of virgin Douglas fir timber, worth some 50 million dollars, will be divided among joint owners so one of them can begin cutting it.

Sewell Avery of Chicago, Montgomery Ward board member, is one of the joint owners. He and his late brother, Waldo Avery of Gross Pointe, Mich., are listed as owning a little over half the timber, located in Western Oregon. Other owners are Portland Manufacturing Co., and Simpson Redwood Co. of Seattle.

Simpson, which brought federal court suit asking for the division of the timber, is a subsidiary of Simpson Logging Co., U.S. Dist. Judge Gus Solomon, ordering the partition Wednesday, named a three-man board to make it.

The timber is in the Thomas Creek area of Linn County.

Girl Reported Critical From Poisonous Ammonia

SANTA PAULA, Calif. (AP) — A teen-age girl is in critical condition from poisonous ammonia fumes which swirled through a crowded trailer camp.

Every pet dog, cat and bird in the Pepper Tree Trailer Park was killed.

A break in a connection between a commercial fertilizer tank truck and a storage tank sent the fumes over a 10-block area Tuesday, forcing the evacuation of 119 persons.

Gas-masked rescuers went into the gas-cloaked park to remove those unable to aid themselves. Ambulances shuttled back and forth between here and nearby Ventura General Hospital.

Sixty persons were hospitalized. All but five, all children, were treated and released.

Listed as critical was Linda Baudizian, 13.

TANK TO BE MOVED

SALEM (AP) — Removal of an old water tank from the Oregon State Penitentiary to the new boiler plant outside the walls was approved by the state Board of Control Wednesday.

The project will cost \$10,000. In other action, the board approved purchase of two houses in the Capitol Mall area.

Deb Copenhaver Leading Field

WALLA WALLA (AP) — Deb Copenhaver of Post Falls, Idaho, is several bucks ahead of the field in the race for the \$1,000 1958 Northwest professional saddle bronc riding title.

The standings announced by Eddie MacMurdo, president of the Northwest Professional Rodeo Management Assn., show Copenhaver leading the field with 29½ points, to 22½ for the runnerup, Ellie Lewis of Penticton, B.C. Copenhaver was the 1955 and 1956 world champion saddle bronc rider.

Others high in the standings were: Jack Carson, Lewiston, Idaho, 21½; Gene Tyler, Ellensburg, 20½; Jackie Wright, Dayville, Ore., 17; Lyle Smith, Don-alda, Alta., 16½, and Bill Schall, Arlee, Mont., 15½.

Points have been won by 34 riders in the 1958 competition, which has included nine rodeos by member associations. The most recent was Chief Joseph Days at Joseph, Ore.

Rodeos in the near future at which points will be awarded include the Diamond Spurs at Spokane; Myrtle Point, Ore., and Kennewick.

Burglars Peel Safe Expertly

GRANTS PASS (AP) — Burglars who wheeled a safe into a back room and "peeled" it expertly, obtained \$1,297 last night from the Griggs "Y" super-market, near the junction of South Highway 99 and the Redwood Highway.

Entrance was gained by climbing over the roof and breaking a vertical window in a partition. The burglars wheeled the safe from the front part of the building into a back room before working on it.

At 10 o'clock a deputy sheriff making a tour of inspection saw the safe in the front of the store. He sounded the alarm when he returned at 11:20 and discovered the safe had been moved.

Two years ago robbers obtained \$3,200 at the same market. At that time they held the manager, A. M. Tiptops, his wife, and their 17-year-old son prisoner until the money had been taken from the safe.

Last January burglars broke into the market, but were frightened away by a deputy making the nightly rounds. Nothing was obtained in that break-in.

Electricity Output Reaches Record High

NEW YORK (AP) — The nation's production of electricity reached a record high last week, Edison Electric Institute reported Wednesday.

Power output soared to 12,619,000 kilowatt-hours as air conditioning, fans, and other electric appliances were put into heavy use. This compared with 12,319,000 kilowatt-hours the previous week and was 1.2 per cent ahead of consumption totaling 12,474,000 kilowatt-hours in the similar 1957 week.

The increase over a year ago came despite fairly sharp percentage declines in three sections including the Pacific Northwest, 11.9 per cent.

O & C Assn. May Study Work Of Ex-Sen. Cordon

PORTLAND (AP) — The Assn. of O & C Counties Tuesday was asked to study the activities of former Sen. Guy Cordon (R-Ore.) as its Washington, D.C., counsel.

The request was made to Ralph Peterson, a Lane County commissioner and president of the O & C executive committee, by Multnomah County Commissioners Jack Bain and James Gleason.

In Washington, D.C., Cordon said: "No comment. Not a bit."

The latest request came shortly after Lane County Commissioner Ralph Straub said Cordon should be retained no longer at his \$1,000-a-month fee.

Oregon's two senators can perform the same duties, said Straub.

County, Cities To Get Share Of Liquor Funds

SALEM (AP) — Counties and cities will get a total of \$65,433 as their quarterly share of state liquor revenues, Secretary of State Mark Hatfield announced Tuesday.

