A final tally of swimmers and divers who will compete in the Southern Oregon Swimming and Diving Championships this weekend in Roseburg reveals 252 contestants will be in action.

The meet is sponsored by the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce in coordination with the city of Roseburg.

The nine-team meet will draw teams from Bend, Klamath Falls, Lakeview, St. Helens, Medford, North Bend and two teams from Eugene, in addition to the host team, Roseburg.

Top Swimmers Entered

This lineup of teams represents some of the top swimming and diving teams in the state, according to meet director and Roseburg coach Don Jacklin. The teams all have compiled top records.

Lakeview recently won the Klamath Falls Invitational meet, with the host team a close second; Bend won The Dalles Invitational while Eugene took top honors in the recent Roseburg meet and Eugene meet. For Eugene, Klamath Falls, Lakeview and Bend the swim carnival will be the first meeting among the four teams.

According to Jacklin, Fred Steinhouser, Oregon State College's top diver, will be seen in action for the potent Bend aggregation. The Bend team developed Larry Lermon, top distance swimmer, during the past few years.

In addition to the swimming and diving on tap, fans will witness a water ballet performed by the Roseburg mermaids.

Prelim Times Listed

The preliminaries for the two-day meet were to begin this afternoon at 1:30, with no charge to fans. Prelims are set also for Sunday morning at 10.

For the tonight's action and the finals Sunday afternoon, an admission charge of 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children between 6 and 16 years of age will be made. Children under 6 will be admitted free.

Tonight's show will begin at 7 p.m. and the finals Sunday afternoon start at 2 p.m.

The Portland Beavers were shut out 7-0 by the Vancouver Mounties in Friday night's Pacific Coast League baseball game at the Canadian City.

Erv Palica pitched for the winners and allowed only six hits, all singles. Outfielder Luis Marquez was the only Beaver to get two hits.

The Mounties picked up single runs in the first, second, fourth and sixth, and three in the fifth. Jim Dyck's 400-foot homer over the left field barrier accounted for the fifth-inning runs. Ray Barker solo homered for the Mounties in the fourth.

In other games the Phoenix Giants beat Seattle 10-6, Spokane dropped San Diego 2-1 and Sacramento split a pair with the Salt Lake City Bees, winning 5-4 and then losing 2-1.

The Giants and Rainiers were content with one run apiece during the first six innings of their game. Then Phoenix went to town

with two runs in the seventh and three in the eighth.

Seattle got one in the eighth and then tied it up at 6-6 with four in the top of the ninth. It just set the stage for Joe Amalfitano's game-winning blast in the Phoenix ninth. The Rainiers used four pitchers, the Giants five.

At Spokane, the Indians' Art Fowler gave up only four hits in his winning effort while San Diego's Bud Podbielniak lost a toughly pitched, sparkling three-hitter. Both pitchers fanned five and walked only one.

Spokane got the winning run in the eighth inning on an error and Ron Sherry's only hit of the night, a double. San Diego's lone run came in the seventh on Dave Pope's triple and a sacrifice fly.

The Solons won their opener with Salt Lake City on the strength of a two-run seventh inning. Three singles and a sacrifice did the damage. Nippy Jones clouted a two-run homer for the Solons in the first inning, when the winners struck for three runs.

Salt Lake City's winning run in the nightcap on a fourth-inning double by Sam Miley and an infield hit. The Solons only run was scored by Clem Moore, who singled and came in on Dick Cole's triple.

Wenatchee continues to creep back into contention in the Northwest League second half pennant chase.

The Chiefs called on their \$50,000 bonus pitcher from Cincinnati, Bob Kropiewnicki, to beat Lewiston 4-2 Friday.

League-leading Yakima, meantime, fell 6-5 in a tight extra-inning game at Eugene. In the third game of the night, Salem lost its 10th straight to Tri-City, also by a 6-5 count.

Kropiewnicki gave up five hits in the well-played game at Lewiston. The Broncs' Frosty Norris was nicked for only eight himself, but half of them were doubles.

The Chiefs scored one run in the first inning. A pitchers' duel ensued until the seventh when Wenatchee got two more tallies on Hank Vevins' short single. Larry Halms and Chuck Tulner came around on Blevins' throw.

Lewiston roared back for two runs in the eighth. Tony Santino singled. Bruce McIntosh doubled him home and Arnie Hallgren tripled, scoring McIntosh.

Jake Azcue doubled Bob Famous home with a Wenatchee insurance run in the ninth.

Eugene squeezed in the winning run in the bottom of the tenth in its game with Yakima. The score was knotted at 5-5 when John Keller put down a bunt and Ron Condon raced home with the winner.

Ed Tappe and Walt O'Neil hit bases-empty homers for Yakima. At Salem, Bob Koski doubled in the seventh to send Ray Looney around with the winning run. Looney had walked and stolen second.

U.S. Athletes Reported Readied For Meet With Greek Team

ATHENS (AP) — Despite three weeks of grueling travel through Soviet Russia, Poland and Hungary America's track and field athletes were declared in good shape today by coaches George Eastman and Ed Temple.

