

# Hoffa Admits Taking Gifts, Making Loans To Hoodlums

WASHINGTON (AP)—Teamsters boss James R. Hoffa told Tuesday of receiving gifts from management. He also disclosed another union loan to another off-arrested Michigan businessman. Hoffa testified he had received gifts but "no cash money" from George Kamenow, a Detroit labor relations consultant. He said he accepted a suit of hunting underwear from Ben Drarow, head of the Thomas Department Store in Minneapolis. He said Teamsters Local 289, his home local in Detroit, loaned \$2,000 to Armand Abbas, described by the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee as a man with a record of 17 arrests and 7 convictions.

**Denies Fear Of Hoodlums**  
The Teamsters president denied that he held them back from throwing hoodlums and officials with criminal records out of the union. "I'm not frightened by anybody," Hoffa roared. "I do not frighten easily." F. J. Kennedy, committee counsel, had asked whether Hoffa was "frightened of these people." Kennedy ticked off the names of racketeers and persons convicted of crimes — New York racketeer Anthony (Tony Duck) Corallo among them — whom Hoffa said he has made no move to oust from positions of trust in the teamsters. Hoffa insisted that "in due course" he would get around to deciding whether to fire them, but that in the meanwhile it would be up to members at the local level to bring charges against them if they choose.

# Senate Behind In Schedule But Making Progress

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate fell behind in its work today, slowing Congress' drive toward adjournment. An early session was called in an effort to complete work on a complex excise tax revision bill that kept the Senate on the job until close to midnight last night. Senators Monday managed to dispose of controversial whiskey and oil-gas depletion allowance amendments. In acting on the excise bill, the Senate defeated 51-29 an attempt to strike out of the House-passed measure a provision benefiting whiskey distillers.

# 2 Men Well-Known Here Die In Water

A man who died while swimming near Portland Sunday was a former Roseburg resident and another man who died in a similar incident Saturday was well-known in the Roseburg area. Monroe (Bud) Cowie, 41, friends reported Monday, resided in Roseburg for about 10 years before moving to Portland last year. The Associated Press reported Cowie died of a heart attack while swimming at Rooster Rock State Park east of Portland. He had been transferred from Roseburg to Portland by Coen Supply Co.

Frank V. Martin, 56, died of similar causes as he attempted to rescue his son, Tommy, 12, at Viking State Park Saturday. He was pulled to shore and pronounced dead shortly after he leaped fully clothed into the Sandy River after his son had called for help. His son was rescued by another man. Martin was an uncle of Mrs. Robert Boehm of Roseburg and reportedly had business friends in Roseburg. He was a member of a food company. The funeral will be Wednesday at 9 a. m. in Peak's Funeral Home in Milwaukee, where Martin resided.

Funeral services for Cowie are scheduled for 11 a. m. at Hill and NE Goetz St. about 10:30 a. m. Monday when smoke was discovered coming from the trailer. The owner, Earl Smith, was on vacation and firemen made a forced entry. It was discovered that the smoke was caused by a short in the electrical wiring, firemen said. Minor damage was caused to the 40-foot trailer. A neighbor discovered the smoke coming from the seams on the outside of the trailer. No damage was reported in a small grass fire at 727 W. Pilger Ave. Monday at 4:26 p. m. Firemen from the Roseburg west side substation answered the call.

# County Officials' Meet Continues

PORTLAND (AP)—Affiliated groups held business sessions Tuesday as the National Assn. of County Officials' convention entered its second day. Delegates gathered for meetings of the National Assn. of County Recorders and Clerks and the National Assn. of County Treasurers and Finance Officers at the morning session. A workshop session on federal-county relations heard a number of speakers discuss federal assistance programs for urban development, school construction, civil defense programs and highway aid. Simultaneous luncheons were held for groups participating in discussions on roads and highways, welfare, civil defense, legislation and natural resources.

Tuesday afternoon delegates were to travel by bus to the Oregon coast. The convention concludes with a Wednesday general session, the election of officers, and an evening banquet. Gov. Robert Meyner of New Jersey, on a national speaking tour, gave the keynote address at Monday's opening session.