Among the county funds: Baker, \$251; Douglas, \$1,497; Josephine, \$801; Klamath, \$799; Lane, \$3,013; Marion, \$2,107; Multnomah, \$4,473; and Umatilla, \$524.

City shares included Baker \$358; Roseburg, \$489; Klamath Falls, \$715; Eugene, \$1,750; Springfield, \$508; Salem, \$1,744; Portland, \$15,519; and Pendleton, \$571.

West Coast Airlines Strike Appears Nearer

SEATTLE (AP) — If 88 West Coast Airlines pilots strike Aug. 18, 399 other employees may have to go on furlough, company officials said Tuesday.

Several months of negotiations between the Air Line Pilots' Assn. and West Coast over terms of a new contract have proved fruitless. The 30-day waiting period following the expiration of the old agreement ends Aug. 17, leaving the pilots free to strike.

West Coast operates in Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Holmes Urges State Fair Rides All Be Inspected

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Robert D. Holmes has urged the State Fair Board to have all fair rides inspected by the Industrial Accident Commission.

The governor noted that one youth was killed and his companion critically injured recently when a ride device broke and hurled them into a crowd at Mid-dletown, N.Y.

He noted that Oregon has no strict inspection laws covering amusement devices.

Two Tired, Young Men, Sought By Police, Located

BELLINGHAM (AP) — Two footsore, tired young Bellingham men, sought since Sunday after a brush with the law, emerged from the woods Tuesday afternoon "dead beat" from two days of hiking and hiding.

The two, James H. DuPuis and Frederick A. York, both 22, were held without charge Wednesday.

Whatcom County Sheriff William Breuer said DuPuis and York admitted pulling guns on Charles McDougall, special deputy, when he stopped their car Sunday for a routine check at New-halem on the Upper Skagit River.

They explained they "just lost their heads," the sheriff said.

McDougall said the men fled into the woods after threatening him with the two rifles and pistol they were carrying.

Breuer said DuPuis and York gave themselves up at the Seattle City Light dam near New-halem. They were unarmed, and said one rifle was lost, the other broken and their pistol had been left in the woods.

They said they had been looking for work with firefighting crews.

Rex Putman To Make Visit To Old School

SALEM (AP) — State Superintendent of Public Instruction Rex Putnam will make his first visit to Black Hills Teachers College since his graduation, to be speaker in observance of the school's 75th anniversary Aug. 8 to 10.

The college is located at Spearfish, S.D.

From Spearfish he will go to Buffalo, N.Y., to attend the annual convention of the American Vocational Assn.

Firemen Couldn't Break Into Smoking Rail Car

SOUTH SALT LAKE, Utah (AP) — The box car standing in the nearby railroad yards was labeled "Fire-works." It was smoking. But firemen couldn't break in because it was a government shipment.

They waited 10 minutes before a special agent showed up to open the car yesterday. They doused a small blaze in one wall of the car, then took a closer look at its cargo.

The car contained about eight dozen 500-pound bombs, several boxes of detonators, some small arms ammunition and some nitroglycerin.

Senate Kills Municipal Public Works Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill to stimulate municipal public works construction, passed last winter by the Senate as an anti-recession measure, apparently is dead.

House Republicans and Democrats have teamed up here to vote 187-173 against debating the proposed program of low cost federal loans to help finance construction of practically all types of community facilities except schools. For all practical purposes, the action killed the bill for this session.

Inventor Files Suit To Collect On Device

NEW YORK (AP) — The inventor of a top-secret device to win the right to trial behind closed doors of his suit against the government for compensation. The decision was handed down Tuesday by the U.S. Court of Appeals.

Dr. Otto Halpern, a Vienna-born physicist, has been unable to come to terms with the government for a device he invented in 1941.

So secret is the device that its only description disclosed by the Navy is that it "deals with a manner and means whereby an object may escape observation and detection by radar."

Last September Halpern filed suit for "hundreds of thousands of dollars" against the government for use of the device.

Sergeant Quits Attempt At Talkathon Record

PLATTSBURGH, N. Y. (AP) — S.Sgt. Thomas A. Johnson quit his attempt at setting a world's talking record and went home to bed today. His tired vocal chords had spied for 88 hours and 37 minutes.

Johnson, a onetime disc jockey from Memphis, Tenn., had hoped to hit 100 hours of continuous talking.

At 4:30 a.m. Capt. Oscar Ruiz, an Air Force doctor, advised Johnson to quit or risk permanent injury to his voice. Johnson complied.

Five other sergeants continued. If Johnson had talked for six more hours, he would have matched the talking record of 94½ hours claimed earlier this week by Mrs. Mary E. Davis, a housewife in Tulsa, Okla.

Commission To Meet

SPOKANE (AP) — The Columbia Interstate Compact Commission will hold its 40th meeting here Sept. 12. Secretary H. Calvert Anderson said Wednesday.

A revised draft of the proposed compact to govern water usage in the seven states involved will be presented and the commission will also name a treasurer to succeed the late Mark R. Kulp of Idaho.
