Fledgling Pro Armstrong Is 6-5 Underdog

NEW YORK (AP) — For a fellow stepping into fast company, Gene (Ace) Armstrong is getting a lot of respect. The rangy underdog middleweight is only a 6-5 underdog against experienced, powerful Rory Calhoun for their 10-round television scrap at Madison Square Garden tonight.

Armstrong, 26, Elizabeth, N.J., has won all 14 of his pro fights in three years. But he has scored only one knockout and his only victory over a name fighter came Feb. 17 when he decisively whipped Charley Joseph of New Orleans. That was his last fight.

Calhoun, 29, White Plains, N.Y., has a 35-41 record, including 18 knockouts. He has fought most of the leading middleweights.

It's the contrasting styles that apparently give Armstrong a solid chance. Calhoun is the sixth contender and Armstrong No. 9.

Armstrong, a fine boxer, likes an opponent to come to him. He doesn't have to worry about Rory on that score.

"That will suit me fine," said Armstrong. "Let him come. I'll be waiting and ready. This is my big chance and I'm not going to blow it."

George Freese's solo homer was Portland's only run as the Beavers were beaten 5-1 by Vancouver in the opener of a Pacific Coast League doubleheader in the Canadian city Thursday night.

But Portland came back and won the second game 6-3 as Eddie Meyer pitched four-hit ball while his mates banged out nine hits.

The Beavers spotted Vancouver two runs in the first inning and then won it with two three-run innings, the fifth and the sixth.

Meanwhile Phoenix stepped into a full game lead over Vancouver in the conference standings by beating Seattle 9-4.

In other league action, Salt Lake City's Bees tipped Sacramento 6-5 and the San Diego Padres whitewashed Spokane's Indians 5-0.

The Giants rattled Seattle pitching for 12 hits, including homers

by George Prescott, Andre Rodgers and Willie McCovey and lacked the loss to Marty Kutyna. Phoenix had nine runs up on the scoreboard before Seattle got its first man around.

The Giants whipped up five double plays to keep winner Curt Barclay's head above water. Barclay had to have help from Joe Margoneri in the ninth after giving up two Seattle runs in the eighth and two hits to start the ninth.

George Bamberger choked the Beavers off on six hits in the first game of the Vancouver-Portland bargain bill. He struck out two and failed to give up a walk.

Joe Lombardi, who gave up eight hits, absorbed the loss.

McDaniels Shines
Jim McDaniels drove in three runs with a triple and a homer in Salt Lake City's victory over the Solons. The Bees only got three other hits, but one of them was Sam Miley's one-run triple and another was Ken Tothman's double, which set the stage for Salt Lake City's final run in the seventh.

Jack Lamabe was the victor, although he gave up nine hits and five walks in seven innings on the mound. Carl Greene, the Sacramento starter, lost it. He worked five innings, gave up four hits, five runs and three walks.

Jack Spring, who toiled for the old Spokane entry in the Northwest League, came back to haunt the Indians in a San Diego uniform as he blanked the Redskins on three hits, including two singles and Tony Klig's double.

Doubles by Larry Raines and Hal Naragon and a walk gave the Padres two runs, all they needed, in the third inning. Raines got another double in the game as he batted three for four.

Five-Game Slate Includes Four-Baggers, Rhubarbs

Little League night at Legion Field in Roseburg brought a total of 375 baseball fans to the ball park, and this assembled group must have gone home with just one thought in mind: What a wonderful program for the kids.

Five games were played, to the delight of the crowd, with players from the youngest age group — eight and nine year olds — to the oldest — 16 years of age and under — all seeing action.

Hitters definitely were the big guns in at least two of the five tilts played, while pitchers enjoyed good nights in the others. A total of six extra-base hits were rapped — three triples, a double and two homers.

The roundtrippers gave the fans early excitement in the first game of the evening between two 8½ year old teams, the Braves and the Chiefs. Gordy Smith, Chiefs' first sacker, was the guy connecting for the first solo blast, as he sent a ball to right field as third man up in the fray. Doug Stoddard had the other homer, also for the Chiefs, in the second.

The triples were garnered by Barry Smith, for the Chiefs, and by two 16 and under players, Jay Stone of the Yanks and Tom Hatfield of the Indians.

Rick Ragan of the 10-11 year old Pirates, laced the double, a well-tapped poke to left field. Ragan led the RBI's department for the night with this hit, as three runs scored. Stone was the runner-up in the RBI department with two.

In the chucking work, two other players were tops in strikeouts as the Yanks' Royce Kiser whiffed nine batters, while the Indians' Arlen Foote also fanned nine but gave walks to nine batters in addition. These marks were compiled over the five-inning route.

In the 13-year-old division, the Cubs' Don Lowe recorded eight strikeouts while going three frames. A two-inning mark of six strikeouts was registered by Mike Fitzgerald while working for the Tigers against the Senators in the 10-11 year old age group.

Double Play Registered
The big double play was witnessed twice as two went into the books. The younger 10-11 year olds displayed their prowess in this phase of the game, as the Dodgers collected the first against the Pirates. The other was by the Indians against the Yanks.

The king-sized night of baseball was completed after: Five hours of play, one of three umpires had turned in his indicator and a second was calling for help.

The three umpires were Bill Harper, Jerry Coen and Don Severson, all of whom found their ability to see questioned throughout the evening.