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# Negro Rights, Gambling Are Vote Issues

Negro rights were at issue today in primary elections in New York and Arkansas. Farther west, in Idaho, a primary featured a candidate for governor who wants legalized gambling.

The New York primary was held in Harlem itself. Rep. Adam Clayton Powell was challenged for the Democratic nomination for his House seat by another Negro, City Councilman Earl Brown. The contest is only one of 52 primaries for congressional and State Legislature nominations in New York state. But politicians regard it as a possible gauge of Negro political sentiment in the nation.

**Called On Uncle Tom**  
Powell has gone all out. He has called Brown a "hand-picked Uncle Tom" and a Negro phrase for members of their race considered subservient to whites. For his part, Brown has accused Powell of rabble rousing racism and "treason to the Democratic party."

In Arkansas, where Gov. Orval Faubus is overwhelmingly primary victory July 29, the race issue has been raised in contests for nominations of two State Supreme Court justices. As in the case of Faubus, the big question is integration of public schools.

Atty. Gen. Johnson, organizer of Arkansas' first Citizens Council, a segregationist group, is trying to unseat Justice Minor Millwee. **Objects To Dissent**  
The other Arkansas Supreme Court contest is between Griffin Smith Jr. and Justice Ed. F. McFaddin. Smith objects to a dissenting opinion by McFaddin to a court ruling that a man arrested during anti-integration demonstrations could not be prosecuted.

In Idaho, a man attempting for legalized gambling in State Sen. A. M. Derr, one of four Democratic candidates for governor. The winner will run against Gov. Robert E. Smylie, a Republican.

The engineering firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes & Merryfield received \$1,438.51 in fees.

Elton Roberts, secretary, told the Council the club wanted a regular dispenser's license instead of the present club license in order to keep teenagers out of the bar. He gave assurance that public trade wouldn't be sought even though the new license would allow the general public to patronize the club.

Instructed the city attorney to institute legal proceedings if the deadline for moving a house at the corner of W. Sharp Avenue and W. Cardinal Street is not met. Held in lieu of \$5,000 bond each are Richard Readdy, 26, Shamokin, Pa. and his wife Helen Margaret, 20. They pleaded innocent Monday to charges of child desertion. Jesse L. Burger, 41, El Dorado Springs, Mo., is held on a \$2,000 bond after pleading innocent to a charge of aiding and abetting the Readdys in their alleged offense. Paul Andrew, 5-month-old son of the Readdys, is at the Tulsa Juvenile Shelter, his future still undetermined.

The Pennsylvania couple is accused of trading the infant to Burger for the man's 1937 pickup truck.

# Administrators Assigned In Supt. Neet's Absence In Myrtle Creek District

Changes in administrative assignments in the absence of Myrtle Creek School Supt. Al Neet Monday night were authorized by the School Board. Neet is recovering in a Santa Maria, Calif., hospital from injuries suffered in a highway accident in which his wife, Eleanor, was killed Aug. 2. The School Board has been informed that Neet will be unable to return to his job until mid-October, according to Mrs. Ruth Evans, News-Review correspondent.

Myrl Barkhurst, the high school principal, will assume Neet's duties for the time being. The board also called in three other administrators early to take up part of the increased administrative load. Grade school principals Ray Coffey and Anton Bryant stated work Monday, a week earlier than usual. High school Vice Principal Dudley Cameron will start work next Monday to assume Barkhurst's duties.

The board hired two new teachers. Lila Bernd, of Minneapolis, Minn., who will teach vocational home economics, and Stanley Whetstein, of Jackson, Wyo., a high school math and science teacher. Nellie Twisp, sixth-grade teacher, resigned, leaving that job the only vacant one in the district. Mabel Falls petitioned the board for a salary increase, but the request was tabled for further study.

**Bleachers To Be Built**  
Custodian Dale Whisenant reported that all materials for the new high school football bleachers has been received. He said volunteers will be welcomed in the evenings in the building of the bleachers. The board also acted on insurance matters. Student insurance policies this year will be offered only for athletics with other students having the option to purchase insurance from the State School System Insurance Agency, Eugene, the low bidder on athletes' insurance. Other bidders were Jones Insurance Agency, Eugene, and E. G. High, Roseburg. There will be no deduction clause in this year's policies. Renewal of insurance for school buses with Jones Insurance was postponed until arrival of the new buses.