The 38 men and 18 women who comprise the U. S. squad are all set for their two-day meet with Greece that begins tonight.

Upwards of 50,000 are expected to fill the arena both nights. No scoring of any kind is possible since both countries may enter as many athletes as they wish.

After inspecting "the sharpest turns I've ever seen — even sharper than American indoor tracks," Eastman predicted that many stadium records would fall to the Americans.

"Maybe we are a bit travel-weary," he admitted, "but these fellows are champions and they're not letting down just because they're a little tired. We've been going at this pace for almost three weeks now and doing a good job. Two more days won't hurt."

"I told the boys there's no point in letting down now. They're keyed up just enough."

"I doubt if we'll see any world

Seat Addition Said Goal Of Ticket Sales

Sale of box seats at Legion Park is expected to raise enough money to complete seats for 1,200 baseball fans, according to plans announced by the Roseburg Park Commission.

Money now in the park budget then is expected to stretch far enough for installation of dressing rooms and showers under the grandstand.

5-Year Plan Set
Park Commission members said boxes, each seating six persons, will be sold for \$150 for five years. There will be 24 boxes, and some already have been sold. Chairs will be provided by the commission.

Completion of the stands may preclude attraction of outside ball teams, Park Commissioner Al Flegel commented. He said he believes it will be possible to get the Portland Beavers, Eugene Emeralds and Drayton Black Sox to appear here. Other events, such as stage shows, may be staged if interest warrants.

"Roseburg is starved for entertainment," he asserted.

Admission Charged
Purchase of box seats won't entitle the holders to free admission to the ball games. Box holders still must pay admission to the park, but special tickets will be printed to show that they are to sit in the boxes.

The Park Commission said that footings for the east section of the stands now are being built, with the west section footings to be started next week.

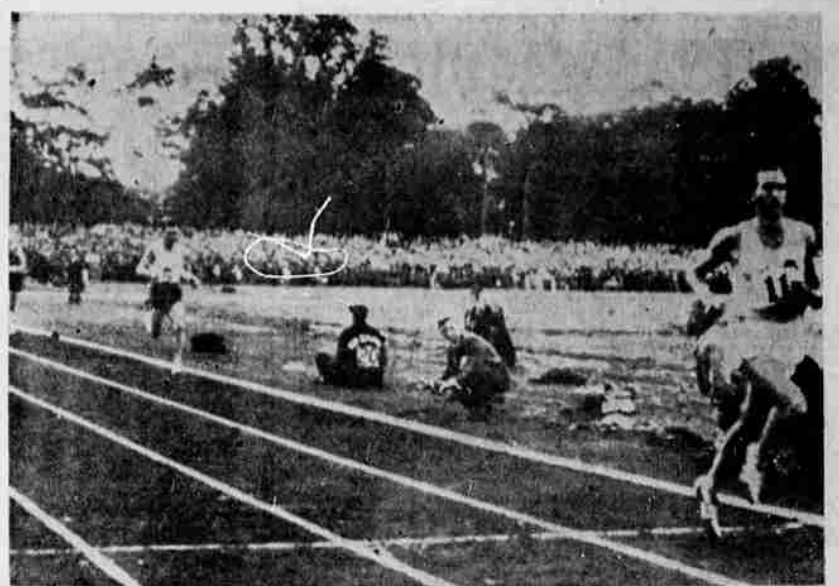

Ford Hurls 7th Shutout; Braves Preserve Lead

5 Hydros Still Unqualified In Gold Cup Tests

SEATTLE (AP) — The number 13 threw a hex over Lake Washington Friday and five unlimited hydroplanes still are trying Saturday to become the 14th qualifier for Sunday's Gold Cup speedboat race.

Driver Dallas Sartz got Miss Spokane safely set for the race by averaging 103.25 miles per hour for his triple circuit of the 3-mile course.

Thus the boat financed by a syndicate of Spokane, Wash., hydroplane fans was the 13th to qualify. Three others made multiple efforts but none could grab a rung on the qualifying ladder.

Five boats still were in the pits Saturday morning, their owners and drivers growing anxious. They faced the necessity of qualifying by 5 p.m. to earn a berth in the 90-mile argument for the continent's top speedboat trophy.

2 Sections Set
As the field now stands, Sunday's first heat will be run in two sections. Should two more make the 95 mile-per-hour qualifying minimum Saturday, the first heat will have to be run in three sections. Race rules permit no more than seven boats in any one dash.

Three probably will make it; all five could. Things looked so far Saturday for a pair of candidates, however. Bob Gilham's Fascination tried twice to qualify Friday and could not reach 95 mph. Lyle Parks' Miss Sammamish has not gotten on the course for a qualifying try. Both are Seattle boats.

Gale V., a Detroit candidate driven by Bill Cantrell, made no effort to qualify but took a few practice turns around the course. She could be No. 14.