CHIEFS 5, BRAVES 1
The Chiefs grabbed the first win of the night, rolling over the Braves 5-1. After Smith's homer in the first, singles by Jim Cave and Don Hobbs kept the scoring under way in the second inning.

Both Cave and Hobbs scored and then Stoddard collected his homer. Jeff Jones gained life on an error as did Smith, but Jones scored run number five for the Chiefs while Smith was left on base.

The Braves' only marker of the game was in the second, as the number five hitter, Kent Cummins, sent a single to right field. He stole second and third and scored on a wild pitch.

His hit was the only one gained off Chiefs' hurler Jones.

Record-Holders Elliott, Thomas Leave Ireland

DUBLIN (AP) — Australians Herb Elliott and Albert Thomas packed their record-breaking cleats for Edinburgh and the Highland Games today. Behind them they left shattered world records for the mile and two-mile runs.

Elliott Wednesday set a great mark of 3:54.5 for the mile on the newly laid, \$50,000 Santry Stadium track. Thomas yesterday established the world's best time for the two miles with a 8:32 clocking.

England's Derek Ibbotson is looking forward to meeting the 20-year-old Elliott in the mile at Edinburgh. The 26-year-old Englishman had the world's best time of 3:57.2 before Elliott's fantastic clocking.

Ibbotson's time never was ratified as a world mark because of possible pacing complications, and this season Ibbotson has failed to hit the peak form that made him the "King of the Milers" last season.

But Ibbotson still maintains he's "the tops."

A race between Elliott and Ibbotson may see the Englishman pulling something extra out of the bag to surprise the fans and push Elliott to a fast time. That's the sort of last-ditch effort many think Ibbotson capable of performing.

Thomas, 35, Australian clerk, broke the world two-mile record last night after Elliott had set the pace for five laps. Thomas pushed ahead on the sixth lap and then raced away on his won to a world standard and a 25-yard lead over Elliott.

Herb Is 2nd
Elliott, who listed second in 3:57.2, the listed world mark of 3:54.5 was set by Hungary's Sandor Ibaros in London May 30, 1955.

So Elliott repaid the debt he owed to Thomas for his fantastic mile time.

In that mile Thomas set the pace for the first two laps. Then Merv Lincoln of Australia took over, followed by the powerful Elliott, who surged ahead to victory and a mile time that looks as if it'll stand for years. Thomas finished fifth in 5:58.6.

Think of a 20-game winner and the name of Warren Spahn pops to mind.

The Milwaukee left-hander, now 37, is heading toward the 20-mark for the ninth time. If he makes it he will have a modern major league record for left-handed pitchers.

He is tied with Lefty Grove of the old Philadelphia A's among the southpaws. He still is way behind the top right-handers. Cy Young won 20 or more 16 times over 50 years ago. Christy Mathewson did it 13 times and Walter Johnson 12.

At the rate Spahn is going he will have no trouble making the grade for the third straight year. A three-run rally against Bob Friend in the seventh inning gave Milwaukee a 3-2 decision over Pittsburgh yesterday. Spahn scattered seven hits for his 15th victory.

Braves Up Lead
The Braves pulled out seven full games in front of the San Francisco Giants, who lost 3-1 to the St. Louis Cardinals and Sam Jones. Philadelphia climbed into fourth by shading Cincinnati 3-2 behind Don Cardwell. Dave Philley's triple and Chicago Fernandez's sacrifice fly broke a 2-2 tie in the eighth to beat Bob Purkey.

Johnny Kippstein saved Sany Koufax in the ninth inning to protect a 3-1 Los Angeles victory over the Chicago Cubs.

In the only American League game, the Boston Red Sox walloped Washington 8-4.

Friend had a 1-0 lead and a two-hit shutout going to the seventh at Milwaukee. Red Schoendienst opened with a single and Ed Lie Mathews hit his 23rd home run. A single by Hank Aaron, a sacrifice and a single by Frank Torre added the third run.

The revived Cardinals battered loser Mike McCormick and two others for 13 hits. Stan Musial's two hits in three trips gave him the batting lead at .346 to .344 for the Phils' Richie Ashburn.

Rigney Thumbed
Manager Billy Rigney of the Giants was ejected by Umpire Al Barlick when he and Ramon Montant objected to a call of a third ball.

The Phillies had a 2-0 edge going into the seventh when Bob Thurman's third single, a single by Don Hoak and a two-run double by Bailey evened matters. Ed Bouchee's single drove in the first Phil run and Cardwell's single knocked in the second.

For a man closing in on his 40th birthday, Ted Williams still swings a mean home run bat. With 476 to his credit, the Boston Red Sox slugger now seems certain to reach his lifetime goal of 500 home runs.

Williams hit his 20th homer of the year (No. 476) and a two-run single Thursday while Boston spanked Washington for its fifth straight victory.

The two hits edged Williams to 311 and an eighth-place tie in the batting race. Although he still is 24 points behind the leader, teammate Pete Runnels, Ted still must be given a chance of winning his sixth batting crown.

Homer Travels
Williams' homer at Fenway Park was a tape measure job, variously estimated at more than 450 feet. It came on the first pitch by Truman Cleveland with the bases empty in the sixth inning and soared some 20 rows into the right field bleachers. Ted's two-run single came with the bases loaded in the second.
