

Glendale School Accepted In Standardization Report

Members of the Glendale School Board were told Wednesday night that Glendale Elementary School has been accepted in a standardization report issued recently by the Oregon Department of Education.

In other action, the board agreed to contribute \$100 to the City of Glendale for street paving. As a provision of the contribution, the board specified that the area next to the school, where buses load, will be paved by the city.

Supt. Marlin Yoder announced that all school staff positions have been filled, with one exception. Millard Gilbreth, elementary school principal, is expected to hire a person to fill the vacancy, that of secretary, within the next few days.

Meanwhile, it was announced that Jerome Bryan, a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, has been hired to the post of seventh grade teacher.

Yoder reported that school will begin at 9 a.m. Sept. 3, following a two-day period in which teachers will meet to make final preparations. Yoder said the first school day will be a full day and added that lunch lunches will be served. He said prices for lunches will be the same as those in effect last year — 30 cents at the high school and 25 cents at the elementary school.

A PTA-sponsored banquet will be staged for the teachers the night of Sept. 2.

Board member Albert Vaughn was appointed to meet with Clara

ence Dietrich, Glendale logging contractor, to see what can be done about the problem presented by the creek channel at the rear of the high school grounds. The channel reportedly is cutting away the bank.

The board awarded a contract to Mrs. Norma Vaughn to transport children to and from school on the Mt. Rueben Road.

The board decided to charge elementary school youngsters \$2 apiece for their workbooks and subscriptions to the school's weekly newspaper, "Weekly Reader."

Also approved by the board was a system wherein individual year-book pictures of students will be sent to parents for their approval. Parents will have the right to purchase the photos or reject them.

Yoder reported to the board on a recent conference of school superintendents in Eugene, which he attended.

The next board meeting will be Aug. 20.

work is begun on the approved Garden Valley project.

It was generally agreed that the bridge project is of more importance to solution of Roseburg's traffic ills than is the Garden Valley improvement job.

The bridge project was the focal point of the discussion. Several plans for possible Highway 99-city center routes were presented informally.

A new route would result in replacement of the present Oak Avenue bridge. It could be designed primarily to afford a straighter, more direct access from the Highway 99 interchange at W. Military Avenue to the downtown area.

Farrell noted that a state survey resulted in recommendation of a bridge on a line between W. Military Avenue and SE Washington Avenue, with the two thoroughfares to be connected.

N. Umpqua Project Still Alive

Another matter which might come up at the Aug. 18 session concerns construction on the North Umpqua Highway.

State Rep. Al Flegel told chamber members Friday that the project had not been "cut off" in state allocations, as had been believed in some circles.

Flegel, chairman of the legislature's highway interim committee, said funds for the highway were slashed from \$750,000 to \$500,000. He said he would have liked to have seen the allocation remain at the former figure, but that other projects gained priority over the North Umpqua job.

Flegel said funds allotted for 1958-59 were deemed by the state as adequate to continue construction on the highway as planned.

Farrell said the upcoming meeting will be aimed at setting up a program which can be co-endorsed by the council and the chamber. He said he is recommending that the full council meet with chamber representatives.

In what direction the vessel has traveled. It is an electronic age form of the sailor's old "dead reckoning" navigation.

For the first time, man now has an accurate graph of the bottom of the Atlantic Basin in the path through which the Nautilus passed.

LONDON (AP) — The U.S. nuclear submarine Nautilus is expected to reach Portland, England, on Tuesday after a voyage from Pearl Harbor under the arctic ice cap. U.S. Navy headquarters in London announced today the vessel was on its way from Icelandic waters.

STOCKHOLM (AP) — A Swedish expert said today the U.S. Navy is at least one year or more ahead of the Soviet fleet in the development of atomic submarines.

The unnamed Navy officer, writing for the Stockholm paper Dagens Nyheter, said the cruise by the Nautilus beneath the arctic ice cap "was a final test and a full hit."

Anti-Polio Shots Urged For Persons Under 40

Type 1 polio virus recently has been isolated in Oregon cases, leading Dr. Mary Soules, county public health officer, to recommend today that all unvaccinated persons under 40 years should go to their physicians for polio immunization as soon as possible.

The news of the isolation came from the State Board of Health, she said.

Dr. Soules described the virus as the most virulent type. Unvaccinated persons are exposed to the risk of serious paralysis, she said.

PLAIN TRUTH

Sincerity is a virtue which all must have. In business or religion we hold no brief for the person who is not sincere in what he believes and advocates. We cannot, however, measure our duty to God by the measure of sincerity we possess. We may be sincerely wrong as well as sincerely right. We must be sincere to please God, yet sincerity is not enough by itself.

The Apostle Paul was sincere in his persecution of Christians. Acts 26:9. Would you say, "It makes no difference what Paul did so long as he was sincere?" The Centurion Cornelius is a good example of a sincere person yet was unsaved. Sincerity coupled with a good moral life was not enough to please God for God directed Cornelius to send for Peter, that Peter might tell this sincere, devout man what he must believe and do. Acts 10.

Nuclear Methods May Be Used For Removal Of Oil

CALGARY, Alta. (AP) — Nuclear energy may become the latest of several methods to be tried for the removal of oil from Alberta's Athabasca oil sands, about 375 miles northeast of Edmonton.

It is believed that Richfield Oil Corp. of Los Angeles is considering the possibilities of using nuclear energy in separating the oil from the sand.

A spokesman for Richfield said in a telegram from Los Angeles Friday: "Richfield is investigating the possibility of using nuclear energy to facilitate recovery of oil."

He declined, however, to either confirm or deny that the process was being studied in connection with separation in the Athabasca sands, largest reserve of oil known to man.

The oil-soaked sands, on the banks of the Athabasca River, are thought to contain up to 300 billion barrels of oil. Production in the area has been held back because of a lack of economic methods of recovery and technological costs.

The Alberta Research Council, in a submission to the Borden Royal Commission on Energy in May, had estimated that ultimate recoverable oil from the sands may be in the neighborhood of 50 billion barrels.