The Breathless II of Lake Tahoe and the Miss Bardahl of Seattle were coming back to try again Saturday after repeated knock-outs Friday. Bardahl has blown so many superchargers her owner, Ole Bardahl, says he thinks he'll start manufacturing them.

Slovak Has Troubles
Mico Slovak drove her on the course twice Friday and twice was towed back to the pits.

Carburetion and spark plug trouble has beset the Breathless. Driver Jay Murphy had her on and off the course several times and twice made qualifying attempts. Each time he went two laps and lost his power on the third.

Murphy was only a quarter of a mile from the finish of his second try when his engine coughed, flamed and quit. He was averaging close to 100 mph.

The first section of the first heat of Sunday's 51st Gold Cup race is scheduled to start at 12:20 p.m. The final heat will go at 5:30 p.m.

Whitely Ford is sailing along with the best earned run average in the majors since Spud Chandler in 1943. The New York Yankees' chunky lefthander posted his seventh shutout Friday night, lowering his ERA to 1.66.

Actually, Ford could just as well have eight shutouts at this time. He voluntarily left an early season game after seven innings with an 8-0 lead. Although his relief man blanked Washington the rest of the way, it doesn't count as a shutout. The Yanks' club record is eight.

Hoffstetter Set For Net Final Sunday

The Roseburg men's tennis tournament ends Sunday in the singles play, with Wayne Henninger or Steve Hall meeting Fred Hoffstetter for the title.

Hoffstetter won the lower bracket play, while Henninger and Hall met today for the right to play in the final match Sunday.

Hoffstetter has defeated two top seeded players to advance to the final match. He dropped the No. 4 seeded player, Tom Garrison, 7-5, 6-4 and eliminated Glen Boyer, the No. 2 seeded man, 6-2, 6-4.

The tourney thus far has seen top play. In the only three-set match of the tournament, Paul Carey was defeated by Frank Sobczak, 6-4, 4-6, 6-3. Sobczak was in turn eliminated from play by Hall 6-2, 7-5.

Hall advanced to the semis with a win over Tommy Kirk, 7-5, 9-7. Kirk had earlier upset the No. 3 seeded player, Harrison Winston, 7-5, 6-4.

The doubles play will begin following the final singles match. Seven doubles teams are entered in the tourney.

Chandler led the American League 15 years ago with a 1.64 ERA. The lowest in the National in 25 years was Carl Hubbell of the Giants with 1.66 in 1933.

Sox Drop Back
Ford's 14th victory shunted the Boston Red Sox 16 1/2 games behind the league leaders, who continue to march toward the earliest clinching date in history.

Without Ted Williams, who was out of action with a sprained left wrist, Boston had no punch. The Sox succumbed weakly 2-0 with only three hits. Two came in the fourth but a double play followed Pete Runnels' single and Jackie Jensen was cut down trying to stretch a double into a triple.

Washington sunk Baltimore 4-2, the Orioles' 11th straight defeat, a new high for the majors this season. Dick Hyde, a key figure in more than half of the Senators' victories, saved the day in relief of winner Russ Kemmerer in the eighth. It was his 15th successful relief job, plus nine victories on his own.

Cleveland broke loose with six runs in the third inning for a 10-4 romp over Kansas City. Don Ferrarese took over for Jim Grant with two out in the fifth and blanked the A's the rest of the way. It was his first victory of the year.

Frank Lary pitched himself out of one jam after another and went the route to beat Chicago despite 14 White Sox hits. Al Kaline and Charlie Maxwell each drove in a pair of runs in Detroit's 6-2 victory.

Philadelphia beat Milwaukee 7-6, leaving the Braves' National League lead at seven games after San Francisco lost to Los Angeles 6-3. It was the 10th defeat for the Giants in 11 games.

George Witt threw a three-hitter and scored the only run in Pittsburgh's 1-0 victory over Cincinnati. Ed Ennis' grand slam homer gave St. Louis a 6-3 triumph over Chicago, breaking up a battle between Vinegar Bend Mizell and Dick Drott.

Pete Runnels held tight to the American League batting lead with one hit in three official trips against Ford for a .335 average. Whitely struck out six and walked four, snapping Boston's five-game winning streak.

George "Red" Witt appears to be the answer to Pittsburgh's long search for the fourth starting pitcher behind Bob Friend, Ronnie Kline and Vern Law.

Witt's brilliant three-hit shutout of Cincinnati Friday night draws attention to him. He struck out 10 Redlegs, including Bob Thurman four times, in his victory over Joe Nuxhall.

Pittsburgh, momentarily derailed in Milwaukee, again is making menacing gestures in the National League race. The Pirates trail the Braves by eight games but are only one game behind the San Francisco Giants.

A boisterous crowd of 45,098 welcomed the last place Dodgers to the Coliseum for a 19-game home stand. Carl Furillo's three-run homer in the fifth did the trick. Don Drysdale, replaced by Johnny Klippstein with two out in the ninth, was the winner over Ruben Gomez.
