Democrats Say U. S. Lost Out In Missile Research By Cutting Down On Funds

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Democratic-controlled House committee Monday said the United States lost several years in missile research because of money cuts by the Eisenhower administration. Republicans on the Government Operations Committee in turn accused the Democratic majority of "carelessly playing politics with national defense" and spending public funds for an investigation promoting "democratic political propaganda."

The GOP members said the Democrats hit right at President Eisenhower and former Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson.

The conflicting views were in a report on an inquiry into Defense Department research and development efforts. The inquiry was begun after Russia beat the United States in launching the first Earth satellite last fall.

The report's 22 recommendations generally called for (1) cutting down on red tape it said was holding up research projects, (2) a steady course instead of stop-and-go efforts, (3) pushing competitive endeavors at early stages rather than banking on a single line of research, (4) use by Secretary of Defense McNamara of wider powers under the new reorganization law to streamline research efforts, and (5) a study to be made by non-

Skull Fracture Suffered By Youth In Car Wreck

Norman Trapp, 16, Springfield, suffered a skull fracture early Saturday morning when the car he was driving for a California man swerved off Highway 99 near the military interchange and piled into a stone bank.

He is still being held in a local hospital for observation, the hospital reported today. Trapp's condition could not be ascertained.

The Springfield youth, driving a car towing a trailer owned by Clifton Bard of Crannell, Calif., hit the highway shoulder at a curve, whipped around out of control, and plowed into the bank. He was thrown head first from the vehicle.

State police who investigated said the Bard car was a total wreck, but the trailer was all right. The accident occurred about 5:15 a.m. Saturday.

Bard was not injured in the crash, the report continued. He was picked up Trapp a few miles back and had asked him to take over the wheel of his car.

United Nations Ready To Argue Troops Issue

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev Monday blamed the United States and Britain for shifting discussion of the Middle East from a summit meeting to the U.N. General Assembly.

In a letter to British Prime Minister Macmillan, Khrushchev denied that he and the Soviet Union backed down from a summit meeting within the U.N. Security Council.

The letter, released Monday, in effect charged the United States and Britain with trying to stage a loaded session of the United Nations that would justify their "aggressive action" in the Near and Middle East.

Macmillan, in a note to Khrushchev on Aug. 7, said the Soviet Premier agreed to a summit meeting within the framework of the Security Council but backed down.

Truck deliveries were being squeezed off slowly in many parts of Oregon Monday in the wake of a Teamsters Union strike in California.

Teamsters pickets appeared in Klamath Falls while a union spokesman said drivers in Portland would deliver only merchandise they had on hand.

Several freight lines also said they are accepting no more deliveries.

The California strike was launched to back up union wage demands in the Sacramento area. Many trucking companies in California began shutting down operations — contending a strike against one was a strike against all.

Building Code Variances To Get Council Attention

Fighting Breaks Out Anew Sunday Near Syria Border

BEIRUT (AP)—Pro-government irregulars fought a three-hour battle with rebels in Aita village, near the Syrian frontier Sunday, it was reported Monday.

Sources connected with the Syrian Social National Party said armed members of the party killed or wounded many rebels and lost one dead and two wounded on their own side.

Aita village is in the Rachaya District where the body of Ahmed Hammond, a leader of the party, was found mutilated, apparently murdered, over the weekend.

It could not be determined whether the fighting in Aita was a vendetta by the party against the rebels.

Pacific Plywood Union Run-off Election Slated

A run-off election to decide which union shall represent workers at Pacific Plywood is scheduled for Friday at the plant.

The election was set by the National Labor Relations Board after an earlier vote resulted in a stand-off. Neither the Lumber and Sawmill Workers or International Woodworkers of America received a majority of votes cast.

Pacific Plywood employees now are members of LSW but a petition for an election was filed with the NLRB. Ballots were cast Aug. 3, with 79 for IWA, 64 for LSW, 16 for no union and 1 tossed out by challenge. Fifteen workers failed to cast votes.

Insurance Group Hits Increased Social Security

WASHINGTON (AP)—Insurance industry spokesmen Monday decried attempts to increase social security benefits as an election year device which might weaken the national economy itself.

Testifying before the Senate Finance Committee, Albert C. Adams of Philadelphia, president of the National Assn. of Life Underwriters, said the insurance industry believes passage of a House bill providing 7 per cent increases in old age benefits "would seriously weaken, if not destroy, not only the program itself but the entire national economy as well."