Decision on whether the district should pay for bus drivers' examinations was withheld until it can be determined how other districts in the county handle the matter. These fuel contracts were awarded: Fuel Oil, Shell Oil Co.; gasoline, Union Oil Co., and manufactured gas, Suburban Gas Co., Roseburg.

# California Man's Condition Better

The condition of Wayne Lewis Rickards, 22, of Arcata, Calif., hurt seriously in a one-car crashup near Sutherland early Sunday, was reported "satisfactory" today in a Roseburg hospital. According to witnesses, the driver of the 1958 convertible suffered a skull fracture to the back of his head. Rickards apparently lost control of the vehicle near Deady, skidded and twisted across Highway 99, then plunged down a 27-foot embankment. The car came to a stop in a ditch on Highway 225 on its top, a total wreck, state police said. Also injured and treated at a local hospital was a hitchhiking passenger, Army Pfc. Harvard George Golden, 20, of Ft. Ord, Calif. Golden has been released from the hospital.

# Nautilus Crew Arrives For Hero's Welcome

PORTLAND, England (AP)—The crew of the U.S. submarine Nautilus arrived Tuesday for a hero's welcome after an epic voyage under the north polar icecap. Blaring bands, bagpipers and cheers greeted the big atomic-powered submarine as she was docked.

In fleetingly sunshine, the crew reached land for the first time since leaving Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, on July 23 for the first voyage under the arctic ice by way of the North Pole. The bands played John Philip Sousa's "The Stars and Stripes Forever."

**Crew Greeted**  
Men and officers of the Royal Navy U.S. Ambassador John Hay Whitney, U.S. Navy men and officers, the Earl of Selkirk, and hundreds of spectators roared out a greeting. Men of the Nautilus shouted and waved as they ended their 8,145-mile journey. For the captain of the Nautilus, Cmdr. William R. Anderson, of Waverly, Tenn., it was the second landing.

Last week he was flown by helicopter and airplane from the deck of his sub to the White House where he received the Legion of Merit from President Eisenhower. Early Tuesday afternoon, he was reunited with his 115 officers and men. A helicopter whirled him from shore to the Nautilus as it neared this naval port. Anderson, in full naval uniform, stood on the conning tower as the big sleek sub moved into port.

# Woman, Son Injured In Traffic Accident

A 56-year-old Camas Valley woman and her son, 17, were treated Monday night at a local hospital for injuries suffered in a traffic accident on Highway 42 at the intersection of Gale St. south of Roseburg. State police reported Mrs. Nora F. Denn, Roseburg, received a fractured wrist and her son, Billy Conrad Denn, a bloody nose and face contusion in the crash. The car in which they were passengers was driven by Henry A. Denn, 56. Police said the Denn vehicle came over a rise traveling south about 4:50 p. m. and was unable to stop before hitting the rear of a pickup truck operated by Melvin Devern Miller, 29, of 5178 SW Lane St., Roseburg. Miller had stopped to make a left turn off the highway.

Denn told officers he was blinded by the sun as he came over the rise and was unable to see the pickup in time to stop. He was cited orally for violation of basic rule. Extensive damage was done to the front end of the Denn car. It was towed to a garage. Little damage was done to the Miller vehicle.

# Henry Holloway Asks For Time To See Attorney

Henry Alvin Holloway, 23, of Tenmile asked time to see an attorney Monday when brought to court on a district attorney's information charging him with rape of a 13-year-old Roseburg girl. District Judge Warren A. Woodruff continued the case until this afternoon. According to the complaint signed by a sheriff's deputy, Holloway allegedly stayed with the girl on or about Feb. 21 of this year. Another charge of rape, involving the girl's 14-year-old sister, also of Roseburg, has been filed against James Ray Martin, 18, of Roseburg. Martin Friday asked time to see a lawyer. His case also is continued until this afternoon. He is cited in the information with the act on or before Feb. 22.
