Auto Industry Foresees Upturn, Recalls Workers

DETROIT (AP) — The auto industry, gearing to new model production and rosy expectations for the 1959 model year, is calling back laid-off workers for the first time since late last fall.

General Motors, Ford and Chrysler said more than 180,000 will be recalled by mid-November as the big three swing into full 1959 production.

First back will be some 42,000 Chrysler workers — the majority of them Aug. 18 when the company starts production of the new cars.

General Motors' hourly rated employees will be increased from fewer than 200,000 to more than 225,000 between now and mid-November. And nearly 40,000 workers will be recalled at Ford.

A Ford spokesman said a nationwide peak of 102,500 employees is expected there at the height of 1959 production.

In the first quarter of 1957, General Motors had 387,000 hourly rated employees; Ford had 143,000 and Chrysler had 108,000.

With production and earnings off generally throughout the industry this year, the auto makers have looked to recoup with the 1959 models.

Deadlock Lingers

The recalls came as the Michigan Employment Security Commission reported that unemployment in the state at a new high of 475,000 in mid-July and as the international executive board of the United Auto Workers Union met in secret to map an offensive on the deadlocked new contract talks.

The board heard reports from bargaining units at the big three yesterday but ended its meeting with no announcement. UAW council representing workers at GM, Ford and Chrysler held separate meetings today and will be briefed by union officials on the status of negotiations.

The councils also will vote on requests for strike authorization from their various bargaining committees before the executive board meets again tonight for final action. There has been no indication the board will announce either a strike target or a strike date following the meeting, although it already has overwhelming approval from the rank and file to call a walkout against any of the auto companies.

Man Asks Court To Stop Woman's Amorous Effort

LONDON (AP) — David Shadow, who is 30 and married, went to court here to protect himself from the amorous attentions of 31-year-old spinster Joan Croft.

He told a court at Hull: She followed him from town to town on her motor scooter and tailed him in bars and hotels.

She drove round and round his home until after midnight.

She turned up at his office.

She hit him on the head with her crash helmet.

Salesman Shadow accused the tall, slim Miss Croft of assault and causing a breach of the peace.

"She is making a proper pest of herself with no encouragement from me," he complained. "My marriage is in danger and my wife is ill."

Two Japanese Ships Showered With Radiation

TOKYO (AP) — Two Japanese ships, showered with radioactive rain in the Pacific returned home to a nation showing increasing bitterness toward American nuclear weapon tests.

Physical examinations were immediately ordered for all crew members of the oceanographic survey ships Satsuma and Takuyo. They will be kept under observation for a week.

American and Australian doctors who examined the crews in New Britain reported they suffered no harmful effects from the radioactive dusting they suffered July 14 after a U. S. test at Eniwetok.

But Japan, the only nation to know first hand the horrors of atomic bombing, feels any radioactivity at all is suspect.

Medicated Seed Conquers Various Diseases Of Birds

STOCKHOLM (AP) — A disease sometimes called parrot fever that causes a type of pneumonia in humans can be stopped where it begins — in household birds — scientists said today.

The disease is psittacosis. In birds it is mainly an intestinal disease. But in humans, who pick it up from the dust of infected bird cages, it causes a sort of pneumonia.

Now, said Dr. James H. Steele of the U. S. Public Health Service, there is a method of giving birds medicine and food at the same time. Infection subsides sharply after the first day of treatment, he said.

Steele, chief of the veterinary public health division at Atlanta, Ga., told the international congress for microbiology that medicated bird seed had been developed at the University of California. It has had remarkable results in

field trials at the university's Hooper Foundation in San Francisco, Steele said. Other trials were conducted at the University of Texas medical branch in Galveston.

Psittacosis affects parakeets, parrots, lovebirds and other household birds. Fed for them using the antibiotic, Chlortetracycline, and hulled millet seed, which are reportedly also effective against bronchitis, rhinitis and other bird illnesses. Heretofore, birds had to be treated by injection for psittacosis.

In humans, it is combatable by penicillin and other antibiotics.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation to establish definite rules and regulations for election of some 30,000 farmer committeemen has been passed by the Senate and sent to the House.

The farmer committeemen at local, county and state levels administer the numerous federal farm programs, including benefit payments.

Multi-Billion Dollar Merger Of Banks Planned

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A multi-billion-dollar bank merger, one of the largest every proposed in the West, is in the making.

Firstamerica Corp. of San Francisco plans to acquire 80 per cent or more of the outstanding stock of California Bank of Los Angeles, it was announced Friday by California directors.

It is understood the proposal calls for California bank to be the surviving institution in the merger with Firstamerica's First Western Bank & Trust Co. California bank then will have resources approaching 2 1/2 billion dollars and 165 branches.

The plans call for an exchange of 3 1/2 shares of Firstamerica capital stock for each of the out-
